Mary MacKillop Pilgrimage 2008

Finally, after many years, my dream was realised when I stepped on board the Virgin Blue Flight due for Sydney and the start of an epic adventure to take part in the Mary MacKillop Pilgrimage. Thirty nine pilgrims from all over Australia, New Zealand and even Italy were the participants. We began our journey at Mount Street with a get to know you session. The four Sisters guiding our way, Sisters Genevieve Carroll, Margaret Knagge, Therese Leyden and Marie Foale were an absolute delight. Nothing fazed them (on the surface anyway).

Once the introductions were over we were split into 2 groups, one listening to the history behind the pilgrimage and Mary MacKillop and the other visiting Mary MacKillop Place and the tomb. We swapped over later in the day and then finished the day with a visit to the Rocks and other interesting places visited by the Sisters.

Two days later we flew to Melbourne and from there boarded a bus which took us to Adelaide via the Great Ocean Road, Mount Gambia and Penola. Every day was filled with more of the life and times of this great woman, Mary MacKillop. Sitting on the bus was a pilgrimage in itself because we were travelling in the footsteps of Mary MacKillop.

Sometimes we touched a doorknob she touched, or drank from Julian Tenison's Chalice, from which she drank. We even sat in the Chapel where she was excommunicated and walked through the same door she left by after her excommunication. I was blessed too when my Powerpoint Presentation on Mary MacKillop was shown in the Church at Penola. Everything about the Pilgrimage was a journey of faith.

There were many miracles on this journey and many faith-filled moments, not least when the Associates renewed their pledge to the Movement and when the Sisters, about half of the group, renewed their vows.

This was a journey I would encourage everyone to make, at least once in their life. The memories are indelibly marked into the tapestry of my life now and I thank God for the friends I made, the journey accomplished and the miracle of coming even closer to that great woman of Australia, Mary MacKillop.

Mary MacKillop Corner

Mary MacKillop's mother was Flora Hannah MacDonald who was born in Fort William, the major town of the area in which the MacDonald glen was situated – the area known as Lochaber. (One of the Conference rooms at Mary MacKillop Place bears this name.)

Her father Donald McDonald was the proprietor of the Ben Nevis Hotel in Fort William at the time.

Ben Nevis, the highest mountain in Scotland, is a popular place for tourists today. In July each year hundreds of hikers come to Fort William to climb Ben Nevis as it is more accessible in the summer time. In some ways Fort William (a military name) is a misnomer for this town which is situated on a beautiful loch among the mountains of the area. Those people who remember learning about the Caledonian Canal which links all these lochs



will have some idea of the area. Loch Ness is the second loch up in the series of lochs which the Canal joins.

Flora had two brothers, Donald and Alexander. Her mother and the three children left Scotland for Australia in

December 1839. During the difficult steam ship journey to Australia, Alexander died of typhoid fever. The remainder of the family arrived in Melbourne in April 1840 and in July 1940, Flora MacDonald and Alexander MacKillop were married. Flora's father, Donald did not arrive in Australia until April 1842. Mary MacKillop was devoted to this grandfather who played a major part in her childhood years.

This Autumn, let us pause and allow the falling leaves to remind us of the call to be vulnerable, the call to be open to the possibility of being hurt, the call to accept and to grow from the daily dyings of our days and to love as Jesus loved.

Go for a walk in the forest or just down the street if you have some trees nearby whose leaves have turned. Let your heart roam through leaves. Think thoughts of vulnerability. Pick up a leaf. Take it home with you. Place it somewhere where you will see it often. Let it remind you of the call to be vulnerable.

Take time to browse through a Gospel. Note all the times that Jesus opened himself to hurt and misunderstanding. Allow yourself to be a bit more open and vulnerable to someone whom you love. Surrender yourself a bit more to God's power working through you. Let Autumn be a time when the value of vulnerability is strengthened in your life.
