Dear Associates,
As I begin these few words to you in these cold days of winter I am aware that many of you have lost either a friend or family member or know of someone who has experienced the same in death. I am especially sensitive to your human grieving. The hidden but real pain nestled within the heart of us who are left behind: no longer free to hold the human one we loved, touch their hand, smile into their eyes, share laughter or simply wipe away a tear. Let us take a moment to be with each other. Let us be comfortable whatever feelings we may evoke. Let us be who we are in our sorrow for only then, in time, will we truly rejoice in faith that they are now in eternity with our God. To stand quietly and reverently beside one who is in human grief is a rare privilege -- silence is your embrace.

When you are ready, let's take our cuppa, and move into another few moments with our God. He knows us: He has called us by Name!

Bathing in memories of what or who has been is important. They are segments which put us into our now. I love the Gospel story of Jesus going to the mountain top to pause and ponder over the beautiful city of Jerusalem and its people -- whom He loved. How fortunate are we who were born to 'make manifest the glory of God that is within' simply by being a child of God. So, how are you travelling? What aspect of God's love are you radiating in your life today? Sometimes we are unaware, most times in fact, for our relationship with our God is who we are. God is, as St Paul reminds us through his writings, the one 'in whom we live and breathe and move and indeed have our being'.

In March of this year, when we gathered at Baulkham Hills to reflectively uncover what charism and spirituality are to us as Josephite Associates in today's world, it was evident that local JA groups impact deeply on others within the community. *'There where you are you will find God'* (MMK)

Our facilitator, Christina Neunzerling, a Josephite Sister, invited and walked with us as we journeyed into a personal, individual recognition of who we are becoming: we were constantly moving into degrees of eventual ownership of our JA charism.

St Mary MacKillop was able to touch so many people's lives and effect changes never seen before. Why? Among other things she listened '...to the whispers of God in her heart!' The understanding of God's whispers is unveiled in our daily lives: usually they form the *why* of our lives! Nietzsche believed: 'He/she who has a why to live for can bear almost any how'. This is life and living. We are always acting and living within some context or situation of life. Doing it with our God enables an inner strength to move us on or into it all.

At this, our time in history as the Josephite Associates in New South Wales, members are yearning for an effusion of the Spirit. Whenever he intervenes, the Spirit always leaves us in wonder. He gives rise to events, the newness of which radically changes history. (Lumen Gentium, n. 12). Each day the Gospel is what we seek to live. What are the stories we are creating as we work together to ensure our future?

In our March Newsletter we touched on enlightenment. Let us be brave and move into awareness. What is it? While descriptions vary, I believe it is essentially always awakening to that which we haven't seen yet or heard or noticed. To me it's the silent space between a deliberate head and heart response. It is always a new journey beginning. It is a process of translating what is in the head to what is in the heart so that the centre of our understanding of truth emerges with clarity and, most importantly, truth. Real awareness flows essentially from inner wisdom. Much of the process of awareness is an inner activity which operates in the moment. Some have described it as 'an intelligence system that is not based in the past or in the future but in the moment: now.' Sometimes it is listening to what is and seeing with awareness what is beyond the expression of what is stated and shared.

Jesus told us many stories which invite us into this level of awareness. It's an invitation to unwrap the obvious so that the image fades and the integrity of what is shines through. That, I believe, my JA friends and members, is our current challenge. Life is ceaseless in discovery. Life is movement.

May the journey you begin in your new tomorrow, ever remind you of those who have touched the tissues of your life.

n Sunday 13th March, four Far North Coast JAs set out for Baulkham Hills for the Leadership Gathering: Frances Raisch, Silvana Smith and I (from the Mullumbimby/Byron Bay/Bangalow Group) and Elaine Bullman (from the Lismore Group). Rosemary Davis was to have accompanied us, but was unable to do so at the last minute. My husband Ron dutifully drove us to Ballina, where we caught the 10.45 a.m. plane to Sydney. Upon arrival at Mascot, we proceeded by train to North Sydney to meet up with our beloved Margaret Keane rsj, who until Christmas had been our leader for the past 14 years. We spent a pleasant hour or so with her, praying at the tomb of St Mary of the Cross, catching up over a cuppa and perusing the gift shop attached to the museum, before boarding the train again, this time bound for Seven Hills. Due to track work, the train terminated at Strathfield, so we boarded a bus to Parramatta, where we were once again back on the train and two stops later, arrived at Seven Hills. A taxi then delivered us to St Joseph's House of Spirituality, Baulkham Hills. Our 'trains, planes and automobiles' expedition had delivered us safely to our destination around 5 p.m.

I have been asked to write a report on the Gathering, and what transpired over the next day and a half. Remember the words from that 1960s film To Sir with Love, where it says 'How do you thank someone who has taken you from crayons to perfume?' Well, Christina Neunzerling rsj, our facilitator, certainly took us on that journey from 'crayons to perfume'! The title of the Gathering was Spirituality and Charism Mary MacKillop and it was one of those very special events that come along once in a while that you never want to end!

JAs travelled from all over the State to attend. We came from Ouirindi, Lalor Park, Lakemba, Seven Hills, North Sydney, Blacktown, Boambee, Warialda, Penrith, North Leichardt, Campsie, Canberra, Penshurst, and many other places - a total of 46 participants. This was the first time any of our country group had made the trek to 'the big smoke' as Associates, apart from the beatification celebrations in 1995.

Lenihan rsj, from Congregational Leadership team, and Mary Quinlan rsj, the NSW Provincial, spent the first day of the Gathering with



us and participated in our sessions.

Mary MacKillop was our constant companion during this Gathering, with many quotes from her abundant writings and stories from her life, interspersed through out the sessions. I mused at how lucky we are to have all this abundance of written information about her and her life to draw on. Today with all our modern technologies, we tend not to write, but make a quick phone call, send off an email, or write a text message, etc. So how much will survive of what we say and think, for future generations to remember us, let alone be inspired by?

After a welcome from our Transitional Leader, Clare Noonan rsj, and an acknowledgment of the original owners of the land, Christina opened the Gathering with a hymn and a prayer. She began by reminding us that as Josephites, whether Religious or Associates, we all belong to the one family and so we all try to live the same spirituality of our foundress, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. She then asked us to think about just what it is that inspires us in Mary's story and spirituality. Some of the answers came back: her ordinariness, her courage, her kindness, her sense of justice, her compassion, her ability to forgive, her complete trust in God. Christina then explored the meaning of spirituality with us and how the word is derived from the Latin spirare, meaning to breathe, and how spirituality is of the very essence of what it is to be human and not simply something extra tacked onto our humanity. We explored with her how where we have come from. our family stories, our culture, the sayings, symbols and rituals of our families, all help shape our spirituality. It goes without saying that, as Christians, our spirituality, like the spirituality of Mary MacKillop, is foremost Gospel based.

We then investigated the word charism. What is it? What does it look like? What does it feel like? What does it sound like? Many of us had never really thought too hard about what a charism is, so found the task a little daunting. By the end of the session we all knew that we each have a charism, which we often don't recognise, but which others do, and that by recognising and encouraging each other to use our Josephite charisms, we keep the vision of Mary MacKillop alive. Christina spoke of a charism as being a God-given gift -- given through the Spirit to us, bringing with it both the gift and the ability to use the gift for the good of the community -- and how we use these gifts to carry out the mission of Jesus, to bring about the reign of God (Love) 'on earth as it is in heaven'.

We also looked at the relationship between theology and our spirituality and how the public, private and interpersonal arenas of our lives integrate our theology through our lived spirituality and how Mary MacKillop lived out her spirituality in all three of these arenas. The public arena, through social action for justice wherever she saw a need; the private arena, through her personal prayer and contemplation; and the interpersonal arena, through the love and kindness she expressed to her family and her community of Sisters. We looked at this in relation to the Congregational Scripture, 'This is what Yahweh asks of you, only this, to act justly, to love tenderly, to walk humbly with your God' (Micah 6:8).

Christina quoted Elizabeth Johnson: 'The goal (of a healthy spirituality for these times) is ultimately a renewed Christian community in service to the world according to the vibrant life-giving spirit of Christ, and a transformed society of mutuality and compassionate respect, both among human beings and between human beings and the earth.'

Christina also explored Mary MacKillop as mystic, defining a mystic as one who is constantly aware of the presence of the Divine within the mystery of everyday life. Mary certainly was that, as is evidenced by her many sayings; e.g., 'There, where you are, you will find God'; 'God gave me such a sense of His wonderful presence'; 'God's love is too deep for words to express'; 'I felt nearer to God than I ever felt before'; 'See the hand of God in all that happens'; 'Let us be entirely for God'; 'See the beauty of God'.

As Josephites, Christina put into context our commitment to God through the following of Christ in the spirit of our founders Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods, which urges us to live our Josephite charism authentically and in new ways that respond to the challenges of this time, remembering that central to our identity and charism is our service to those people who are without real choices and completely destroyed or abandoned in some way.

We ended the day with private reflection time entitled "Listen to the Whisperings of God in your Heart" (Mary MacKillop).

St Joseph's House of Spirituality is a beautiful, restful place in the middle of suburban Baulkham Hills. Although it is surrounded by private homes and roads, set back off the road as it is, with vast grounds and beautiful gardens, it's like you are in the countryside surrounded by trees and birds. The rooms are five-star and the facilities and meals excellent. At times it seemed that every time we turned around we were being offered food! The evening meal was followed by a singalong, led by the multi talented Christina, on her guitar. The night ended with table trivia, with all questions being about different aspects of Mary MacKillop's life. After much merriment and protests, a winner was decided and chocolates won. In true Josephite spirit, they were shared among all the participants. Such was the level of competitiveness, that protests over question 2 (What names were given to Mary when she was baptised on the 28.2.1842?) were still being debated over breakfast the next morning!

Day two saw us looking at the 'nuts and bolts' of JAs, with regard to how to apply what we had discussed the previous day to our local group situations. We were asked to identify our gifts; what we do well and enjoy; what we do not do well and yet enjoy; what we do not enjoy and do well; what we do not do well and don't enjoy either. We then shared our answers

with the group. Our discussion then turned to leadership as a dynamic in the group, as opposed to the old model of leadership from the top down, and how good leadership delegates and shares responsibility amongst the members according to their gifts and talents. We also discussed embracing change and the need to be continually changing in order to grow. Which reminded me of the quote from Cardinal Newman from our recent newsletter, 'To live is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often'.



All in all the Gathering was simply fantastic! Christina was an amazing facilitator: she sang beautifully; played the guitar brilliantly; her prayer reflections were both uplifting and inspiring; she has a wonderful sense of humour; she engaged everyone present to participate in all aspects of her presentations; she enthralled us with her stories about New Zealand and life at Baulkham Hills as a novice; she was so full of joy and enthusiasm, that it was impossible not to be drawn in too. Her knowledge and her ability to share her faith were simply amazing. Her ability to pluck quotes of all sorts 'out of the air' was mind blowing. Some that stay with me are: 'Be the change you wish to see in the world'; 'We are not called to be successful, just faithful'; 'Remember the theology of abundance - what you have is enough'; 'Remember...respect for human dignity'; 'Becoming...embracing change leads to life'; 'At all times preach the Gospel and when necessary use words'.

Clare ended the sessions by saying that like the apostles at the Transfiguration, it was good that we were here, and she understood why they didn't want to leave. She remarked about the enthusiasm and joy amongst the group and how the

charism of Mary MacKillop was indeed in good hands. Clare gave a short report on what had been achieved thus far in the transition process and admitted that mistakes had been made in trying to move too quickly, for which she took responsibility and apologised. The Newsletter is now in the capable hands of the editorial team; editor Christine Sivewright and team members Helen Bache, Leonie Bell, Anne Downey and Jacquie Oudin, with design and print by Paul McMahon. MYOB is in the process of being set up to take care of our finances. Clare personally thanked the organising committee (Anne Downey, Leonie Bell, Lillian Stansell, Margaret Millar, Gwen Daly and Helen Bache), who put so much time and effort into making the Gathering such a wonderful event. She thanked everyone for coming and asked God to bless us all and wished us a safe journey

For those of you who were not able to be present, I hope this report gives you a taste of what it was like to be there. For those of you who were blessed to have been there, I hope this report evokes some of the joys we shared and sustains your happy memories of this life-changing event. Before we left, it was rumoured that Christina might be leading our Retreat at Kincumber later in the year, so those of you who wanted more...watch this space!!!

n the 23rd May 2010 our son Matthew suffered a massive stroke due to a blood clot at the base of his brain. At the age of 38, all he could move were his eyes: up for yes and down for no.

The doctor said he was in a locked-in place and that there was not much hope of improvement. He started to get slight movement in his upper body but nothing in his legs. In November our Josephite Associates began a Novena to Mary MacKillop to pray for Matt and within a couple of days he started to get movement in his legs. ### Oatley Group Profile


