Dear Josephite Companions Aotearoa

Spring Blessings to each of you as we move into this time of new life, new beginnings and new growth. As we embrace this lovely spring season, we bring to you much news of events for the Sisters and Josephite Companions.

In this newsletter we share snippets from the International Josephite Associates Leadership Conference in Sydney and the recent Fusion celebrations in Whanganui – truly momentous events!



## The Josephite Associates' Conference Sydney 12-14<sup>th</sup> July 2013

The second International Josephite Associates' Conference was held at Mary MacKillop Place, in Sydney, in July this year. The conference was organised by the International Josephite Leadership Team (IJALT). Delegates from as far away as Ireland, Peru and Timor Leste (East Timor) attended. Four Josephite Companions represented Aotearoa New Zealand at the Conference. They were Peta Lindstrom (Auckland), Catherine Birt (Auckland), Helen Dougherty (Whanganui) and Jane Gunson (Whangarei).

Sister Angela Grant opened the Conference by describing the beginning of the Associates' Movement, as far back as 1983. Against the backdrop of the Josephite Associates' birthing story, groups from different Australian states and countries presented creative accounts of what is happening in their local areas today. These accounts described the hospitality, service and spiritual riches that Associates bring to their local communities.

Associate Leaders explored the future of the Associate Movement. Many questions were asked around the sustainability of formation programmes, forms of governance, relationship with the Sisters into the future, Covenant Josephites, new membership, connections with ex-students, networking, resources, Congregational ministries carrying on Mary MacKillop's legacy today and how Associates can be supported in these ministries.

Sisters Christina Neunzerling, Katrina Brill and Michelle Connolly led the delegates through insights of the MacKillop Charism, its culture and the different pathways that are now available to women and men for sharing the charism. States such as the Queensland Associates and their Josephite Associate Network (JAN) explained in detail the practical aspects of Associate Groups moving to an independent model of giving prayer, service and hospitality.

Speakers from some Josephite Congregational Ministries also presented at the conference. These ministries include the Mary MacKillop Foundation who provides funding sources for small projects, Mary MacKillop International (MMI) who work in Peru and Timor Leste, Sister Margaret and the Sydney Detention Centre for helping trafficked refugees and the Josephite Rural Community Services who work with Aboriginal communities. The service

that these ministries provide reflects strongly how St. Mary MacKillop helped the poor.

Delegates discussed the fact that change is already upon the Associate Movement and that there needs to be an openness to change. Change needs time to take place. There are challenges about education and the support required for transition to be successful.

The Conference concluded that the International Josephite Associate Leadership Team (IJALT) needs further development as a central contact for all Associate groups around the world. Among the aspirations are the following: to strengthen our appreciation of the Josephite charism; to keep close to the Sisters; to open doors for younger members; to promote unity in the Associate Movement; to find 'where we hang our hat' with the Congregation's ministries; to spread the Josephite charism through Friendship, Prayer and Service and to hold another Conference three years from now!

# FUSION Celebrations Whanganui Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> August 2013

The Celebration of Fusion of the Sisters of St Joseph of Nazareth Whanganui with the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart took place on a beautiful winter's day in Whanganui on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> August.

Bishop Charles Drennan was the celebrant of a joyful Mass at St Mary's Church, also concelebrated by Bishop Peter Cullinane and Bishop Owen Dolan along with many priests from local and visiting parishes. Sister Anne Derwin, Congregational Leader of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart and the Final Leadership Team of the Sisters of St Joseph Whanganui, Sisters Catherine Shelton, Anne Burke, Noelene Landrigan and Colleen Woodcock were joined by many visiting Sisters from New Zealand, Australia, Ireland and Peru.

The warmth of the Welcome Powhiri by the local peoples set the scene for the joy, hope,

happiness and strength in unity experienced by all who attended.

Sister Colleen Woodcock introduced the Ritual that proclaimed Rome's approval of the request to merge or fuse with the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart. The Decree was read, the Whanganui Sisters were asked to accept a new set of Constitutions as their way of vowed life and then each Sister was presented with a new emblem. All Sisters present then stood to renew their vows together — a truly momentous occasion that was acknowledged with long and very loud applause from the congregation gathered.

Mass was followed by a luncheon at the Whanganui Racecourse where celebrations and many conversations continued! Sunday Mass was again celebrated at St Mary's the next day with the local parishioners hosting many visitors to their special place.

A lovely note from Sister Marie Skidmore sums up the festivities...

"Kia ora koutou, Thank you very very much for the wonderful gestures you have made to celebrate our fusion celebration!

The flowers (presented on behalf of the Josephite Companions Aotearoa) are absolutely beautiful, and I hope the local group will be able to view them when we meet next weekend.

I hope those of you who were able to come, enjoyed it and felt inspired and re-created by it all. I know I certainly did.

After the Mass on Sunday, we went in buses around our historical spots in Whanganui (where the first four Sisters landed in 1880) and then up to Kaiwhaiki Marae, where Sr Makareta comes from, for a lovely afternoon and evening of entertainment and shared storying.

All in all it has been a wondrous few days and I feel truly blessed. I hope some of the blessings of the occasion flow through to each of you and you are rewarded 100fold for your generosity.

#### Feast Day in Whangarei

#### Mural of St. Mary MacKillop

The children of St. Francis Xavier Catholic School, Whangarei, have painted a mural of St. Mary of the Cross MacKillop to represent her historical and inspirational links with their Catholic Primary School. This mural is one of a series of murals, which were created to give the children ownership of the school environment and to brighten it up with children's displayed work in visible places.

In 1903 St. Mary MacKillop received a letter from the Parish Priest of Whangarei requesting that she send some sisters to teach in the new primary school. She said yes. The Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart would teach at St. Joseph's School and at the second established primary school, St. Mary's, for over eighty years. The Sisters finished teaching in Whangarei at the time of the amalgamation of the two primary schools, onto the St. Mary's school site. The new school took the name of its parish, St. Francis Xavier. Since 2000, St. Francis Xavier Catholic School has been reclaiming its charism of St. Mary MacKillop. The charism is based on the five clauses of the 'rule' that St. Mary MacKillop and Fr. Julian Tennison-Woods wrote for the Sisters of St. Joseph. These are: make room for all, listen to God's call, have an attitude of gratitude, do you bit and never see a need without doing something about it.

The pupils chose images for the mural that would reflect the school's values and also have a connection to New Zealand. St. Mary MacKillop was chosen as the central image because her Sisters established the Whangarei Primary Schools. The cross represents the school's Catholic faith. The children gathered in a circle before the cross represents unity. The school office represents the entrance to the school. The tui and Southern Cross stand for New Zealand and the rainbow represents creation.

St. Mary MacKillop's mural hangs in a central place in the school grounds. It reminds the school community everyday to embrace the gospel values, as inspired by St. Mary MacKillop's charism of faith.
