



Dear Companions,

On March 19th this year, Monica Cavanagh rsj, Congregational Leader and Pauline McGuire, Chairperson of JCoLT, co-signed an Auspice Agreement. This document cements an agreement between the Congregational Leadership Team (CLT) and the Josephite Companions Leadership Team.

Auspicing is a means of providing endorsement, support and guidance to a group. In our Agreement this is summarized in 'recognition and acceptance by the Sisters that the Josephite Companions are an authentic Josephite pathway to living a Josephite life' and 'recognition and acceptance by the Josephite Companions that we walk in association with the Sisters and the wider Josephite family.'

Key elements of this document recognize our levels of involvement as Companions, namely Local, Regional and International (JCoLT). It addresses obligations that we have to honour, such as Safeguarding, responsibilities re IT, Financial arrangements and Record Management, such as databases.

We as JCoLT are very grateful to the CLT for their ongoing investment in us a Companions: their wisdom, as well as resources such as personnel, time, financial and much more to enable us to deepen our opportunities to live the Gospel with a Josephite heart.

Some stories from Mary MacKillop's time in Aotearoa NZ provide food for thought.

When Mary visited the Sisters in Arrowtown, Sisters later recalled how she cheerfully 'took on the household chores,' and that she would 'prepare our lunch and wash our dishes.'

When visiting Port Chalmers, when it was first established, the Sisters discovered on returning from school that Mary, with the help of postulants, had washed all the quilt covers but she was distressed that she hadn't got them all on the line before they returned.



When staying at Waimate, the Sisters were preparing the children for their First Holy Communion. On the first day Mary noticed a very poor, ragged boy in the group and fearing insults from the other children, Mary asked to take the child aside. On his Communion day he was wearing a beautiful suit.

Pope Francis in his final address to the Synod said we need:
"a church that hears the cry of the world... I want to say it, maybe someone will be scandalized...a church that gets its hands dirty to serve the Lord."

In noticing the details and taking care of the little ordinary things Mary provides a practical example of rolling your sleeves up and getting your hands dirty.

With our Friends, in our Prayer, and in our Service may we Companions be prepared to become more aware, to notice and to get our hands dirty to further God's mission.
