SISTER LOUISE'S UNVEILING 26.01.24



At last we were able to celebrate the life of a wonderful friend, auntie and Sister. A woman who loved life and lived it fully in service to her family and the people of the many places she went in her life as a Sister of Saint Joseph. The COVID pandemic prevented a Celebration for her 100th Birthday and reduced the amount of visiting one could do. Two months later there were restrictions on the numbers who could attend her funeral. A Vigil Mass and a requiem Mass were held at Mission Bay in the Mary MacKillop Chapel and she returned to her beloved Panguru for a night in Ngatimanawa Marae before her funeral and burial at Hato Petera, Panguru.

Two years from her death on the 25th January 2022 Josephite Sisters, her nieces and nephews, and her Panguru and wider Whanau came to Ngatimanawa Marae to celebrate Sister Louise's

life of dedicated service. We were warmly welcomed onto the Marae, shared a delicious meal and had evening prayers led by Rev Christina Morunga and Katekita Dougie Te Wake, discussing the relevance and practice of an unveiling service along with prayers and hymns.

On the 26th, Bishop Steve Lowe, with Father Maliu and Katekita Henare Te Wake lead the service with Rev Christina Morunga sharing the story of Sister Louise's life with her parents and older brother and sister leading to the call on her to join the Sisters of St Joseph at age 15, and her faithful 82 years' Service from her life vows to the Order; an outstanding achievement!

Sister Louise is buried in front of Hato Petera Church. Bishop Steve blessed the grave and Sister Moya and niece, Maureen Murray, Josephite Companions Maria Larkins and Mina Pomare unveiled the stone and Great niece Emma Houghton read the inscription. Many past pupils, teachers, and whanau paid tributes.

After being welcomed back onto the Marae we enjoyed the Hakari, Celebration Feast. Louis Blair, Sister Louise's name-sake, and her youngest great niece and nephew cut the 100th Birthday Cake and her great nephew who shares her birthday, with his siblings blew out the candles. It was a special day of gathering Sister Louise's three families together; Her birth family, her Sisters of Saint Joseph and her very wide whanau of Panguru and the places throughout New Zealand where she shared her love of Christ in service. May she rest in peace.

OPENING OF THE NEW MARIAN COLLEGE CHRISTCHURCH

It is 12 years since the 2011 earthquake forced Marian College from their original school. They have “camped,” sharing facilities with others in various premises since then but have this year finally moved into a new purpose-built school in Papanui and what a school!! The purchase of the old Foodstuffs warehouse and the building of an innovative and environmentally friendly school within it, is amazing.



At the heart of the school is the Chapel of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop a place of quiet contemplation that students can come to.

At the recent official opening of the school some Josephite Sisters delighted in the opening of the chapel which uses some timber grown and milled in the South Island. The Sisters have had connections with the school since 1982 when the former MacKillop College merged with St Mary’s and became Marian College.

It is an amazing concept and one in which one of the big drivers is sustainability – an example of reusing a building which would otherwise have been destroyed. A choice to care for our earth.
