Another Look at Christmas

When a story is as familiar to us as the Christmas story, we don't really pay attention to the details. The Christmas card image – a cherubic baby in a spotless manger, surrounded by adoring parents, shepherds, angels and wise men – is probably the image most of us have in our minds.

In reality, the story is about an unmarried mother, her fiancé who chooses to support her, both forced to make the long journey to Bethlehem in the last weeks of Mary's pregnancy because they are living in an occupied country and the Romans have demanded a census. When they arrive, Mary is having her first contractions so they know they need to find a place to stay quickly but "there is no room at the inn". The kindly innkeeper lets them bed down in the stable, and those of you who live in rural areas will know that stables can be messy, smelly places – not like the Christmas card picture! Sometime after the baby is born, they are forced to flee to Egypt – refugees in a strange land where they have no friends or family – and stay there for some years until the coast

is clear and they can return to their home town of Nazareth.

Have you ever wondered how Joseph coped with all this? He possibly had to put up with questions, maybe even ridicule from his family and friends when Mary became pregnant. Then he had to organize the long journey to Bethlehem, provide for mother and baby until they could travel, and somehow find work to sustain the family in Egypt until it was safe for them to go home. Joseph was a man who trusted in the dream – God's dream for a world where justice and compassion meet. Read Matthew Chapter 1, verses 18-25.

Blessed Mary MacKillop was another person who trusted in God's dream by working for and with the poor, the disadvantaged, the refugee, the homeless, the unmarried mother. In 1874 she wrote "God will not fail you, no matter how much you may be tried".
