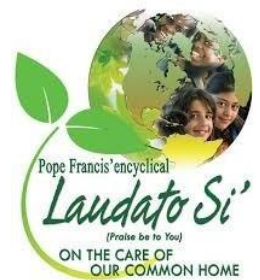

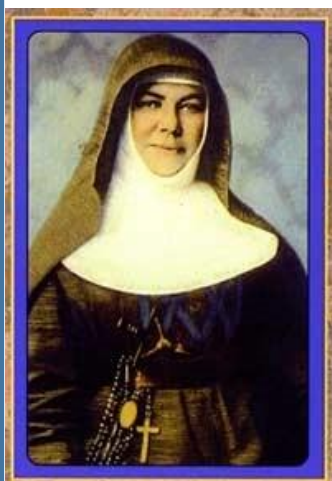

Reflection - Fr Julian Tenison Woods

Anniversary of Death 7th October 1889

Father Julian Tenison Woods as a young English born priest was sent to a Parish with an area of 22,000 square miles encasing the districts of Penola and Mt Gambier. He spent much of his time travelling on horseback ministering to his flock. In 1860 he met Mary MacKillop, who was working as a Governess at her uncle's sheep station just out of Penola.

Julian Tenison Woods was a man filled with the fire of his love for God. This God he found, not only in the Church and the people he served, but in the very rocks, trees, plants, and animals of our world The whole of creation.

The sacred essence at the heart of all life fascinated Julian. He spent many hours exploring, examining and explaining the wondrous, newly-discovered Australian world which he had made his own. As well as his scientific, musical, and academic pursuits, Julian shared a passion to provide a Catholic Education for the children of the poor. And together with Mary, in 1866, at Penola, they founded the Sisters of Saint Joseph, dedicated to providing a Catholic education for the children of the poor.

Together Julian and Mary developed an organized system of Catholic education with schools staffed by the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Following the Co Founding of the Federation Sisters of St Joseph with Mary MacKillop, Julian founded the St Joseph Federation Sisters and the Sisters of Perpetual Adoration.

Father Julian Tenison Woods remained Mary's Spiritual Director, Friend and Confidante for many years,

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and St Francis of Assisi

According to the website of St Francis Church, Melbourne, Mary MacKillop, as she was then, was Baptised in the church. She also made her First Communion there and was Confirmed. St. Francis church was the Catholic Cathedral of Melbourne before St Patrick's Cathedral was built. From the evidence of the records, it was also Mary's parish Church.

Like St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, St Francis of Assisi was a practical person. He was a Deacon of the church, not a priest, and was what is known as a Mendicant (wandering) friar who preached to the poor. A quote often attributed to Francis, which is questioned by many scholars, is "Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words." In other words, preach by your actions. From what is known of St Francis, it would be wrong to suggest that he did not verbally preach and teach. For this reason, the scholars previously mentioned usually say the quote comes from the

Franciscan Rule itself.

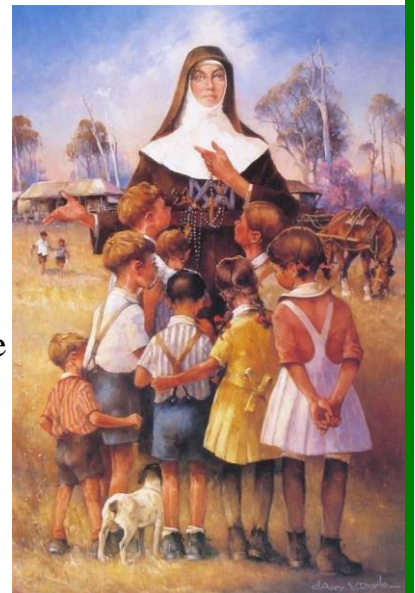


All the brothers, however, should preach by their deeds." (The Earlier Rule: Chap XVII, 3) And: I also admonish and exhort these brothers that, in their preaching, their words be well chosen and chaste... in a discourse that is brief, because it was in few words that the Lord preached while on earth." (The Later Rule: Chapter IX, 3)

In these examples of the rule, the spirit of St Francis's attitude toward evangelization is clear. We evangelize not only in what we say, but through the fullness of the Gospel in our lives.

Fellow Companions, you may be wondering why I am writing about St Francis in the Josephite newsletter. It is because I think that St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and St Francis have much in common. Mary put these same sentiments into action within the Josephite Order. When Mary said, "Never see a need without doing something about it," she was doing what St Francis had advocated six centuries earlier: preaching with her actions.

Mary's schools were places of verbal evangelisation and places of academic learning. They were also places of action. There are many stories of Mary and her Sisters acting out their Christian faith with the poor. The children of the poor were not only educated but they were often fed, clothed, and housed. Another example is the "MacKillop Walk", in Melbourne, which highlights several buildings where Mary cared for the impoverished of the city.

Wicking Beds for St Joseph's By The Sea

A Wicking Bed is an agricultural irrigation system devised by Australian inventor, Colin Austin.

In the gardens at our Centre in Williamstown, we have wicking beds and because they work well and grow wonderful produce we have decided to add to them,

We are immensely grateful for the support of you, the Josephite Companions, in obtaining some new containers.



Why use Wicking Beds?

For us: this agricultural irrigation system

- 1 Saves water
- 2 Utilises the garden where it is perfect for growing veggies, but we have found it difficult because of the trees and bushes spreading around and needing the nutrients from the soil.
- 3 We didn't want to remove the trees and bushes as they become companions that supports bees and other beneficial insects and birds.
- 4 Helps bring diversity to the garden.
- 5 Increases our capacity to grow more home-grown food for use in our centre.
- 6 Plan is to use these as a teaching program to encourage others.

How does a Wicking Bed work?

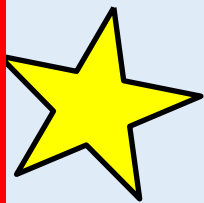


They are basically containers with water reservoirs at the base - like a giant self-watering pot. **Moisture is drawn up through the soil via a process called capillary action or wicking.** This allows moisture to be more evenly distributed through the soil, creating better growing conditions for the plants

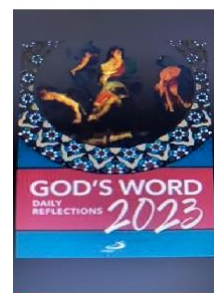
