The day after the Canonisation, we attended a special Mass, for all Australians, offered by the Archbishops of Australia. We were also shown around Rome by Archbishop Wilson.



## Hank's Story as told to Terry McDonald



Hank Dee was born on the 31<sup>st</sup> December 1938 in Tanunda, SA during one of the biggest heatwaves our country has known. Maybe this was a sign because there were times when Hank's life was not easy.

From there his family travelled to a small town called Stone Hut and sadly, at the age of six, Hank's mother died leaving his father to care for three little boys while still trying to earn a living. Hank's father tried desperately to keep them all together as well as giving them the faith he so loved. Hank remembers going to summer school in Peterborough with the Sisters of St Joseph and making his First Communion.

As things became more difficult his father placed the boys in the Good Samaritan Orphanage at Crystal Brook. Hank remembers the Sisters being very kind but always feeling hungry. He stole a cake one day because the temptation was so great.

The family later moved to Adelaide where the children went to Boys Town. When his father remarried the boys returned home and went to school at Christian Brothers College.

Hank worked at G. R. Wills for a number of years and during this time met and married his wife Jenny who also followed the Catholic faith. The couple had 5 children while running a very successful business. Life seemed good but alas their marriage failed and the couple parted.

This was the start of a very bleak and unhappy period in Hank's life. It seemed as if he had almost lost his faith – he became angry and disturbed and was also diagnosed with Rheumatoid Arthritis. However, with the help of God and the faith his father had given him, Hank started to find his way again. Soon after on the 15<sup>th</sup> July 2004, his oldest daughter and her husband became the proud parents of a little boy called Max Saul Price.

Max was born with Dyskinetic Cerebral Palsy, the same condition with which Christy Brown, the Irishman, had been diagnosed. Christy was the one who wrote "My Left Foot," which later became a movie.


Hank did not hesitate. He moved to Adelaide to be near his family so that he could help out with baby Max. Until then, Hank says he had no idea about Mary MacKillop. Someone introduced him to her, thinking prayers to her may help little Max. Today Hank is one of Mary MacKillop's greatest devotees. His faith and love of Mary have brought peace, joy and grace to him despite his and Max's illhealth.

Max is unable to stand, walk, use his hands or sit up without support, and must be fed through a tube. Max suffers from seizures and has been in the Childrens Hospital countless times. He is a delightful looking child who rarely stops smiling. Anyone who knows him loves him. Max now goes to school and his progress, despite his problems, is remarkable. His parents must have been chosen by God because no child could have better.

Hank has made a life around Max and his other 5 grandsons. Max is soon to have a little brother and a new little cousin.

Hank must have pleased God and our own St Mary of the Cross MacKillop despite the rough spots he has experienced.

I simply ask all who read this story to remember Max, his parents and grandparents including Hank, and all his helpers in your prayers.

### MEETING PRAYER & REFLECTION

We continue with the series of reflections from Sr Monica Cavanagh rsj "Praying from the Heart – A Reflection with Mary MacKillop for each day of the week" for Associates to use at Associate gatherings or to use for personal prayer. We will present this starting point for meetings and hope this format may be useful.



#### Gathering

Leader: We welcome one another as Associates and friends of Mary MacKillop.

#### From the Pen of Mary MacKillop

Leader: Mary's words are an inspiration to all who have read her many letters. She writes in 1890: *"I entreat you, my dearly loved ones to forgive from your hearts."* 

Let us take some time to think about these words.

What does Mary mean? In what way did Mary show forgiveness to those who had hurt or wronged her in some way? Do I forgive others – some of the time?....all of the time? How do I show this? Do I forgive myself?

(Some quiet time to reflect)

#### Scripture

Leader: We listen to God's Word. A reading from Luke 6:37 *Forgive and you will be forgiven.* (Silence to ponder God's Word)

#### Reflection

Leader: Mary MacKillop was a woman who held no grudges. It was painful at times for her to forgive those who had harmed her. She wrote to some of the Sisters who had spoken untruths about her: *I excuse and with all a mothers' heart I forgive. Forgive from your heart any Sister who has pained you.' 1890.* To the priest who had been the main cause of her excommunication she wrote: *I forgive him; I forgive all who had any part in these matters.' 1871* 

### Story from the Life of Mary MacKillop

Leader: Mary MacKillop was teaching in Portland. One day the inspector arrived at the school. The headmaster, Mr Cusack, rearranged all the classes. He took the students from Mary's and Annie's classes who were well taught and gave his poorly performing students to them. Mary's father heard of this injustice and went to see Mr Cusack. The outcome of this encounter was that they both lost their teaching positions. Years later, when Mary was in Sydney, she met a dirty, alcoholic tramp whom she recognized as her former headmaster Mr Cusack. She sold her watch so that she could provide him with clothes and care.

#### **Pause for Reflection**

Leader: Who are the people in my life that God is inviting me to forgive at this time?

#### Prayer

Leader: We gather our reflections and stories, and place these before our God. Let us pray together:

ALL: God of mercy, you are always ready to forgive us and bring healing into our lives. Like Mary MacKillop may our hearts be ready to forgive those who have hurt us. Amen. St Mary of the Cross, forgiving all who hurt you, pray for us.

#### Action

Leader: Let us think about what action we could take from our discussions and reflections today. For example, hold in your heart before God someone whom you need to forgive. Allow God to speak to your hurt. *(We share our ideas)* 

#### News

Take some time to discuss the Newsletter items and any group projects.
