I wish you were with me, for I could I am sure interest you and it would be an immense relief to have anyone who could enjoy with me what it pleases me so much to discover or observe. And all the while I am giving a most successful mission<sup>v</sup> which I have received 18 converts into the church. Is not our dear Lord good to me?

I hope Mrs. Archer and Gracie are quite well. It will be such a pleasure to me to see them and all again if only for a few days. We will if you like go into the question of the Polyzoa and publish our joint paper.<sup>vi</sup> A line any time within a week or so will be time enough to answer this. I enclose a cryptogamic puzzle.<sup>vii</sup> The name I will give you when I see you. Mount it for the microscope.

God bless you and may the blessing of the S. Heart attend you all this New Year.

<sup>iv</sup> Rev. William Webb Spicer (1820-79) educated at Oxford (B.A., 1843; M.A., 1848) was rector at Harts before coming to Tasmania in 1874. As well as writing on botany and economic etymology for the *Proceedings of Royal Society of Tasmania*, Spicer in 1878 published the meritorious *Handbook of the Plants of Tasmania*. A Fellow of the Royal Society of Tasmania from 1875, he was elected Member of the Council in 1877 and was made a Corresponding Member on his departure from the Colony in March, 1878. After his return to England with his health failing, he became Rector of Itchen Abbas near Winchester. (A.D.B. 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<sup>vi</sup> Julian mentions the possibility of a joint paper with Archer on the Bryozoa (Polyzoa) as early as 28<sup>th</sup> November, 1863 (the first extant letter to Archer) but no such papers appear to have been published.

<sup>vii</sup> An early classification of the plant kingdom divided it into Phanerogamae (all flowering plants) and Cryptogamae (all non-flowering plants). Hence the "cryptogamic puzzle" could have been a moss, a liverwort, a fern or a conifer, etc.

<sup>viii</sup> Archbishop J.A. Goold — Archer writing to Goold in Rome had been at pains to stress the virtues of Julian, who was spending some time with him en route to Tasmania "We are greatly edified by his daily life at our house ... He seems to have grown wonderfully in the spiritual life" 22.6.74.
