# Friendship Prayer Service

#### WINTER REFLECTION

During this month of June we celebrate the feast of the Sacred Heart, a feast very dear to the heart of Mary MacKillop and Josephites. Mary wished to be called Sr Mary of the Sacred Heart but Fr Woods insisted in the title Of the Cross. Her sister, Lexie, took the name Sr Mary of the Sacred Heart, when she joined the Good Shepherd Sisters.

This devotion was very strong in the Church at that time, as many of us remember ourselves. Every Church had a statue of the Sacred Heart, we were encouraged to make the nine First Fridays; homes were consecrated to the Sacred Heart and most Catholic homes had a picture of Jesus with this title.

This devotion goes back to the 17th Century when Margaret Mary Alacoque was born in July 1647. Her father died when she was 8 and from the age of 9—13 she suffered a paralyzing illness, during which she made a vow to enter religious life. Later she changed her mind and enjoyed a normal young adult's life and considered marriage. A vision, which she saw while returning from a dance, showed Christ being scourged and she believed she had betrayed Jesus by not following her vow and entered the Visitation convent at 22 years. In 1673 she experienced Christ's presence while at prayer and heard him say he desired to show his love for people in a special way by encouraging devotion to "the heart that so loved mankind."

Margaret Mary encountered many difficulties with regard to this and other private revelations, which caused ill health. Fr Claude de la Colombiere, her spiritual director, believed her testimony and put it in writing. In time, and after a rigorous examination by Church officials, the devotion spread and was accepted throughout the church.

Margaret Mary died on 17th October 1690 and was canonized in 1920. She frequently prayed the words of Ps 73: "What have I in heaven and what do I desire on earth but Thee alone, O my God."

When we consider the ways we use the word 'heart' we can fully understand why Jesus chose this way to reveal his great love for us—to love us with all his heart! When we read the writings of St John—Gospel and letters- the message John seems to be emphasising is God's love for us and here is a man whom we are told was "the one whom Jesus loved", so he is writing from personal experience.


Let us this month allow the personal experience of God's love for me enter my heart by means of prayer and reflection. Maybe we could read the first letter of John, stopping when drawn to do so, and letting the words sink into our own heart. We can also say "I am one whom Jesus loves" and I always use the present tense. For me Jesus not just loved me, but still loves me as I am, warts and all.

Can we, like Mary MacKillop say:

I quietly creep into Its deep abyss; and securely sheltered there, my soul is at peace. May 21, 1907

# MARY'S SISTER—ALEXANDRINA (LEXIE)

Born on September 18, three months after 11 months old Alexander had died. Alexandrina (Lexie) was the fourth daughter of Alexander and Flora MacKillop. At this time the family were living on a property between the Merri and Darebin Creeks, north of Melbourne.

Two months later Victoria celebrated permission to separate from New South Wales with great fireworks displays, sports and gymnastics at South Melbourne Cricket Ground where children enjoyed 20,000 buttered buns. Victoria officially became a separate colony on July 1, 1851.

Another event of this year was the discovery of gold near Clunes and the following year the rush to the goldfields began. Melbourne became a deserted city and food, fuel and water prices became exorbitant. Families with little money would have found it extremely difficult to raise healthy children.

We know little of Lexie's childhood vears but when she was fifteen she was in Penola with Mary and Annie, helping to establish the new institute, the Sisters of St Joseph.

The family was very concerned about Lexie throwing her lot in with Mary, and her mother, her sister Maggie and her aunt Julia all expressed their concern.

In that same year Lexie moved to Mount Gambier and with Blanche Amsink, who later became Sr Francis Xavier, opened a school to 12

children. Life became difficult for Lexie and she herself began to have doubts as to her vocation as a Sister of St Joseph. Annie declared that "Blanche could never forget she was an English aristocrat," and Blanche considered Lexie was disinclined to be a sister.

By April 1867 Lexie had decided she was not mean to be a Sister of St Joseph and went back to Penola where her missionary zeal found an outlet in bringing healing and true affection to the Aboriginals and other poor folk of the district. She used every opportunity she had to teach the faith and to obtain baptism for these people.

Lexie proved herself a gentle, delightful character, kind and ready to help or nurse the aged and the needy. So it would not be surprising that in 1871 she entered the novitiate of the Good Shepherd Sisters at Abbotsford, taking the name Sr Mary of the Sacred Heart.

Fr Julian Woods preached the sermon at her final profession on August 20, 1876. As Mistress of Novices for seven years, she gave evidence of her wisdom and prudence and was loved by all, continuing her readiness to help anyone in need.

By November 1882 Lexie's health had failed due to heart trouble and rheumatism. Her mother, who dreaded December, in which month she had lost three loving members of her family, was in Lexie's thoughts at this time

Flora hurried from Penola to be with Lexie and she and

Annie were with her when she died on December 31, 1882. The Archbishop presided at her Requiem Mass and 26 priests were present. Lexie was originally buried at Abbotsford. Her remains have since been r reinterred at Kew cemetery.


Mary heard the news in Sydney where she had gone on business. Being seriously ill at the time, her letter to her brother Donald was not written until January. She told him of the kindness of the sisters at Abbotsford and of her last conversation with Lexie on the way to Sydney mostly about him. She concluded, "There are only three now left out of eight."

Alexander MacKillop wrote about Lexie, "She died a selfless and generous daughter, who. like her sister Marv brought comfort and love to the poor, needy and lost."

#### CENTENARY OF ST LAURENCE'S LEONGATHA

Many events in the Parish of St Laurence O'Toole, Leongatha, Vic., were participated in over the weekend of 8<sup>th</sup>-10<sup>th</sup> March, to celebrate the Centenary of the Church and the arrival of the Sisters of St Joseph in 1914

On the Saturday evening about 150 parishioners, Sisters and visitors enjoyed viewing the display of old photos and a celebratory dinner in the huge Gymnasium on the school grounds. Appetisers were served before the meal and past students recalled their years of primary education. Sr Jose Nov rsj spoke of her arrival from Holland as a child and boarding at Norah Hogan's, as she could not catch the bus to school. Another Student recalled the changes in education over the 100 years. 'At one time,' she said, if you got a bad report your parents gave you a talking to. Now if you get a bad report, the teacher gets a talking to!'

One of the highlights of the meal was an Ipad on each table containing over 200 photos of school life past and present, school groups and teachers. Diners were able

to sit and find themselves, their children and grandchildren and modern day activities of children dressed up for book week etc. Some photos recalled the old school sports games such as overhead and tunnel ball.

On the Sunday morning the Church was full for Mass celebrated by the Parish Priest Fr Peter Kooloos with Fr John O'Kelly, former PP, concelebrating. During his homily Fr Peter outlined the growth of the Parish in 1913. "The original timber Church was moved across the road to become the first school rooms and the first stage of the Church was begun and opened November 1913. A convent was then built for the Sisters. All this was done," he reminded the Congregation "without any Government assistance. The Parishioners responded with faith and generosity and we celebrate this today, and this spirit of faith, generosity and self-sacrifice has continued to the present time."

In 2000 a Parish Centre, small Mass Room, foyer and kitchen were added to the Church, the architect cleverly incorporating the design into the style of the Church. Refurbishment was completed in 2010. These additions have proven a wonderful blessing to the parish, and a place of gathering before and after Mass, as well as a place of display of Church photos for the Centenary.

After Mass a huge bell, which had rung for the Angelus years before and had been sited in two different places on the Church grounds, was blessed in its new position at the front of the Church. Mr Kevin Slater rang the Angelus, while Fr Peter led all in its recitation. The mighty

sound of the bell rang out across the town and will continue to be rung at midday.

Following the Mass a picnic lunch was enjoyed by the Sisters and some families in the school grounds. A popular Sister present was Sr Barbara Connolly, in her mid-nineties and who, with Sr Helena Mac-Guire, who will be 100 this year, were the last

Sisters of St Joseph to live in Leongatha and left only about 6 years ago. Sr Jose Nov met many school friends and Sr Agnus Nunn, who had been the last Josephite principal at St Laurence's was very busy meeting up with old friends. Sr Maureen Philp, the last Sister to teach in the school also caught up with many friends and past pupils.

A Centenary Mass on the Monday was an occasion for the priests of the Diocese to get together and remember their days as priests in the Parish. The Parish now includes Korumburra Parish with outreach Churches at Mirboo North, Meeniyan, Tarwin Lower and Loch. Dur- Fr Kooloos blessing the Angelus bell ing the last couple of years Fr Peter Kooloos has also acted as Administrator in the Yarram and Foster Parishes with the help of the two assistant priests of Leongatha supplying for Mass at weekend. Congratulations to all involved, for a splendid weekend.







# LEADERS' DAY

# THE FIRST PHONE CALL FROM HEAVEN Mitch Ablom

The author of *Tuesdays with Morrie* has again enchanted us with a story about mysterious phone calls from Heaven, from deceased relatives to their loved ones and the effect on the town of Coldwater. A book I just had to finished to discover the end.

I would say that this book will have different effects on different people, exactly as described in the book!

#### THE TIME KEEPER by Mitch Ablom

Another unusual from this excellent writer. In this book he looks at our obsession with time and by using the character Father Time helps us to realize how this affects our lives and relationships with others.

#### **EXCEPT IN OBEDIENCE Marie Crowley**

Another intriguing book by the author of *Women of the Vale*. Here she gives the history of the Josephites who worked in the Ballarat Diocese staffing the tiny schools of Bungaree, Dunnston, Dunnolly and Creswick during the late 19th Century and early 20th. A great researcher, Marie picks ups the hardships of that time and the isolation the Sisters felt, which brought about hard but wise decisions. Available at the Heritage Centre \$24.95

The story of three students in Germany who were arrested and executed for distributing leaflets telling the true story of what was happening in the war. Sophie was truly a Christ-like figure and the film is of the last six days of her life, most of it depicting the interrogation by a police officer, whom she challenged about what the Nazi system was doing to Germany.

#### DAYS FOR GIRLS-AUSTRALIA

This is an international charity helping women in developing countries regain dignity through meeting the need for appropriate, reusable feminine hygiene.

During their days in the month these girls don't go to school as they have nothing to use, and sometimes don't return to school. Over a period of three years they can miss eight months of schooling. So the purpose is to give them re-usable items so that they do not miss school.

The items are placed in a drawstring bag and include flannel liners, panties, safety pins, washcloth and zip lock bags. The items are sewn by those involved and collected to be sent away. Each kit is meant to last for three years.
