

I guess most of us here today remember the old green catechism; well today I am reminded of the question 'What is a sacrament?' and the answer 'A sacrament is the outward sign of inward grace.'

I feel today's liturgy could best be described as a very meaningful outward sign of inward grace; and we are going to need that grace to enable us to come together with full hearts and minds as Josephite Associates.

When I was made aware that our Perthville Sisters were considering the possibility of joining with the Central Josephite sisters I must confess I was sceptical about the outcome; this scepticism arose mostly from a very selfish point of view. Will they no longer be OUR sisters? Will they lose their identity, their special charism, will they be sent far away so I will lose touch with them? Will they be swallowed up being such a small group into a much larger group?

Last May when that most beautiful ceremony took place at MacKillop College amidst snow and ice, my head accepted the rationale of their fusion; but it wasn't until I saw the way our Sisters were welcomed with open arms by the Central Josephite Sisters and the tremendous Joy our Sisters experienced as a result of the fusion that I have been able to truly embrace the courageous decision our sisters took in requesting union with their Central Sisters. This successful union didn't just happen, it had to be worked at, concerns had to be addressed, concessions had to be made, and misunderstandings had to be worked through.

And this is where that grace, the grace we receive today, comes in for us. Our two associations have worked in very different ways. We have developed our own type of commitment, our own communication style, and our own feel. All of this is good

and has served each group well, but now is the time for us to grow, to open ourselves up to a wider world of Josephite Associates, to follow the Sisters' example and embrace a future bigger and richer because we have joined forces.

I see our two Associate groups as two pieces of cloth, each containing its own colours, patterns and styles. The aim of this fusion is not to have one piece of cloth cover and smother the other but to weave the threads of each piece of cloth together, to intertwine the gifts of each group so that the whole becomes stronger and more enlivened, more colourful, full of love, dedication and energy, overflowing with hospitality and the charism of Mary and Julian. We have here the opportunity to love the Gospel message of 'May they all be one.'

Remember Jesus said, 'Have no fear - do not be troubled'. Why did he say this - because we truly believe Christ is amongst us and with Christ anything and everything is possible. From the pen of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop:

The atmosphere at Infant de Prague Hall, St Mary's School, Wellington, was one of excitement, renewed friendships and welcome to visitors as we enjoyed a cuppa and country cooking.

Sister Mary Ellen O'Donoghue, Regional Leader NSW, welcomed all to a wonderful day. 'Although there may be mixed feelings' we were encouraged to 'acknowledge what is' and 'anticipate the future'.

The guest speaker, Sally Neaves, spoke to us around the theme 'Doing Something for a Better World'. Sally shared with us her life journey in Australia, Japan, Korea, Vietnam and Cambodia. Sally is on the Pathway to living in the Josephite spirit and in Affiliation with the Sisters of St Joseph. Her message portrayed struggles and success to understand the Charism of Mary MacKillop on her journey. Long may we celebrate the 23rd May 2015 as the day of unity.



The pain, suffering and death of Jesus is lived out daily in our lives. Each of us carries a cross, either consciously or unconsciously known.

We know something of the cross when we experience physical or mental illness, the pain of separation, broken relationships, loneliness, sudden loss of someone we love, or simply having to endure the ordinary struggles of daily living. Whenever we endure and keep going despite the fragility of our lives, we are living out the passion of Jesus.

In difficult and traumatic moments we stand beside Mary at the foot of the Cross. We too, have within us what Mary had within her – an enormous courage and a capacity to endure pain. A courage to face our daily crosses, to befriend and accept them and to trust the power of God to uphold us. In the midst of darkness, the dawn breaks, holding the possibility of new life. The stone is moved, Jesus is risen. His crucified body shines with resurrected light, casting a radiant brightness over the shadows of our lives and our world. Suffering is transformed into new life, good triumphs over evil and everything that is broken and dead is renewed. Death becomes the gateway to new life. The cross and the glory are forever intertwined. The light of the resurrected body of Jesus changes forever our vision of death. Death no longer has power over Him, nor has it power over us. We are destined to live and to have life eternal.

The resurrection of Jesus sets free forever what was promised at His birth. Daniel O'Leary reassures us that we have God's creative power at our core. He says, 'Believing in this incredible power within us, nothing is impossible anymore, it enables us to live with courage, knowing that no matter what happens to us, or around us we are under the protection of God and we can do all things in Him who strengthens us.'

Junior Joeys

Junior Joeys groups are thriving in Northern Tasmania. Almost 100 students have been commissioned during term one across St Thomas More's, Our Lady of Lourdes, Sacred Heart and St Peter Chanel Catholic Schools.

On St Joseph's Day at St Thomas More's Catholic School in Newstead a group



of thirty one Junior Joeys made their commitment at the School Liturgy for St Joseph.

The group wrote their own Mission Statement, which was in the form of questions put to them at their commitment:

- Do you aspire to be people of joy and integrity, doing what is right?
- Will you notice the needs in your community and help when you can?
- Are you willing to learn about our Josephite heritage and share your knowledge with our school community?

The group, who are passionate about sharing the Josephite story with class groups, demonstrated in drama, during the commitment liturgy, how they could respond to a need in their school community. They have also adopted our school Fey Allegria in Tarma, Peru, for whom they have already raised over \$400 to provide concrete to make a playground strip for three- to five-year old children to play on. The school is on the side of the steep slopes of the Andes and is subject to landslides.

Recently the Junior Joeys met up with the Junior Joeys from Devonport and Ulverstone at MacKillop Hill in Forth for a day of learning and sharing about the Josephite story. A similar day was also held at Smithton.

Caring for Kids Who Need Nurturing

Sister Frances Fleming rsj lives in a tidy townhouse in Quakers Hill. There's a pile of plastic dominoes on her kitchen bench, the kind that come free with your groceries at Woolworths. Kids love them, and Sister Fran works with children.

For the past three years, Sister Fran has been working as a Chaplain at Reiby Juvenile Justice Centre in Airds. The detainees are boys who are mostly between 12 and 16 years of age. On occasion boys as young as 10 are held at the centre because there is nowhere safe for them to stay.

'These are children who have not had the advantages that the majority of children have,' Sister Fran said.

'These kids are kids in need. I don't think about what they've done. They're here now. They need nurturing, they need to know that God loves them and that there's a way out of what they're in ...we're there for them.'

When she first heard that Reiby Juvenile Justice Centre needed a new chaplain, Sister Fran was working in Aboriginal Catholic Ministry in the Mt Druitt area.

Some of the Aboriginal women in the community told her: 'You've got to go for it, Sister. That's where we need the help with our young fellas.'

Across NSW, about half of all the children and young people in prison are of Aboriginal descent.

Sister Fran spent twelve years working with Aboriginal people in the East Kimberley Region of Western Australia before her work in Mt Druitt. She likes to tell a story about George, an Aboriginal man from Bourke, who was asked by her chaplaincy colleague Pastor Lee Bromley what help his community needed.

'Lee, you'll have to sit in the gutter for three years with me and then you'll know what to do,' was George's laconic response. Sister Fran understands exactly what George meant.

Though most of the boys at Reiby come from dysfunctional backgrounds, the chaplains work hard to provide a family atmosphere. 'I'm a little bit like the grandma,' she said warmly.

Sister Fran, who recently celebrated 50 years as a Sister of St Joseph of the

order's co-founder, Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop.

When I asked her about Pope Francis washing the feet of young men and women in prison on Holy Thursday, Sister Fran seemed a little overwhelmed. It means a lot, this 'going to the edges' as she described it. 'You get a better view from the edge.'

Reflecting on consecrated life, Sister Fran comments that her vows include a commitment to making a difference. 'It's looking at and being with those who are on the fringes, on the edges, who have fewer opportunities than others,' she said.

Of her ministry to the boys at Reiby, Sister Fran said these young people need to be given a go. 'They're God's children and He loves them. What can we do except love them too?'

St Joseph the Worker: Joe the Tradie

How inspiring is the Feast of Joseph the Worker! – 1st May. In the Gospels Jesus is referred to both as a carpenter, and as the carpenter's son.

God chose Joseph as primary carer of Mary and the child Jesus. This humble man would have worked to provide a comfortable place to live, even when the family were refugees in a foreign country. How lovingly Joseph would have crafted a crib for the baby or a chair for the baby's mother! Joseph spent his life engaged in the type of work common to poor people, working with wood, working in a workshop situation.

Recent pictures on television of places struck by cyclones show the basic work of rebuilding broken lives as first providing shelter, housing and some comfort using wood and other materials available. St Joseph and his foster Son spent quiet days working manually, working for the poor and with the poor, showing a respect for work that is a lesson for us that all honest work is worthy of God's blessing.

Mary MacKillop certainly learnt this lesson and her Sisters followed her example. Such things as sharing the physical tasks in the Convent, great musicians cooking the midday meal, Sister Patrick Donahoo cooking a special birthday cake for every child at Surry Hills with the child's name on top. When a homeless man died in the gardens at East Melbourne the only note found on him read: 'Thank Sister Patrick for the sandwiches.'

Work for, and respect for the poor is our heritage from Joseph, and for those who seek to know the charism of Mary MacKillop, that respect, a sense of hospitality and a preparedness to get one's hands dirty at times is essential.

Another lesson for us is that in addition to St Joseph's practical life of caring and labouring from day to day, Joseph was a man of dreams, deeply in touch with the spiritual. Matthew writes: An angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream telling Joseph to take Mary as his wife, that the coming child was from the Holy Spirit and that Joseph was to call the child Jesus.

Later Joseph led his family from Egypt after an angel appeared to him in a dream, and again, after being warned in a dream, brought Mary and Jesus to Galilee. What holy work that journey was!

May we pray, as in the Eucharist for 1st May, the Feast of St Joseph the Worker:

With St Joseph as our example and guide Help us to do the work you have asked And come to the rewards you have promised. St Joseph, pray for us and for our Congregation.
