You will have noticed Canberra/ Goulburn is included as this Congregation was fused with us on 19th March. On 24th August the Whanganui Congregation of Sisters of St Joseph will experience fusion. We can rejoice in the guidance of the Holy Spirit as our prayer for unity has been answered in ways beyond expectation.

In November this year we will be having our Chapter, a meeting of Sisters from all over the Congregation, to look at our future and to elect a new Congregational leader. We have much to thank God ,for the leadership of Sr Anne Derwin during the last six years. We ask you to pray with us for the success and guidance of this Chapter. You will find on the back of the prayer sheet a prayer for you to pray, when and how you wish. It is the same prayer the Sisters are using adapted for your use.

Our first Regional Days proved to be most enjoyable for all present giving them space and time for reflection. We hope as many as possible will make the effort to take part in one of these days of spiritual formation. Also note the several pilgrimages organised around Melbourne. You may like to come as a group and visit the sites connected with Mary MacKillop, where she lived with her family and worked as a Sister in the 1890's.

This is the 140th Anniversary of Mary MacKillop's journey to Rome to have the Constitutions approved. About 30 Sisters travelled to Rome on 10th May to follow in her footsteps returning on 22nd May. Anyone going to Rome can obtain a small book which outlines the places Mary visited while there.

Pentecost has been celebrated and the prayer sheet, prepared by Colleen Nazareth, gives us some thoughts on the Holy Spirit. The Feast of the Sacred Heart is 7th June, the expression of God's love.

During April when attending a day at the Convent, Williamstown, we were lead in a reflection by Anne O'Brien, an experienced educator, who at 80 years of age is still studying on-line. Anne introduced us to the question WHO IS GOD? and during the next hour and a half we explored

We were presented with the words of Joan Chittester osb: insights into the Mystery we call God.

What we believe about God colours

- everything we do in the name of God
- everything we think about other people (and ourselves)
- everything we determine about life itself...

Many of us grew up with an image of God that may have limited our under-

WHAT IMAGES OF GOD DID YOU HAVE AS A CHILD? standing and our relationship with God.

Was God a scorekeeper? one who punishes? one who could make things better if we prayed hard enough? Can you name others.....

HAVE THESE IMAGES CHANGED AS YOU HAVE GROWN INTO

Some find the scriptural images of God more appealing: Shepherd, Eagle, Father, Mother, Fire, Gentle Breeze, Light, Potter,

Midwife, Faithful lover, Rock.....

HAVE YOU A FAVOURITE IMAGE OF GOD FROM SCRIPTURE?

Anne demonstrated one image of God as LIGHT. Taking an unlit candle she asked us how many things did we see: ONE, a candle. She then lit the candle and asked the same question: ONE, but changed. it was now alight with a flame. This flame can be shared endless times by lighting other candles. We see especially at Easter that Jesus Is the Light. Jesus said: You are the Light of the world. And this light was not to be hidden. So from Baptism each of us is part of this light, part of God's light and so this affects how we treat each other, who share this light and life with

One way of doing this is to take a gathering eg family, friends, Associates and to light a candle and to share how each person has been a FLAME to us. others in their daily lives. Maybe as each person holds the candle, the others in the group can share how that person was a FLAME in the Parish, in the family, in the community.

An awareness examen in the evening could be to ask yourself: GOD, WHERE WAS I A FLAME TO SOMEONE TODAY? Let God tell you where you were a flame to someone today

MARY'S BROTHER—JOHN MACKILLOP

Great rejoicing would have been heard in the house of the MacKillop and MacDonald families in late February 1845.

The first son, named John, had been born to Alexander and Flora MacKillop, then living in the Heidelberg-Fairfield area. After two daughters, the arrival of a son would have created much discussion as to his future—a Landowner? A priest? A Lawyer?

Like all parents, their dreams would have been built and hoped for. Yet this son, the first in his family, would be the first of the seven children, who survived their childhood years, to die in another country before the age of thirty. Alick, the second son died at 11 months.

John was a good son who cared much for his mother and hated hurting her in any way. In 1858 he wrote a letter to Mary telling of his skill at making a carriage for

Peter, then nearly 12 months, using a box Mary had sent. In later life Peter became a builder and repaired the old stable in Penola for Mary's first Josephite school.

It was John, who at 13 years, accompanied Mary, 15 years, on their long walk from Port Melbourne to Somerton, a distance of 12 miles (19km) to inform the relatives of their arrival from Sydney and the fact that Flora and the other children needed transport and somewhere to live.

Flora was in late pregnancy with the youngest child Peter. Her husband had returned to Melbourne

previously, leaving Flora to find her own way home.

John's affection for his father was revealed when he accompanied him to New Zealand in a quest for employment, probably on the goldfields being opened up at the time. Alexander's failure to do so brought on depression and John spent many hours with his father trying to rally him. Alexander finally borrowed fare money from John to return to Australia. John stayed on working as a builder until his job ended and, unable to get permanent work and becoming more destitute, he returned to Portland where the family was living.

A horse accident kept him grounded and resulted in him going to Penola and using his skills on the stable for his beloved sister Mary.

Living with and being dependent on relatives was difficult for John, who felt he could only be of use to the family by working elsewhere. "Anywhere in the world rather than in Portland" he wrote. So he returned to New Zealand and his many letters revealed his happiness. His greatest worry was that his mother would lose faith in him. In one letter to his mother he pointed out "I am my own master in New Zealand at least."

His last letter was a reply to his parents' birthday letters and he signed himself 'Your affectionate son." Contact with Mary through letters was very important to John. When Mary left home to begin her religious life, her letters became less frequent and he wondered whether this life of Mary's was too hard. Her photo was a great comfort to him.'

It is believed that a young woman from Penola followed John when he returned to New Zealand and it was she who wrote to Maggie to tell of John's premature death.

John had a fall from a horse. Tetanus resulted and he

died on December 7 at 22 years of age. Mary received her news on January 6, 1968 and the next day wrote to her mother from Adelaide: 'Let us not mourn for John. We may safely hope that he is not far from his loving Redeemer. His wishes were always good and his life innocent. You have not got him to comfort and take care of you on Earth, but from Heaven he and our little Alick will watch over you and all of us, I trust.'

John was buried in Christchurch cemetery and this site was probably visited by Mary during her travels in New Zealand as she seemed to have great respect for the graves of loved ones.

The tombstone, discovered by Josephite Associates in New Zealand,

has been perfectly preserved over the past 140 years by a tree which literally enfolded it. The tree now has had its branches trimmed so the headstone is now clearly visible from the road.

The four Sisters from Queensland and South Australia stayed at the Heritage Centre and three days were spent walking and travelling around Melbourne. Leaders were Garry McLean, CEO of the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre and Mary Fermio rsj.

PENPALS WITH ST MARY

In the backstreets of Mitcham, SA, two piles of stacked bluestone rocks sit amid the real estate oasis of one of Adelaide's most leafy-green suburbs, reports *The Southern Cross. (SA's Catholic Newspaper)*

Some of the stone making up the triangular-stacked cairns comes from the very convent Mary MacKillop built for her Sisters in Mitcham. The four-year-long process to build the cairns has revealed a deep connection between Australia's first saint and the Presbyterian matriarch of one of Adelaide's wealthiest pioneering families.

'Mary's relationship with Joanna Barr Smith and the Barr Smith family was a significant and treasured one for both Mary and Joanna, 'said Regional Leader of the Sisters of St Joseph, Sr Marion Gambin. 'It was a friend-ship that lasted a life time.'

Joanna and Robert Barr-Smith were well known for their generous donations to the University of Adelaide, the art gallery and many more Adelaide charities and institutions.

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and Joanna met some time after Mary arrived in Adelaide from Penola in 1867 and before she established a women's refuge in Mitcham in 1870. Robert and Joanna, who lived a short distance away at Torrens Park, assisted Mary in running the Mitcham Refuge to help rehabilitate and provide life skills to outcast women—unmarried mothers, prostitutes and former prisoners.

Mary was in her late 20's, as was Joanna. Joanna was born in Scotland and Mary's ancestry too is Scottish. Their friendship lasted four decades and ended only with the death of Mary in Sydney in 1909. In that time, the friends wrote many letters to one another. It is clearly evident by the letters written between these two women that theirs was a strong and close relationship,' said Mitcham Mayor Michael Picton. 'In a letter written by Joanna in 1873, she closes: "I can only send you these brief lines dear Sister Mary and explain my sad position. I wish you a very happy New Year and a speedy reunion with your beloved helpmeets in the South. Ever your attached friend Joanna Barr-Smith," he said.

'And in return Mary closes: " but I must stop. Forgive me if I have said too much, you know I love your soul, and that I cannot be false to it. Believe me dearest Mrs Smith, affectionately yours in JMJ Mary of the Cross."

Added: On 17 July 1907, 3 weeks before Mary's death, Joanna wrote: "Oh, my dear friend, I wish I could see you again or hear your voice. Living or dying, my beloved friend, I am ever the same to you and am proud to look back on nearly 40 years of unbroken friendship. My husband and I send dearest love." The marble top of Mary MacKillop's tomb was paid for by Joanna Barr Smith and is a lasting memorial to their friendship.


BEECHWORTH


- 1. **USE OF HANDBOOK**: How do you see the use of a Handbook in your formation and life as an Associate? Have you any suggestions as to how it can be used?

Any help that you could offer to repair the damage would be much appreciated.


