## A Reflection on Mary's Canonisation by Dora Cavuoto

At the time of her canonisation, how will we recall and celebrate Mary MacKillop's life? After the 31<sup>st</sup> October, what will we do to remember her life within our community?

Sr Catherine Clarke rsj led a very



passionate and informative session on the 18<sup>th</sup> July, where she challenged everyone in the room to consider deeply the impact of Mary MacKillop: *prophet or empire builder*?

What is being proclaimed? What is sainthood about?

A prophet gives a new face to the people of who is Church in a time of crisis.

When we reflected on Mark's Gospel (8: 27-30) "Who do people say I am? Who do you say I am?" we considered the changing attitudes and the eternal values that spring forth from the change in mission – the structures that enabled the revelation of the message.

Hence, the canonisation is about the communication of the message "Christ as the prophet among people." Mary MacKillop had her eye on God with action for humanity. It enabled us to recall Mary's life to respond to her spirit.

We recalled some significant events throughout her life and the manner in which this saintly woman responded to the needs of her time to bring about some extraordinary changes and accomplish much for the Catholic Church and education in Australia.

As explained by Sr Catherine,

"Let us come to Eucharist or the lives of our holy men and women not just to recall, let us come so that we may **re-member** (to relive, put together again, re-enliven) the spirit of Mary MacKillop in our lives in our world."

Briefly, this amazing and inspiring spirit of Mary MacKillop was to reveal:

- ★ a compassionate God present in ordinary circumstances
- ★ a God to all people, especially the poor, marginalised and isolated
- ★ a spirit of humility, simplicity and practical response

Therefore, the ministry of being and serving, educating and caring become paramount to empower people "in all things love". This leads to actions that inspire confidence and empowerment, through the development of knowledge and skills.

What are the road signs in our world today?
Who is the God image?
To whom is God imaged?
In what spirit is God imaged?
Through what actions is God imaged?

We recall, remember and respond.

Re-member through believing in a kind, compassionate heart and the unconditional love of a provident God and thereby doing the Will of God in the ordinary circumstances of life. The gifts of education and partnership are not just for the betterment of the individual but embracing all. Therefore, let us come to *re-member* not just recall the spirit of Mary MacKillop in our lives and world.



MMK After attending the 10.30am Mass followed by a delicious morning tea, a group of Associates visited the Mary MacKillop Centre on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> May to listen to a very informative talk on the early work of charity which began in Adelaide by Mary MacKillop and her Sisters.

Sr Patricia Keane rsj spoke about one of the first works of charity being the care of orphans and neglected children. The first Orphanage of St Vincent de Paul was in Walkerville for boys and the girls went to the Boston Cottages in Franklin Street.

The Sisters also visited the Adelaide Gaol and the Government Destitute Asylum which led to the idea of establishing a House of Providence. It was an open house for poor homeless women of all ages.

Other charities included Refuges for unmarried mothers, delinquent girls and alcoholics. The latter being the Solitude established at St John's, a country village near Kapunda. This was later transferred to Glenelg and from there to Norwood.

I would highly recommend a visit to the Centre to see the display and to talk to Sr Pat who we thank for her great work and vast knowledge of Mary MacKillop.

St Joseph's Providence at 32 West Terrace with some of the residents ca 1910. The Catholic Church bought this house in 1905 and it remained a House of Providence until 1951.

### A Woman With An Open Heart

**From the pen of Mary MacKillop:** Make no reserves with God. Reject no-one. You never know what grace can do. 1871

**Scripture:** Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today. *Luke 19:5* 

**Reflection:** Mary MacKillop brought the message of human dignity to all whom she encountered. She held in reverence each person about whom she spoke even those who had caused her great pain. Sr Mechtilde recalls how 'if anyone came to her in trouble and distress, she would encourage and help them and draw the good that was in them out'. Stories abound of how people responded to her presence.

**Story from the life of Mary MacKillop:** Mother Mary taught by her example. I remember how once an eccentric old gentleman was to be tended – being unable to care for himself. Mother instructed the Sisters to brush and comb his hair and long beard. Oh, our repugnance. And seeing it, Mother herself lovingly and gently did it all and then took him elsewhere for further attention leaving us humbled and ashamed. (Sr Anne Joseph Waters)

Pause for reflection: With whom is God inviting me to keep an open heart?

**Prayer:** God of tenderness, you call all to share in your Trinity of Love. May we, like Mary MacKillop, open our hearts to all whom we encounter this day. Blessed Mary of the Cross, defending human dignity, pray for us.

**Action:** Be open to the stranger who comes into your life today.
