"So great is the strength we possess in our unity." Mary MacKillop (30/08/1874)

n recent times Queenslanders and all Australians have rallied together as never before. We've experienced a year like no other in many of our memories, except save for those who witnessed, or were affected by, the impact of the worldwide Spanish Flu epidemic which came to Australian shores in 1919. Between one-quarter and one-third of all Australians contracted it, resulting in 15,000 deaths, including my mother's oldest brother. Baby Arthur's death at fourteen months had a long-lasting effect on his parents and to later-born siblings. To avoid such a widespread catastrophe again when Covid-19 appeared and began to spread worldwide, we were asked to forgo many of our personal freedoms for the sake of the greater good. We obeyed the stay-at-home restrictions to help curb the spread; we gave up some valued personal liberties; we experienced absences at births,

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

could see the wisdom and endeavoured to comply. We judged that our personal freedoms needed to take second place to the protection of the wider community. We responded together and we have grown in our sense of communal identity.

Saint Mary MacKillop worked hard and long to pursue her goal of a unified congregation of sisters who



were able to focus on their core values and aims, rather than be fragmented and less effective. She envisioned a congregation of sisters who did not live apart from the people in religious buildings, but who sought to go out and engage with people wherever they were in the ordinary circumstances and situations of their diverse lives. It was precisely because of this unity that the sisters were able to work cohesively together to achieve the mission to which they had been called. Mary's vision united them together to accomplish some remarkable achievements in often harsh physical and mental landscapes and among people who often had few resources on which to draw. As the congregation began to expand rapidly, and often into remote areas, the sisters very quickly became far removed physically from each other. There was an urgent need to provide cohesion, support, and spiritual accompaniment.

Mary recognised the need to support her sisters wherever they were in this far-flung country or in New Zealand. She travelled extensively to visit them and especially where they were more

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isolated. When she could not be physically with them, she wrote continuously, providing spiritual and moral support. It was a lifeline that kept them all united. Fortunately, the records of her copious writings form an important part of our legacy today and therefore our newsletter themes for this year have focused on some of these.

"So great is the strength we possess in our unity" is one of Mary's messages that I believe is even more relevant for us today. As Josephite Associates, keen to retain our unity, we have been undertaking a process of discernment over the past few years to rediscover our roots, to tap into the values that underpin our ministry, and to seek new ways forward so that we can improve and grow in our mission. We've come to • Do these words remind me to be more loving? More recognise that we are not just little groups of people working away in isolation, but that we are part of a wonderful, powerful, international, global endeavour tasked to make the Good News available to everyone. We now recognise ourselves as Josephite Companions, melded deeply with the Sisters of St Joseph, and poised to continue that mission more fully in our own lives and circumstances, but always drawing on the strength of that combined unity. If we are

brave enough to trust Mary's advice and belief that our strength does indeed lie in our unity, together we can let go of any fear of losing the past, and surge forward together to embrace a new and even brighter future. Let's pray that Saint Mary MacKillop and Saint Joseph will continue to bless, invigorate, and encourage us as we continue to dream and achieve new realities together.

- How do Mary's words "So great is the strength we possess in our unity" relate to my life as a Josephite Companion here and now today?
- What can I do to foster greater unity in my own life?
- How does it affect my relationships with my loved ones?

SPOTLIGHT ON A COMPANION

Carol Leary from Cairns

arol's Josephite mission journey began over 25 years ago when she became an RSJ Associate. It was early days for the movement then, as both the Sisters and Associates struggled to explore, grow into, and fully understand the mandate given by the Congregation's chapter to journey together. However, Carol was delighted to be able to become part of such a new apostolate that connected her more deeply to Mary MacKillop and to the Sisters of St Joseph. She was able to recognise the potential for it to grow; she embraced that call and threw herself wholeheartedly into mission, and supported that by travelling to Brisbane and participating in conference opportunities to determine our future direction.

Carol has been an important part of the glue that binds together the Cairns Companions. Following in the example of Nick Rand and Bruno Mayne, who have now both gone to their heavenly reward, Carol has ensured that this small but dedicated group of people has been able to stay united together and true to the charism, with a strong emphasis on the life of Saint Mary MacKillop. Carol has a very empathetic nature which draws her to others. She usually prepares a monthly prayer gathering but now, with all the difficulties posed by COVID-19, it will become every two months. The Cairns group meets in the Mercy Place Retirement Village Prayer Room, as this is a very convenient venue and suited to some of the more elderly members.



Carol prepares a prayer sheet with a suitably enlarged font for one member who experiences visual difficulties. There is time for reflection, including appropriate music and images on her iPad to aid that reflection. At the conclusion, members enjoy a cuppa and a chat together, so typical of any Josephite gathering. For any Companion who is not able to attend, a copy is mailed out to them at home for their private reflection. Often the group can receive Holy Communion during a Liturgy of the Word at Mercy Place. There are currently eight companions, with a further six enjoying heavenly peace.

Now a widow of eight years, Carol is active in her local community and very determined to make Mary MacKillop more widely known. She makes sure that the local schools receive age-appropriate books on the life of Mary Mackillop and Julian Tenison Woods as a gift from the Cairns Companions. Being involved with a few of the local schools, where she is recognised as a Josephite Companion, has meant that she is a wonderful example of what it means to be part of this Josephite mission. For example, St Francis Xavier's Primary School at Manunda recently unveiled a sculpture of Mary MacKillop and invited Carol along to the occasion.

Not content to rest on her laurels, Carol saw an opportunity to enable the Josephite story to be further enlarged in the Cairns region when it was announced that a new secondary college was to be developed in conjunction with James Cook University, Cairns Campus. This is to be quite a unique partnership, with buildings to be erected in the grounds of the university, with a strong focus on innovation and technology. When names were being selected for the new college, she proposed that of Julian Tenison Woods, particularly considering the explorations he conducted in the far north of

Queensland and Papua New Guinea. She saw that as being part of Cairns Diocese's history and was a little disappointed when Saint Cardinal Newman's name was finally selected rather than her proposal. Not one to retreat, her new goal is to propose that a science laboratory or similar at Newman College be placed under Julian's care. We wish you well Carol as you strive to continue the Josephite story in far north Queensland.

With the relaxation of COVID restrictions, we were delighted to be able to resume our prayer group meetings. Subsequently we decided to meet more frequently, now being bi-monthly. The focus of our last meetings has been the celebrations surrounding the 10 year Anniversary of the Canonisation of Mary MacKillop and the launch of the Josephite Companions.

As a group we were able to plan and participate in the Mass on the weekend of the Canonisation Anniversary. Several of us participated in the Courage Hour on the Friday evening as well as the 10 days of reflection beforehand. In the following week we met in a member's home and watched both the Courage Hour and the video launching the Companions name. We all stated that the Courage Hour had a deeper meaning when we were all together and we have resolved to watch it again in the coming year. We finished the meeting with a delicious shared lunch and lots of chatter.

We thank the Sisters of St Joseph for the Commemorative "*Take Fresh Courage*" booklet. It certainly is a valuable prayer resource as well



as a lovely keepsake. We also look forward to the new Companions Handbook.

"The Son of God" by Jeffrey Archer

e was born in a barn, his father a carpenter, and his mother a decent woman, but they were of no significance, and certainly couldn't have afforded to give the boy a private education. And yet, as a teenager, he was arguing the toss with his elders and betters in the council chambers. He never got a proper job, just roamed around the countryside, unshaven, and living off bread and water and the occasional fish, while offering his opinions to those who cared to listen. He became the manager of a football team known as The Disciples, not one of them a star, In fact the twelfth man let the side down by accepting a transfer fee of thirty pieces of silver to play for the opposition. The authorities eventually arrested him as a rabble-rouser, But couldn't decide what to charge him with, other than the fact he claimed he was the Son of God. They strung him up with a couple of criminals, and when he finally gave up the ghost, rather assumed that would be the last they'd hear of him. The Disciples were relegated at the end of the season, in fact the captain denied on more than one occasion that he'd never been a member of his team. When he died at the age of thirty-three, there were no obituaries in the local press reporting his achievements, no glossy supplements highlighting his colourful career, no radio programmes to discuss his legacy, and no box sets recording any of his miracles. But then, He'd never relied on focus groups to advise him on current trends, or advertising gurus to spend millions promoting his brand, Baby Jesus, the Son of God, born in or spin doctors to sharpen his image, a manger and he didn't require social media to keep his followers up to date, so you could be forgiven for assuming he'd be forgotten in a few days. So how can one explain that over two thousand years later, Jesus Christ is still the best-known celebrity on earth? Could it just be that He was the Son of God? The Companions Leadership Team Queensland wishes joy, deep peace, and blessings on you and your family as we prepare to celebrate the feast of Christmas. Although it may not be the particular celebration some of us had planned, nevertheless, and despite COVID-19 restrictions in place, our prayer is that you will experience the deep peace and joy that alone comes from knowing you are loved and valued by your God.

We conclude with Mary MacKillop's own words dated 7 December 1899:

Though many of us will be far apart, we can be united in spirit and pray for each other at the Crib and at the Altar.
