

Some of you would have known Sr Alice O'Neill, who as Evangelista taught in many of our Catholic schools and came from Leongatha. Alice was 96. She spent some years in Nagambie with Sr Rita Harwood. Sr Henrica Jans, who taught in many of our schools also completed her journey and Sr Sheila Edwards who worked in our homes as Sr Maria Goretti died rather suddenly.

Sr Eileen McHugh has not been so well, in her 90's she looks as young as she did in the 70's when she lived with me at Morwell East.

I visited the huge Asylum Seeker Resource Centre in Footscray and was astounded at the size of the building and all the activity going on—Food bank, meals, lessons, counsellor, interviewing, health checks etc etc People employed in catering and cleaning businesses. Sr Rita, who escorted me around, is looking for donations of toiletries, esp for men, washing powder and tins of tuna, items they run short of in the food bank. You may like to make this your Christmas effort. See back page.

Make sure you read the Christmas edition of Australian Catholics as it has some excellent articles on hope in it. Well worth reading before you get too busy.

May hope fill your lives in all you experience, hope brought to us by the love of Jesus, who though born in poverty, achieved all God wanted him to do. REFLECTION

Advent is a special time when we can reflect on the past year and look forward to another year of Liturgical celebrations. For Mary and Joseph this time of the year was a very new beginning—they became a family. What thoughts and plans would have been talked about as they approached the birth of their child! What hopes and dreams they had, what questions may have been asked about the coming of this child whom they were to call Jesus.

Like all mothers, Mary would have prepared clothes, maybe Joseph made a cradle for the baby to sleep in. The neighbours may have also been looking forward to a new child in their midst. And yet at the end of her pregnancy Mary and Joseph had to travel from their home to Bethlehem at the whim of a ruler, to be enrolled for a census. And on their arrival had to be satisfied with space in the part of the house where the animals were housed. The cradle, and maybe some of the clothes left behind, because of the necessity of carrying luggage.

Maybe this Advent we could spend some time with Mary and Joseph imagining how they felt, how disappointed they may have been, how Joseph may have felt having only an animal shelter for his wife at the time of the birth of the child.

We often look at the romantic side of this birth, the meaning, of which, for the world was earth-shattering. Yet despite the joy of their child much suffering and hardship was still to come. Visitors were the shepherds sent by the angels to welcome this child. For how long Mary and Joseph remained in this dwelling we do not know, but we would expect Joseph to go looking for accommodation and work to support his family until they could return to their home.

Yet more was to come! Three wise men came looking for them some time later—looking for a King—bringing gifts fit for a king. Unfortunately Herod came to know of this child and sought to kill him, bringing sorrow and grief to many other mothers in his attempt to destroy this child.

Imagine Mary carrying the child and Joseph sneaking off in the night after being warned by the angel of Herod's intent, to flee to a strange land, to follow an unknown path, not knowing what dangers were ahead or what the future held, but desperate to protect this God-given child. The gifts may have been a God-send to help them pay their way, to find accommodation and set up a workshop when they arrived in Egypt. We would hope that strangers they met along the way were kind to them, that brigands did not rob them or try to kill them.

Hundreds of families today are doing exactly the same thing. Fleeing from persecution, from the threat of death, sneaking off under cover of darkness, not knowing what the future holds, but hoping for kindness along the way, that pirates will not fleece them of what money they have managed to take with them. Praying they and their children will survive whether journeying by land or sea. Many manage to reach our shores, but are they finding kindness from strangers or seemingly an unchristian welcome!! Millions are living in refugee camps struggling to survive, living on what strangers provide for them.

The Mission Statement of the Josephite Associates is an inspiration for those who wish to live the Josephite Charism in their day to day lives. It reads:

As Josephite Associates we respond to the call to live the charism of MARY MACKILLOP and FR JULIAN TENISON WOODS in our daily lives, in our own unique way.

We support one another by FRIENDSHIP PRAYER and SERVICE to make a difference in our Local area and so further the Reign of God in our world.

One aspect of that Charism is to respect the human dignity of every person. Maybe this Advent you could spend some time reflecting on the Mission Statement and how you live it out. If Mary and Joseph with Jesus turned up in your town today, how would you welcome them! Refugees they were—Refugees we have in our midst today.

May your families know the peace and love that Jesus came to bring to our world.

ASSOCIATE PROFILE- A Spark in the Kimberley

Since 2004, retired teacher John Spark and his multiskilled wife Julie, have set off in their caravan to spend a few months at Warmun, to be part of the Josephite Mission in the East Kimberley. Their presence in the Gija Aboriginal Community exudes the Josephite Charism and the love of Nagapuny (Gija word for God). As one child said, "That mob are here again to help us"!

Home for the Sparks is Bendigo, Victoria, but in retirement they headed off in a caravan not knowing what was ahead. They caught up with Sr Mary Ryan who suggested they travel to the East Kimberley. Well you could say, they were 'famous last words' because what followed was a string of Josephite encounters.



Julie and John's travels took them to Mirrilingki, a Spirituality Centre at Turkey Creek (Warmun) which is part of the Broome Diocese. Sr Frances Maguire soon had them on board for 18 weeks engaging Julie's wonderful cooking and sewing skills. It wasn't long before a request by local elder Eileen Bray for skirts to be used at the Joonba (corroboree). It wasn't long before John got to know the Sisters at Ngalangangpum School and his time was being taken up with the school's reading recovery program.

It soon became clear that 'retirement' was not quite the correct word for John and Julie. With a family of six children and 11 grandchildren there was a lot to keep up with, however, their call to the Kimberley continued, and every year since 2004 they have escaped the Victorian Winter and given their time to the community of Warmun.

"We just love the Josephites", says Julie. "Teachers need support and we have something to offer". John just loves teaching and believes strongly that God has blessed him well and they have a desire to give something back.

This year as John continues on the Reading Program, Julie has been busy making stoles and banners for the celebration of Sacraments, pitching in with cooking the kid's lunches, cleaning and whatever needed to be done.

In such an isolated area, there's always the cry at school – "We need kids taken to Kununurra – who can we get? John and Julie are there". "We need someone to get the stew ready for lunch – John and Julie are there". "A child is unsettled in the class and needs a TLC break – John and Julie are there".

Mary MacKillop said "Never see a need without doing something about it".

Something special happens in the Warmun Community when the Sparks return each year... they spark (ignite) a lot of Josephite Charism around the place. According to the local Josephite mob – they are honorary Kimberley Josephites! "It's not what they do, it's the way they do it."

TIMOR LESTE AWARD FOR SISTERS OF ST JOSEPH

The President of the Republic of Timor-Leste, Taur Matan Ruak, officially bestowed "Ordem de Timor" Medals on twenty-six non-Timorese people and groups who fought for Timor-Leste's independence.

The ceremony was held in Dili on August 30, the 15th Anniversary of the Referendum through which the Timorese people finally gained their freedom.

iSr Josephine Mitchell and Susan Connelly accepted the Medal on behalf of all those who had worked in the Mary MacKillop Institute for East Timor's struggle in the 1990s.

The Award recognised the solidarity of the Sisters of St Joseph, Religious of other Congregations and Colleagues who had the privilege of working and praying together for justice and freedom for East Timor.

Others receiving recognition included the journalists known as the Balibo Five, whose posthumous awards were received by family members.

SR JOAN HEALY RECEIVES ORDER OF AUSTRALIA

On Friday, September 5, Joan Healy gathered with 169 other awardees to be recognised and thanked for their outstanding service to humanity in the fields of medicine, academia, advocacy, research, law, education, human rights, local and state politics, public service, media, the defence forces, police and fire brigade, sport and disability services.

Joan's AM, the Order of Australia, Member in the General Division was specifically for her 'significant service to the Catholic Church in Australia and as a social welfare advocate in South East Asia'. Joan's sister, Mary, and I, representing family and the Sisters of St Joseph of Victoria-Tasmania, felt proud, grateful and united with all our present and past Sisters, whom Joan represents.

Others were recognised for their voluntary involvement in their own rural and suburban communities. It seemed to me that their service like Joan's had been given generously over whole lifetimes. Some recipients glowed with pride from their wheelchairs and stood tall holding their walkers.

The setting was grand and dignified – the Ballroom in Government House in Melbourne, with its ornate ceilings and décor, is even larger than its counterpart in

Buckingham Palace! The jazz band from Presbyterian Ladies' College greeted us with fanfares and accompaniment from an elevated gallery. Family and friends in their finery filled the room to capacity.

His Excellency the Honourable Alex Chernov AC QC, not only congratulated and thanked the award recipients, but he paid tribute also to their families and those who supported them. He said that we never achieve or make a difference on our own. There are others alongside us who inspire, companion and encourage us.

STATUE OUTSIDE SACRED HEART CATHEDRAL BENDIGO MOULDED AND DESIGNED BY JENNY STEINER

Mary is no longer with us in person but very present in spirit therefore we can see through the statue.

In the centre is a wooden cross, made by Jenny, which seems to be supporting the statue – this is so because the cross was Mary's strength and support.

Handmade ceramic Rosary beads drape the cross with a crucifix such as Mary wore.

The Blue emblem Mary wore on her habit with the three J's and the AM for Ave Maria can also be seen.

The garment is separated at the back to represent the rent made by the excommunication.

From the back one can see a photo imprinted in the glass – a photo of the whole school at St Joseph's Numurkah in 1924.

The Shards of glass represent wings which speak of Mary's holiness and create a spiritual aura about her.

The glass underneath the mantle form her dress.

A lovely afternoon was spent with the nine Associates who came to the Mission Centre at Newtown, Hobart, where we spent some time reflecting on the Mission and also listening to the wonderful work that they are doing. A small group is working for Days for Girls sewing; Hospice visiting; parish work; singing with a choir group who encourage young women to join them to give them hope; and being a ray of sunshine to all she meets. I felt most inspired by the way they are living out the Josephite charism.

At Launceston six Associates (four apologies) gathered for afternoon tea and some sharing of their mission. One does a lot in the local Churches setting up for Mass and making sure everything runs smoothly; working in the office of the Emmanual Spirituality Centre; praying and interceding with Mary MacKillop for those who ask for prayers. They also were an inspirational group of Josephite women living our Charism.

The roses in Tasmania are truly splendid and those at Hobart had long, long stems. I felt quite jealous as mine are nowhere near as abundant or such huge blooms. I had a lovely time taking photos on my lpad.
