With my daughter Rebecca, clinging nervously to my left arm and the haunting tones of the Irish uilleann pipes playing "Canon in D minor", we turned into the isle at St Michael's Church for the short walk to the altar where I presented her to her soon to be husband, Simon Dimopoulos. It seemed that family and friends not only filled every pew and standing space in the little country church at Sandy Creek but spirits of ancestors from generations past were present in every corner. This emotional moment was a fitting culmination to years of research into the beginning of our McMahon family in Australia.

On a visit to my aunt Frances in Lismore NSW during 2004, I started asking questions as to where our family came from. I knew they were from Ireland, came to Australia and settled in Victoria but that was about the extent of my knowledge about them, whoever they were. My father Pat, was only 53 years old when he passed away in 1979 and I was second of six boys, living at Glen Innes. There never seemed to be time to discuss things such as this, nor did it seem important.

Frances found a couple of old photographs and documents and was able to tell me that my great grandfather John McMahon aged about 14 came from County Clare in Ireland accompanied by his older sister Catherine and settled at Sandy Creek, near Beechworth in Victoria. Another thing that she recalled was that there was a church at Sandy Creek with a brass plate below the XII Station of the Cross dedicated to John and Mary McMahon, my great grandparents.

Some months after my visit to Lismore, my brother Kevin was to attend a work related conference in Wodonga Victoria, very close to the rural area of Sandy Creek. I loaded him up with a map and some rough directions and sent him on a mission . . . to find the Sandy Creek church. After a 40k drive in the country, he found the church. It stands very prominently on a hill and can be seen for miles.

As he wandered around the outside of the church, wondering what to do next, he was approached by a local farmer from across the road who enquired what his business was at

the church and was then directed back down the road a few hundred yards to a farmhouse where he would find people who "might be able to give you some useful information".

After passing customary pleasantries, Kevin found himself being introduced to John and Teresa Wright. John, grandson of Ellen McMahon (eldest daughter of John and Mary) - "Jackpot". The start of many frantic phone calls and the beginning of a treasured relationship that would produce much more than family history.

My wife Christine and I have since had several stays with John and Teresa at their Sandy Creek farm and Teresa, "keeper of old documents and photos in archival hatbox", has produced enough hard copy to compile a family history including photographs of all but one McMahon family member.

Briefly, John McMahon escaped the potato famine in Ireland, sailed to Australia around 1858, filed a gold fossicking claim at Sandy Creek where he and his new Australian born bride, Mary McGrath raised a family of eleven children. Three of the boys, James, John and Tom served in WWI. Sadly two of the brothers, James and John, were killed in action in France, their bodies never to be found. Tom returned to Sandy Creek and replaced their original slab hut with a new weatherboard house which has been the McMahon and descendant families' home to this very day.

My grandfather Michael, was refused enlistment to serve in WWI as there were already three brothers from his family enlisted. He joined NSW police and was posted to

Moree in northwest NSW, where he married and also raised a family of eleven, one of whom is my father Patrick. They eventually moved to Inverell and finally Glen Innes where several of my aunts and uncles, my brothers and I as well as some of our five children were educated by the Sisters at St Josephs.

It is now 2009, Rebecca and Simon have begun the daunting task of trying to organise their wedding in Melbourne. They had never met our "new rellies" at Sandy Creek and so to coincide with a trip my son Daniel and I were making, decided to meet us at Beechworth where John and Teresa Wright would also come and join us for dinner. John suggested we travel to Sandy Creek next morning where we could all attend Mass at Sandy Creek church. After Mass while standing in the magnificent autumn sunshine, talking with the locals, John casually said to Rebecca, "This would be a great place for you and Simon to be married." The seed was sown and so on 20th March 2010 Rebecca (radiantly adorned in the sixty year old wedding gown made by her grandmother, Frances Knox, for her own wedding in 1950) and Simon, surrounded by 140 family and friends, were married.

John Wright commented to me outside the church, "We'll never see anything like this again at Sandy Creek in our life time."

Perhaps it is just a new beginning.



"Blessings" What are they? To bless is not so much to make sacred, as it is to acknowledge the sacredness that is already there. All of creation is sacred because it is made by God. To bless anything of creation...is to acknowledge the touch of the Creator on that person or object. Wherever we place our feet – wherever we are – can be a blessing if we are aware of the inherent sacredness and beauty of that place"

"One practice that has helped to reawaken my gratitude, when my thankfulness has grown lean, is to take one of my five senses each day and be attentive to it. One day I notice all sounds that I hear, another day I pay close attention to everything I see... Doing this helps me to move out of my tired approach to life. I restore my alertness to my daily gifts and begin again to see the universe as one vast blessing."

Take a few minutes to reflect quietly

Generous God, you have poured so much into our lives. You have offered us many graces, moments filled with wonders of your goodness. You have been bountiful, in sharing your unconditional love with us.

All-embracing God, you call us to share compassion with those who are searching, suffering and sorely in need of our hospitality. You daily invite us to be in union with all those you have gifted with life.

Healing God, you know how our lives each have their share of heartaches and brokenness. You see the deepest recesses of our spirits where pain and confusion need the touch of your restoring power. Remind us often that broken hearts can be healed and gifted by you.
