Dear Josephite Associates,

'Whether we search in earth, or sky, or sea, we are everywhere met by the vision of the illimitable God' Rev Julian Tenison Woods 1882. This quote appears in the Josephite Calendar, October 2014. The 7th October 2014 marks the 125th Anniversary of Julian Tenison Woods death, a time to remember the Co-founder of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart. A Mass was celebrated in the Mary MacKillop Memorial Chapel North Sydney, on Saturday 11th October 2014 to mark this memorial.

Welcome to warmer weather following a very cold winter. I especially welcome the twenty eight applicants who filled in our new application form to become Josephite Associate members this year.

The Annual General Meeting was held at Marian Court, Margaret Street, Strathfield on Saturday 13th September 2014. This day was one of celebration with a Dedication Ceremony, a ritual of prayer and song, welcoming twenty four Josephite Associates, who responded to the invitation in the July 2014 Newsletter to formalise their commitment, to live the Charism of St Mary MacKillop by their lives of friendship, prayer and service.

The ritual commenced with the singing of the hymn 'St Mary's Call to life' followed by prayer, dedication, presentation of certificates and prayers of intercession. Thirty three names were proclaimed, remembering those Associates who have been called to eternal life since our last AGM. Our final hymn to the tune of 'You raise me up' was accompanied on the piano by Sister Tess Formosa rsj (words used were written at Lochinvar and the verses were adapted to include Julian Tenison Woods and St Mary MacKillop).

Our guest speaker Sister Margaret Ng rsj spoke of her work in 'Trafficking of Women'. This ministry for Margaret is 'a call within a call', since she has such unique gifts to enable her to respond to the needs of the people. (Refer to an article on Margaret's ministry in this newsletter). An inspiring presentation and a confronting DVD enlightened us on the abuse of women in our society. We extend a special thank you Margaret.

The emphasis this year at the AGM was on members celebrating friendship with one another, praying together and sharing a delicious lunch. Lucky door prizes were distributed to conclude the day.

To the Strathfield Associates Group for hosting the AGM and to all who assisted we extend a special thank you.

The following are some highlights of the work of the Governance Group during 2014:

• Jan Lang (Northern NSW representative) and Mullumbimby Group Leader held a street stall and raised \$1,893 for East Timor.

• Carol Badewitz (Southern NSW representative) and Bombala Group Leader forwarded her inspiring prayer reflections for sharing by email to all Associates on our email list and Sisters of St Joseph.

• A request from the Boambee Group for a Junior Joey's Certificate – Sister Joan Goodwin rsj responded and designed a certificate. A copy is now available from the office. Any group wishing to present certificates to Junior Joey's please contact the office.

• Dedication Ceremony packages and certificates were prepared and mailed to various groups.

• Four Governance Group members attended a prayer day in Bathurst – Presenter Dr Marie Crowley.

• Joined in the Fusion Ceremony of the Federation Sisters at Bathurst with the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart on the 3rd

to teachers from St Paul of the Apostle, Winston Hills.
Following an invitation from the Western Sydney Deanery to address twenty Priests/Deacons on the History of Josephite Associates, an article was prepared, together with a package of enrolment brochures, for distribution in Western Sydney parishes. This presentation was given at Carnes Hill on the 22nd July 2014.

• Thirty holding crosses from East Timor have been purchased and are held in the office, with the view of forwarding a cross to an Associate who is seriously ill. Seven crosses have been distributed and gratefully received.

• The Sisters of St Joseph invited Associates to Feast Day Mass Celebrations for the Feasts of St Joseph in March (84 attended), St Mary of the Cross in August (85 attended) and to the 125th Anniversary of Julian Tenison Woods death in October (50 attended).

• The fusion of the Federation Sisters of St Joseph in Goulburn and Bathurst, with the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, has now involved discussion, as to the fusion of Josephite Associates from these two areas with Josephite Associates (NSW) Inc. Please pray for the success of this initiative.

Last year in the November 2013 Newsletter a request was made for anyone coming up to retirement with skills in MYOB who would be willing as a volunteer to assist in the office. This invitation is still open and we are continuing to pray for others to come and assist with the management of the Josephite Associates Office at Croydon.

Pilgrimage to Penola I

Students and staff from Penola Catholic College, Broadmeadows (in Melbourne's North-West) made a pilgrimage to Penola for the blessing and re-opening of the historic Mary MacKillop Stable School Park on 29th June 2014.

Our students were included and brought into the rich web of the Josephite Story alongside those (including Sisters formerly in teaching and parish ministries and also historians) who had brought members of staff into the same story when they were their age. In their reflections, the students wrote about the great pride they felt walking in Mary and Julian's footsteps, seeing the landscape, the Father Woods Tree, the sites within Penola (such as the church and Woods-MacKillop School House) and independently made connections between this experience and their place back at school, the former St Joseph's Babies' Home, founded by Mary MacKillop in 1901.

The students were alive with questions and excitement on the day and also on the journey to and from Penola. It was the first time they had been included in a gathering of a large number of Josephite Sisters whose visible presence in their teal scarves made a big impression! The events of the day provided



many opportunities to reflect in new ways on the qualities of the Founders, Mary and Julian, and the important work they initiated in Penola. In their reflections, students shared that they enjoyed

the Eucharist, so joyfully celebrated by Father Paul Gardiner SJ, the beautiful images and the distinctive use of music and prayers used in the ritual of blessing, and taking 'selfies' with the delightful 'cut-out' characters in the Park representing the different personalities of the first Stable School. Staff members were inspired by the Prayer Stations with the words of wisdom from Mary MacKillop and felt they could incorporate a similar feature into their lessons back at school.

One of our year nine students, Stavro Marogi, who had been in a Mary MacKillop group in his primary school and this year founded the group at Penola College, wrote in his journal that morning: 'I'm looking forward to reading today and feel very proud to have a part in the ritual which is an important day to remember what happened here in Penola and for us all from Penola College'. When asked what he took away from the day, how he would go home 'different', Stavro shared, 'new inspiration' – which spoke for many of the pilgrims.

As a newly-formed Mary MacKillop group and as representative members of the Penola College Community, the

The Mary MacKillop group at Penola Catholic College strives to live by the four MacKillop values (the same used in the MacKillop Campus of Aotearoa New Zealand):


• Make Room for All – 'There shall be no distinctions among us' (MMK)

Fortunately, the weather permitted us to make our way to the MMK Stable School Park for the final part of the ritual. A beautiful country style lunch was then served back at the hall.

It was a privilege to be able to attend and share in the blessing of the park, but it was also a joy to share in the warmth, hospitality and the community of sisters who continue the great work of their founder.

The magic of the moment



The 18th July 1984 is etched in my memory forever, for on that day I (Fr Ross O'Brien), met Pope John Paul II. Thirty years ago the Armidale Diocese hosted a visit from the Apostolic Delegate. There was the threat of a pilots strike so Bishop Harry Kennedy

asked me to drive the Delegate to Sydney.

I mentioned that I was planning to go overseas with my mother and two sisters. The Delegate asked me to write giving the dates when I would be in Rome, and in gratitude he would furnish me with a letter to the Vatican requesting tickets for a Papal audience. The letter subsequently arrived and I presented it to the relevant authorities in the Vatican when I arrived in Rome.

We arrived at the Piazza in the morning the Pope was to arrive at 10 o'clock. The photographer came to us and said that there was a possibility that the Pope might personally come and meet us. We were full of expectation.

At 10 o'clock the Papal helicopter could be seen in the sky. The Pope had been skiing in the Alps. He spoke to the huge crowd in difference languages. After this he came down towards us.

I had been reflecting in my mind what I would say to him. That very day 18th July was the twenty third anniversary of my ordination. I would tell him that and ask for his blessing. He took my hand, our eyes met and I froze. I was lost for words, such was the magic of the moment.

I introduced my mother to him. He said: 'God bless the mother of a Priest'. She asked him for his autograph. One of his aides gave her a card which was autographed. Then he moved to my sister Kathie. He asked her where she was from; she was overwhelmed with delight. When he came to my other sister Norma she presented him with a holy card of Mary MacKillop and asked that he raise Mary MacKillop to sainthood soon. He placed his hand on her shoulder, a moment she has never forgotten.

The Pope then moved on. The event was all over in a short space of time but it will be ever present to the O'Briens. There is truth in the saying: 'the Song is ended but the melody lingers on'.

My mother, Mrs Dalis O'Brien nee Kennedy, attended St Joseph's School, West Tamworth on the first day it opened in 1919. Her six children went to St Joseph's School as did ten of her grandchildren. One grandchild teaches music at St Joseph's and another one is a teacher at St Joseph's Wee Waa. Three of her grandchildren are Josephite Associates, Kathie, Elaine and Norma.

Living in closeness to God

On the 8th August the Church around the world celebrates Mary MacKillop's feast day. The memory of the Canonisation is still with us. This year we reflect on the impact Mary's life is having on us and on the world around us.

Pope Francis sees a world at 'the turning point of history'. Others see that too. In the world of the poet and playwright, Christopher Fry, 'Thank God our time is now... The enterprise is exploration into God'. Mary MacKillop found a way to God by being still in the midst of turmoil in her life and times. Pope Francis sees a world 'lacking a respect for others, where violence is on the rise and inequality becoming increasingly evident'. Perhaps Mary would see that too if she were alive today.

The challenge for us is to ignite something of Mary's spirit in the hearts of others; a spirit that will permeate the world for future generations. Many Josephites can no longer lead active lives and often need care ourselves... 'for the snow is on our hair'. But there is a rich spirit of prayer and compassion for the needy and we are aware of the injustices in our times. One of the things we can do is have a heightened sensitivity to the beauty in our world; the beauty of each human soul and our connectedness to all things.

The mystics tell us that the body, mind and soul are as one when we are closer to God. To find this balance we need to clear the mind of distractions, relax the body from tension and the Spirit will be free. There is a yearning in every human being to find the spiritual. Some people try drugs to alter their consciousness, others attempt thrillseeking, etc. We do not need to look far for inspiration from Mary. She found spiritual connectedness to God by being still.

Despite travelling to Europe, all over Australia and New Zealand as the Order expanded she maintained her centre, which was living in a closeness to God. Her life was committed to God's will. In our day we speak of discernment to discover God's will for ourselves. That requires daily efforts to be in touch with our own journey in faith. Mary found a measure of stillness which she described in the letter written in the garden at Alma Cottage. In 1884 she wrote of 'little birds singing around us, their singing and the ticking of the clocks being the only sounds'.

When Mary died her dream of education for children was a reality in Australia and New Zealand. In the silence of her heart she never wavered despite difficulties. Now her spirit inspires us to recognise God's will.

In Mary's letter to her mother, Flora, she wrote, 'Believe in the whisperings of God to your own heart' (1868). These words are relevant to us today in the stillness.

Old windows return to Penola church



Three 155-year-old stained glass windows from the first St Joseph's Church built by Father Julian Tenison Woods in Penola are being restored by a relative of its original salvage contractors.

The unique Gothic-styled windows will form part of an \$80,000 porch redevelopment of St Joseph's Church which sits on the site of the original Church commissioned and opened by Father Julian Tenison Woods on April 24, 1859.

Father Woods and St Mary MacKillop established Australia's first order of nuns, the Sisters of St Joseph, in Penola in 1866. Mary MacKillop would have frequented the church, of which Father Woods was parish priest, when she was teaching in Penola.

Father Woods had 13 custom-made stained glass windows for the church imported from the United Kingdom, with one of them bearing the Ave sign, later worn on the habits of Mary MacKillop's Josephite Sisters.

For close to 40 years the windows sat partially immersed in water in a disused quarry on a property on the outskirts of Penola. 'It really is a miracle the windows have survived,' said Penola parishioner Maureen Black.

Penola stained glass artisan and wine maker Barry Mulligan has volunteered to restore three of the windows for the Church's porch redevelopment, including the one etched with the Ave sign.

'I think I would die in regret if the windows weren't refurbished because they are such an important part of the history of Penola,' said Mr Mulligan.

The windows will take about 12 months to restore and he is aiming to use as much of the original glass pieces and frames as possible. Mr Mulligan is the grand-nephew of Phyl and Charles Lynch, who were contracted to demolish the original church in December 1923. Part of the contract included salvage rights of the demolished material, including roof slates, timbers and the windows, which the brothers stored for decades on their farm on the outskirts of Penola.

It's not the first time Mr Mulligan, from St Mary's Wines, has donated his craftsmanship to the history of Mary. In 2000 he restored one of the 13 windows for display at the Mary MacKillop Penola Centre.

The window on display was donated by Tony and Kathy Doherty, also descendants of the Lynch family. The Dohertys gave the windows to the Centre after retrieving them from a disused quarry on the family property.

Tony's sister, Mrs Black (nee Doherty), recalls the windows were moved from the family's car shed to the quarry after a child cut themselves on the glass.

'My father and uncle took the windows and stored them in the quarry a few metres from the house; one side of the quarry would fill with water, and this was where the windows were sitting,' said Mrs Black. She said they lay there idle for almost 40 years. Penola Parish Church Porch Committee member Claire Larkin said, ' the windows were a wonderful connection to the pioneering times of Father Woods and St Mary MacKillop in Penola and deserved pride of place in the porch redevelopment'.

'A new porch is needed to provide ease of entry and disabled access to the church and also gives us the opportunity to reuse the historic windows which will bring back the early history of the church, which is of great interest to the local people and the visitors who pray there.'

The church is adjacent to the Mary MacKillop Penola Centre which attracts thousands of pilgrims from across Australia and the world each year.

Thirroul Josephite Associates



Today, 8th of August 2014, we were privileged to share in a Celebration Mass for Mary MacKillop's Feast Day with the school children from St Michael's School in Thirroul, along with parents and parishioners. What a joyful occasion it was! Father Ken Cafe gave a wonderful homily, bringing home the love and spirit of Mary and impressing on the children how important it is to face and accept similar challenges today to those facing Mary all those years ago.

Last year at our quarterly meeting, which begins with Mass, celebrated by Josephite Associate, Father Vincent Whiteman, followed

by the sharing of a meal, an idea was suggested by Claudia Smith to present the children with a lasting memory of Mary MacKillop, something tangible to take home and create a talking point within their families. Claudia's idea was spontaneously accepted as a great idea and so began a project to be completed by Mary's Feast Day this year.

It was decided that Mary's image was to be printed onto a wooden circle, along with six different sayings that Mary used as encouragement to her sisters. Different quotes were used in the hope that the children would read each other's magnet. After many ups and downs, including applying for the copyright to use the image of Mary's photograph and her sayings, the project came together with the help of a willing band of Associates and the expertise of a local woodturner, who cut over six hundred circles. Brian and Pat Hazel's daughter, Belinda, was able to create the layout of photograph and different wordings to fit the circle, and so a magnet was born. Working bees were organised to glue magnets onto circles and then these were bundled into class numbers to be presented to class representatives at Mass today.

At the conclusion of Mass, the children and congregation were told about the Josephite Associates and our aim to carry on the memory of Mary MacKillop through prayer and action. Those gathered were given some very interesting history of the foundation of St Michael's School nearly seventy five years ago by Sister Alphonsa Jones and Sister Thecla, and made possible by Mary MacKillop's love and devotion to education, especially for the poor.

Sufficient magnets were made for St Joseph's School at Bulli and a similar presentation was made to those children today. It has been a thoroughly enjoyable experience to be involved in sharing Mary MacKillop with the communities of Thirroul and Bulli.

Sisters of St Joseph receive the medal of the Order of Timor-Leste



The President of the Republic of Timor-Leste, Taur Matan Ruak, officially bestowed 'Ordem de Timor' Medals on twenty-six non-Timorese people and groups who fought for Timor-Leste's independence.

The ceremony was held in Dili on August 30th 2014, the 15th Anniversary of the Referendum through which the Timorese people finally gained their freedom.

Sisters Josephine Mitchell rsj and Susan Connelly rsj accepted the Medal on behalf of all those who had worked in the Mary MacKillop Institute for East Timor's struggle in the 1990s.

The Award recognised the solidarity of the Sisters of St Joseph, Religious of other

Congregations and Colleagues who had the privilege of working and praying together for justice and freedom for East Timor.

Others receiving recognition included the journalists known as the Balibo Five, whose posthumous awards were received by family members.

Ministry of Sister Margaret Ng rsj

Sister Margaret, during her sabbatical, had the opportunity, in Norway, to make a directed retreat in the Cistercian Monastery, Tautra Mariakioster, under Sister Rosemary, the former prioress of the Community.

The current Prioress, Sister Gilchrist, asked Sister Margaret to speak to the community about her ministry. This ministry is to trafficked people and includes an outreach to women who have been brought to Australia as part of sex trafficking rings and then end up in Villawood Detention Centre and other places waiting for deportation.

There are many asylum seekers also in the detention centre and Margaret, many times, walks the hard and unjust journey with these people. By the end of the retreat Margaret realised that the frustration that had built up after nine years of this ministry had dropped away and she understood that, as her director suggested, this was for her, 'a call within a call,' since she has such unique gifts to enable her to respond to the needs of the people. The community in Norway promised to continue to pray for Margaret and her ministry and the trafficked people.

Margaret had initially commenced this ministry to those involved in sex trafficking in 2004 in response to an open request to the Congregation from Sister Katrina Brill, Congregational Leader, for a Sister to work in this area. At that time, Margaret was working in Perth in an Archdiocesan Pastoral Care role for migrants, particularly for the Chinese Catholic Community. Margaret is of Malaysian Chinese background, coming to Australia as an adult, a background which is invaluable working with many of the people she helps. In the NSW Region she has the support of Sisters, from other ethnic backgrounds, who can assist her in the ministry with language and culture issues.

Sister Rosemary (Norway) has already proved how closely she is watching over Margaret and researching anything written with reference to her area of ministry. Rosemary initially emailed Margaret the Pope's brief report in August that announced the 'Pope's message for World Day of Peace will focus on fighting modern slavery' and stated:

Sister Rosemary continued her work of ensuring Margaret was kept in touch with the wider Church as she followed her earlier email with information about how: this ongoing challenge of Pope Francis was echoed in an intervention made September 12, 2014 by Archbishop Silvano M. Tomasi at the United Nations during the XXVII Ordinary Session of the Council of Human Rights on the theme 'to combat contemporary forms of slavery'.
