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

A Moment in Time

(16th October 2010)

In this moment prior to the canonisation of Mary MacKillop it is as though we stand at a still point of the turning world. In this chapel, at this moment we stand in Kairos time where anything is possible; yesterday and tomorrow are both accessible to us.

If we look to yesterday we can imagine the moment when Mary MacKillop first appeared in a black dress before that small gathering at Penola. We can imagine the moment when Bishop Sheil addressed her as Sister Mary. That moment changed Australian religious culture forever. It was a moment that gave reality to what had been an ideal, a dream, a longing in the minds and hearts of Mary and Julian.

Tomorrow we see the title 'sister' heightened by the title 'saint'. Both titles indicate the universal availability of this woman who cuts through all barriers and invites us to do the same. The word 'saint' is transformative. It makes Mary visible to the whole world. As one woman in Holland said to her sister in Australia, "You have a holy woman amongst you." In Christ's words, Mary put first the kingdom of heaven and its justice, love and compassion. She is indeed a holy woman amongst us still.

Mary MacKillop does not talk about 'doing' the will of God but of being 'in' it. What a difference one word can make – and a word deliberately used. Here is the true Kairos place; in time and beyond it also. This is the place all contemplatives know and Mary was truly contemplative.

She wrote: "To me the will of God is a dear book which I never tire of reading, which has always some new charm for me." The will of God is written in our lives and in the lives of the people with whom we engage, and in the world which is being called to fulfil its potential of imaging God's love always.

As Josephites, we, and all who share her charism, have lived the pathway Mary MacKillop mapped out for us. We lived it yesterday and we will live it tomorrow. That is our commitment, to love the poor and work with them so that they can recognise they are loved in the here and now. As Josephites we are committed to God, to each other, to the world. Today we are both here and in Rome; where one is all are. We are in all places where Josephites are.

Today we thank God joyfully for all that has been: for the holiness of this woman, Australia's first saint; for the gift she is to us and to the world. We thank God, too, for the fact that the universal church is acknowledging that Mary's face is turned towards God – always – and that nothing now will ever change that.

Six Sisters Were Real-Life Sisters



A Requiem in Autumn for 93-year-old Joanna Cotter of Ireland, Sr Benedict rsj, in the Sisters' Chapel Hunters Hill, celebrated and closed the last of the lives of six young girls from one Irish family who each became a Sister, their childhood and vocations beginning at the dawn of the last century and ending only this year in the 21st century ... all now laid to rest.

Sr Benedict rsj was the youngest of the six whose pastoral lives enriched the Church in New Zealand and Australia – places, Sr. Benedict recalled, that their mother had said, in the fine accents of Limerick, that none of her daughters would be going to; far away countries, too far away. How wrong she was. Each of the six did. And each was a Josephite Sister.

But not until 1955 did chance bring all six together in the photo, when they were in Sydney to attend a retreat.

The eldest daughter Mary (Molly), Sr Arsenius, and the next-born Margaret (Sr Patrick) spent their religious lives in New Zealand and both are buried with other Josephites at Panmure, Auckland. The next sister, Eileen (Sr Lelia), also spent years in New Zealand but was recalled to Australia.

The Cotter daughters included twins, Kitty and Ita. Kitty kept her baptismal name as Sr Catherine and Ita was professed as Sr Benita. Catherine was the most travelled of the girls – first in Western Australia, then to convents in Victoria, back to Western Australia and then to her final posting, Sydney's then outer suburbs such as Lidcombe, Panania, and Revesby. Catherine was a Sister for 44 years.

Her twin Sr Benita, however, was a Sister for 68 years – about 20 years in Western Australia and then another 20 years in Sydney primary schools as teacher, deputy and principal, but with her passion for books, information and knowledge she became librarian at the University Library at Mount Street.

Exploiting her openness to change and her passion for theology, ecclesiology and the human sciences, the library expanded almost exponentially and her major assistant was a Marist Brother, a science teacher.


In 1955, Joanna (Sr Benedict) was sent to join the staff of the new Josephite Juniorate at Newmarket in Ireland until 1963, some 20 years before she was to return to Ireland for Bridget. The seventh daughter, Bridget, had stayed home in Limerick to care for her parents and the girls' only brother, Timothy.

Sr Benedict (Joanna) went back to Ireland on compassionate leave in the mid-1980s to claim Bridget, after "winding up the family home", and persuaded her to join her scattered sisters in Australia and New Zealand where she died 16 years later and is buried at Macquarie Park alongside the sisters who predeceased her.

The time that the six Cotter sisters gave to their vocations totalled 352 years of commitment to their faith in the service of God and his people. The Josephite who wrote a memoir for them, Sr Catherine Thom, said the Gospel message "We are already the children of God" – somehow rang like a clarion call through the chapel at Sr Benedict's requiem. The witness of the Cotter family speaks volumes about what is possible and admirable in human beings answering a call and remaining faithful to it for all those years – in their life times – 352 years.

Josephite Associates, Tamworth

A round September 1989, Sisters Geraldine Kiss and Angela Grant visited St Edward's Parish, South Tamworth to gauge interest in the formation of an Associates group. In this endeavour they were assisted by Sister Frances Fleming, then Parish Associate in South Tamworth. A meeting between the Sisters and parishioners was arranged. Those in attendance included Pat Borthistle, Eileen Blanch, Noeleen Turner, Don and Lorraine Guyer, Janette and Barry Brown and Tess York and quickly a decision was reached that an Associates group be formed.

Our interest was sparked by our friendship with Sister Matthew, the Bursar at Mount Street. At much the same time as we renewed acquaintance with Sister Matthew, we first met Sister Mary Hagan, who was teaching at St Edward's School and who later became the Associates Coordinator.

The group attracted further members, including Joy Makepeace and Pat Blanch, and on 12th September 1990 Sister Angela visited Tamworth to formally enrol members as Josephite Associates and to present them with certificates and badges. By this time Sister Helen Saunders had replaced Sister Frances Fleming as Parish Associate. Sister Helen was to later become the Associates Coordinator.

Right from the first get-together in 1989 the group emphasised friendship. Meetings started with prayers from the Newsletter then social activities took over. These meetings were held at the Convent or in members' homes.

In September that year, we attended the Associates AGM at Mount Street with Noelene Turner and Sister Helen Saunders. From the last newsletter of 1991, we learned that Tamworth was the first country representatives to attend an AGM. In 1992 in the parish church, Mary Help of Christians, Associates and parishioners celebrated with Sister Helen as she renewed her temporary vows. Subsequently, in 1996, we witnessed Sister being professed in an impressive ceremony at St Brigid's, Marrickville, attended by other South Tamworth parishioners.

In late 1993 the Associates started the phone tree. All Associates were aware of this prayer tree, which would lead generally to a happy resolution. West Tamworth Associates group was formed in 1994, and it was decided that the two groups would merge into one Tamworth group. Sister Giuseppe Walsh had been conducting the Motor Mission throughout all or part of Armidale Diocese and increased her load by taking on a central role with the Associates.

Associates were delighted when paintings by Charles Billich of Mary MacKillop were exhibited in Tamworth.

Came 1995 and what a year it was. Early on the morning of January 19th, Tamworth Associates rushed to St Mary's Cathedral to join with the Sisters and other Associates in a Morning Prayer service led by Pope John Paul II, surely a once-in-a-lifetime experience for most of us. Nobody will forget the wild excitement among the Sisters as His Holiness entered the Cathedral. Norma O'Brien, who has had several of her writings published in the Associates Newsletter, was in the best position to see it.

Very soon after the Prayer Service we rushed out to Randwick Racecourse and obtained a position trackside on the fence. We were joined soon after by a lady from the Central Coast and her 17-year-old son. He did not want to be there. His behaviour was obnoxious. He did not speak to his mother. He hurled volleys of verbal garbage at her.

After some hours the Pope arrived at Randwick and in his

pope mobile passed immediately in front of us. Just a few feet of air separated us and His Holiness. From that moment the boy underwent an amazing transformation. He followed every step of the Beatification Ceremony and the Mass, uttered all the necessary responses and when he spoke to his mother it was only to whisper his awe at something that had taken place. Mother and son departed Randwick as loving mother and loving son. Tamworth Associates were very aware of Sister Giuseppe's part in the liturgy.

Associates later took part in a retreat at Gunnedah, directed by Sister Eleanor Dawson.

Mary MacKillop Place North Sydney officially opened to the public on March 26th 1995. We were among the first to visit the museum and our guide for part of the tour was Sister Valerie Mason who moved to South Tamworth convent the following year.

At the invitation of Sister Giuseppe, and along with half a dozen other couples from across the state, we were privileged to attend the final session of the Sisters' 1995 NSW Province Chapter.

In September 1997 Tamworth Associates welcomed a visit by Jim Hazelwinkle, then aged 90 and the oldest Kincumber boy.

At the instigation of Sue Sweeney a Quiet Room, dedicated to the memory of her husband John, himself a Kincumber boy, was established at Tamara Hospital. In this room are a photo of Mary MacKillop and authenticated pieces of wood from her coffin. Several paraliturgies have been held by Associates and others here. Reflections have been led by various Sisters for the group.

In July 2006 Sisters Iris Fittler and Valerie Mason, both of whom had served the Associates so well, vacated the South Tamworth convent. The link between Tamworth and the Sisters of St. Joseph was broken. To mark the occasion Sister Judith Sippel presented the parish with an icon of Jesus. This icon holds pride of place high above the altar.

In August 2010 a stained glass window of Mary MacKillop was installed in St Patrick's Church, West Tamworth. On 17th October 2010 Blessed Mary MacKillop was canonised as St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, and the Associates shared in this wonderful celebration.

Governor General welcomes the Travelling Sisters' Roadshow

Just six months after Australia was hit with floods and cyclones, the Mary MacKillop Foundation's Travelling Sisters Roadshow continues its journey around Australia. The tour recently included a visit to Government House in Capherra

The Travelling Sisters Roadshow – Australian Disaster Recovery is part of the Mary MacKillop Foundation's work to continue the legacy of Australia's first saint by giving up to 80 grants of up to \$10,000 each to small community-based projects that are dedicated to assisting those who are less fortunate or in need of a helping hand.

The Governor-General, Ms Quentin Bryce AC, met with Sister Julianne Murphy, one of the Travelling Sisters, to welcome the Roadshow and to discuss the work of the Mary MacKillop Foundation. The Governor-General was presented with a gift of commemorative Mary MacKillop Sainthood Wine among other memorabilia from the Mary MacKillop Foundation.

Sam Hardjono, CEO of the Mary MacKillop Foundation, said, "We are delighted to have been welcomed by the Governor-General, as we share an interest in helping the less fortunate, including those who are still recovering from some of the worst natural disasters that Australia has experienced. Australians are generous people, yet with multiple disasters to donate to, there are many small community-based projects that are working even harder to meet the growing needs around them, without any financial assistance. The Mary MacKillop Foundation is continuing the legacy of Australia's first saint in fostering this Aussie helping spirit by giving grants to small life-changing projects that will help them meet even more needs."

The meeting with Her Excellency Quentin Bryce coincided with a group of Year Seven children from St Agatha's School in Queensland touring Government House. In addressing the students, Her Excellency spoke highly of the work of the Sisters of St Joseph and her recent awareness of Mary MacKillop's friendship with Caroline Chisholm, another great Australian. She encouraged the students to be great Australians themselves as they look back and remember the day they met the Governor General!

Sr Julianne also spoke to the students about how young people can continue Mary MacKillop's Legacy today through supporting the work of the Mary MacKillop Foundation. They were particularly interested in the Green and Gold Day being held to celebrate the first anniversary of the canonisation of Mary MacKillop.

Hymn: Holy Ground - Monica Brown

You are here so this is holy ground

In all that is you are here.

This is holy ground, the ground of my being now. My spirit bows to you upon this holy ground.

Reflection (Pray for the right things) - author unknown I asked God for strength that I might achieve -I was made weak that I might learn humbly to obey. I asked for health, that I might do greater things -I was given infirmity, that I might do better things. I asked for riches, that I might be happy – I was given poverty, that I might be wise. I asked for power, that I might have the praise of people -I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God. I asked for all things that I might enjoy life -I was given life, that I might enjoy all things. I got nothing I asked for, but everything I had hoped for; I am among all people most richly blessed.

Reading (The Beatitudes) Luke 6:20-23

Then fixing his eyes on his disciples he said: 'How happy are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God. Happy you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied. Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh. Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven. (Pause)

Psalm 46 (Paraphrased by Fr Kevin Lyon) God is our refuge and our strength, He is a sure help in days of trouble. Even when the world seems to dissolve into chaos, and Nations are wracked by wars; Yet, I will never doubt that our Great King is with us. He has come to save us. He counsels me. "Wait quietly and you shall have proof that I am God." Hurry blinds me to Your presence. Feverish activity allows not time for You. Only in the peace of my soul do I recognise You. Only in the silence of my heart can I worship You. Soothe my emotions; heal my anxiety; allay my fears. "Be still! And know that I am God." He is our refuge and our strength.

Reflection "I have in my hand two boxes Which God gave me to hold He said, 'Put all your sorrows in the black box And all your joys in the gold'.

> I heeded His words, and in the two boxes Both my joys and my sorrows I stored, But though the gold became heavier each day The black was as light as before.

With curiosity I opened the black I wanted to find out why, And I saw, in the base of the box, a hole Which my sorrows had fallen out by.

I showed the hole to God and mused, 'I wonder where my sorrows could be.' He smiled a gentle smile and said. 'My friend, they're all here with Me.'

I asked God why He gave me the boxes, 'Why the gold, and the black with the hole?' 'My friend, the gold is for you to count your blessings,

The black is for you to let go.' Author unknown

Reading (extract from Finding God in All Things - Brian Grogan sj) "If someone asked you to give them another word for 'God', you could use the word 'presence', for that is what God is. When Moses asked God his name, God replied, 'I am who I am', and this means 'I am present'. God is really saying, 'I shall be there for you'. God is intimately present to everything, and especially to us. Jesus' name is Emmanuel which means 'God is with us'. Matthew's Gospel ends with the marvellous statement, 'Know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time". (Pause)

May we embody God's love in our relationships with one another.

May we learn how to live our lives in love.

May we have a spirit of openness to see God within and around

May we become advocates of peace and harmony bringing an end to conflict and division.
