CATCHING THE JOSEPHITE CHARISM

While sitting with Sr Shirley O'Toole at our Province gathering I asked her about her beginnings as a Josephite. "I grew up in Warrnambool" she said, "the eighth of a family of nine children and was taught by the Good Samaritan Sisters in primary and by the Mercy Sisters in Secondary. One week in the Catholic Newspaper I saw a lovely photo of young women dressed in nurses' uniforms and holding beautiful babies. It was a photo advertising the coming fete at St Joseph's Babies Home at Broadmeadows. I thought —I could do that—I would love to do that. Following that thought I spent time at the Home obtaining my Mothercraft Nurses Certificate. Naturally that gave me contact with the Sisters of St Joseph and their work. So in 1954 I joined the Sisters looking forward to years of caring for babies. Unfortunately my dream was not realised for many years, as I was asked to teach in Primary Schools in fast growing areas around Sydney, at various places having large numbers of preps in my class.

Following on these years I worked in residential care with young children, teaching them and caring for their basic needs—feeding them, clothing them, caring for them when they were sick outside school times, acting as their mother. Some time was then spent in training other Mothercraft Nurses in New South Wales and Victoria, returning to where my

Josephite spirit was first awakened and nourished.

The scene then changed and I spent time as Chaplain at St Vincent's Hospital and as Pastoral Associate at St Joseph's Parish Wonthaggi.

For me the gift of the Josephite charism brings forth gratitude to God and to Mary MacKillop for her faithfulness in following God's dream for her in setting up our Congregation. Being able to meet the needs of others was the fulfilment of my own dream as a Josephite and in my later years I can still find ways of doing this.



Sr Mary Luscombe was born at Belgrave and had three brothers. She worked for the Army and the CSIRO before deciding to enter the Sisters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. One day she picked up a 2d pamphlet at St Francis Church "The Spirit of Mary MacKillop". "I was enthralled by Mary's devotion to the Will of God. I had never met a Josephite but had a friend who knew one of the sisters. Sr Emilian

Greelish at Frankston directed me to the Provincial House. As a result I joined the Sisters of St Joseph on a Sunday afternoon. By tea-time I was at West Brunswick and on Monday morning in School.

After completing my Teacher's Training I taught in a number of schools in NSW returning to Victoria in the sixties where I taught in the country and city, until I had to take sick leave. After completing a Teacher Librarian Course I became a member of the Schools Commission Library Committee, and in that role visited many Catholic and Independent Schools. In 1984 I began my apostolate to the Vietnamese people living in various inner city suburbs. Part of my role was teaching English and supporting welfare workers at the Flemington Housing Estate. Through the internet I can assist a Vietnamese Housing Worker with Women's Health.

A favourite Scripture Passage of mine is:
The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has chosen me to bring good news to the poor".
With St Teresa I pray: "Lord let me grow to be that for which you have destined me." May I obtain the grace to surrender to God's will, whatever it may be."

AN ACCOUNT OF HIS FAMILY WRITTEN BY FR. DONALD MACKILLOP SJ IN HIS OLD AGE

Cont:

But to what my mother told me about Mary.

Some months before her birth, Father Gheoghan once said to my mother:

Flora I have a great present for you, and you must take great care of it."

He explained that it was a relic of the Holy Cross, that he could not give it to her, but that she was to wear it until the child was born. In view of later history, my mother thought this significant. But there was more. My father had a great love for the Italian name, Maria, just as we pronounce it in Latin, and insisted that the child should be so christened—not Mary, not Moira, as in an English form.. To his great displeasure, one of the godparents, for some reason

that my mother could not understand—it was not, she told me, a family name—claimed a right to add a name, Helen. So Mary was baptised Maria Helena. The Cross again. Long years afterwards, when starting the Sisters, she herself wished to take the name 'Mary of the Sacred Heart', but Father Woods overruled, saying: 'No, you must be Mary of the cross',. And indeed, so she became!!

I don't see very much in another thing that my mother told me at this time. It could be accounted for, it seems to me, in a quite natural way. But my dear mother evidently took the supernatural view of the occurrence. There was a very holy lady—a Mrs Lestrange in those days—the name is still in Richmond. She was very fond of Mary, and when

Mary was a young girl—in her early teens, I think it was—this lady had Mary with her for a time on a visit. Things were not going well at home, and my sister was very downhearted.

It was the custom of Mrs Lestrange to go round at night to see that all was well—she would then kiss her little guest and retire. But, one night, a most beautiful lady came, bent lovingly over the young girl and kissed her, saying:


'My child—I will always be a mother to you.' I give this for what it is worth. I never got Mary's own version. My mother most evidently thought the beautiful lady was our Blessed.......

The next piece is about a gentleman who lived in Portland.

"His name was Rodriguez and he was really a Portugese. Whether he had a diploma or not, I do not know. He used to prescribe in a quiet way for the poor and was very poor himself. He was evidently genteel, always wore black clothes and a silk hat—both very much the worse for wear—eked out a few shillings by the sale of rose oil which he made and smelled strongly of garlic.

What I write of him and Mary I have chiefly on the authority of my sister Annie, now living at Winter St Malvern.



'Good God, Anne! What put that into your head now?' said Mary. But there is more of thestory, and you get it, dear Father O'Neill from Mary's own lips from me. Cruel falsehoods

have been printed. I give you the version of this sad affair which Mary's own lips gave to me.

Old Rodriguez used to tell his 'Miss Mary' that he saw her at the head of a long line of virgins who wore a peculiar dress, that she would be excommunicated, but that the Pope and Rome would right her again. This was a few years before the Sisters started—not very many years.

BUILDING OUR NATION

A National Conversation

Let's keep building a nation we can all be proud of.

We remember how significant were the words "We are sorry" when Prime Minister Rudd apologized to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, for the detrimental effects on them of past government policies. These words triggered an enormous outpouring of emotion and healing across the nation. Many Aborigines declared that for the first time they felt truly Australian. Many of us felt increasingly proud to be Australian. Over the next three years we are again being offered an opportunity to keep building our nation.

The Australian Government is committed to recognition of Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) Australians in the Australian Constitution. The Opposition, The Greens and Independent members have all given in principle support to this reform.

To begin the process, the government has called together an Expert panel. It is made up of respected individuals and includes Indigenous and community leaders, constitutional experts and members of parliament. It is this Expert Panel's job to begin the national conversation on how ATSI peoples could be recognized in the constitution.

The panel has released a discussion paper which can be found at www.youmeunity.org.au
The panel is to report to government by December 2011 on the various options put forward and the support for each option from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community and the broader community. It has begun a national series of consultations based on the discussion paper and the Melbourne Consultation is set for Monday 19th September.

All are invited to participate in this **national conversation.** It will conclude with our vote in a referendum on Constitutional Recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, some time in 2013. Australian voters have approved only 8 of 44 referenda put to them since Federation. The 8 adopted all had (1) multi-party support, (2) community education on the need for change and (3) "ownership" by the people.

The Peace, Justice and Social Issues Group will be doing its best in future newsletters, to keep you informed and to help facilitate the community education needed for this referendum to be a success.

When human beings feel like a "nobody" it affects their physical and mental health, can cause depression and violence. Margaret Humphries, in the story of *ORANGES AND SUNSHINE* discovered that so many of the child migrants had suffered depression because they felt they were "nobody" - they had no birth certificate, no citizenship, nothing to prove they even existed. This caused shame and ill-health especially when required to produce a birth certificate to get married. For some there were no records that they had even arrived in Australia. So it is very important we educate ourselves and take part in this very important step of recognizing in our Constitutions the First People of this land, people who had lived here for over 40,000 years, for the good of our whole nation


