For the "young at heart" spring fever sets in with an increase in energy, vitality and a willingness to delight in the lingering sunshine. We are inclined to take time to become re-enchanted with the wonder and blessings of our everyday lives as beauty, new life and freshness burst forth around us. Others seem to take a bit longer to farewell feelings of sluggishness befriended during Winter.

For dreamers and poets, Spring is a time of inspiration and engaging with the richness and sacredness of nature. Gerard Manley Hopkins touches on this sense in his poem "Spring".

For Associates, committed to living a daily option for *Friendship, Prayer and Service*, Spring might also be a time for creating fresh possibilities for the renewal of our soul. As we go about our ordinary spring cleaning tasks, even the smell of our "Spring Fresh" Fabric Softener can prompt our hearts to sing when we factor in time for a Spiritual Spring Clean as well.

It might seem that Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods sometimes made choices and decisions that involved colouring outside the lines, as they opened their hearts to respond to God's vision, plan and design for them. While certain "springlike" phases in their lives were quite short-lived in terms of having a "dream run", their charism and influence has had a lasting, far-reaching impact

across time and place. In his address at the *Commemoration of Julian Tension Woods Park*, Penola, 23 May 2010, Fr. Frank Brennan SJ mentions the impact Fr Julian Tenison Woods had on his great-grandfather and family living in Maryborough in 1881 and also acknowledges "his concern for the plight of indigenous Australians and new migrants in remoter parts of Australia". Who can become a Josephite Associate?

What happens if I accept this invitation?

You will have opportunities to learn more about Mary MacKillop and the Josephite Associates. You will receive the Newsletter which is published four times a year and includes a prayer sheet. You will have the Handbook as a personal resource.

Can I formalise my commitment?

Yes. At an appropriate time you can request or be invited to formalise your commitment to live the charism of Mary MacKillop and become a Member of the Josephite Associates

How will this happen?

There will be a ritual which will focus on prayer together and the presentation of the Associate badge and certificate. When Josephite Associates make a formalised response to live the charism of Mary MacKillop, they receive a badge to wear as an external symbol of the commitment they have made.

The Josephite Associates' badge incorporates elements of the Sisters' emblem.... the Cross, the monogram of Mary, the Js for Joseph and John the Baptist, the water symbolic of Christian Baptism and the Candle for the Risen Christ, Light of the World

HISTORY OF THIS SOUTHSIDE GROUP SOUTH OF THE RIVER ASSOCIATE GROUP (PREVIOUSLY KNOW AS MOOROOKA GROUP)

What a privilege to be writing this piece on behalf of the 'SOUTH OF THE RIVER' Associates Group but formerly known as the Moorooka Associates. When I offered to write this for the ladies and men of Moorooka, I thought it best to do some research first! What a wonderful treasure trove to unfold!

These wonderful ladies and their husbands certainly walk in the 'footsteps of Mary MacKillop and are totally devoted to her Charism and each of them lives this out in their daily lives.

Many of the writings of Mary MacKillop are alive and well within this group!

Never see a need without doing something about it

Let God guide you in all your ways

Let us really love one another

God will provide for the future

So great is the strength we possess in our unity

God will protect and work with us

These are just a few sayings of Mary which have become important to this group

The first Sister of St Joseph arrived in Moorooka around Easter time in 1929 to provide Catholic Education in Moorooka. They travelled each day from Mary Immaculate Annerley. In the years following, the Parishioners of St Brendan's Moorooka built a Convent for the Sisters to live in, which was opened in 1932. Subsequently, the Sisters moved into the Convent which became home to many Sisters up until this year, 2015. At one time it was home to 17 Sisters, including Sr Joan Finucane who became the Coordinator of the Associates in Queensland and held this Office for approximately 26 years. Also during this time and for a number of years, a wonderful Associate, Glenda Milne lived at the Convent ministering to the people and Parish as well. Sr

Denise Brosnan the last Sister of St Joseph to live in the Convent moved out in July and was farewelled at a Mass at St Brendan's Catholic Church on Saturday August 1 2015. At this gathering, all the Sisters and people who had lived at Moorooka and Salisbury were remembered and included as well. The Convent closed officially on August 1, 2015.

The Moorooka Associates was originally formed prior to 1980 by Sr Gemma MacGilvery. Sr Gemma wanted to retire to Moorooka and commenced this group so that people would be able to come together in the Spirit of Mary MacKillop and follow her Charism. Sr Gemma also commenced a group at Sunnybank but because the Sunnybank numbers were so few, they combined with the Moorooka Group, meeting in the Convent at Moorooka for Prayer, Friendship, Support. They sought the 'need' within the Community in which they lived and provided Service to the Community and its people whatever their race, colour, financial situation, creed, religion. People from Annerley, Salisbury and Yeronga were also included in these gatherings.

This group of Associates continued to grow and prosper. All who came into this group threw themselves into everything with great gusto and determination. They gave their time freely, baked and distributed food, clothing, furniture – even money where needed. There was never a need that was too big or too small for them to tackle – and tackle they all did – full on and with much camaraderie!!

Many of the Associates have completed the National Pilgrimage "In The Footsteps of Mary". One Associate, Mary McKew (RIP 10/8/2015), has completed this journey 12 times!! That surely must be a record! A little bird also tells me that Sr Genevieve Carroll as the Queensland Coordinator, has completed 17 trips with 2015 being her 18th Pilgrimage. Is that a record for a Religious Sister of St Joseph!!

The Associates, up until this current year, have been meeting in the Meeting Rooms under St Brendan's Church four times per year. Each meeting commences with a time of Prayer, Reflection, Sharing and Song. This is followed by time to share, talk and mingle together. During this time everyone is treated to morning tea and/or lunch which is provided by the incumbent organisers at the time with many of the attendees bringing along wonderful 'home baked' goodies as well. While all of this is happening many of the needs of the community are identified and ideas on how best to meet these needs are decided upon. Cards, such as 'Get Well', 'Sympathy', 'Thinking of You', etc., are on the table for all to sign and these are then posted to the appropriate people. There is always a 'donation bowl' on the table and by the end of the gathering, these wonderful people have donated much. This money is now being donated to various ministries of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The opening meeting to greet the year is generally held on 2 February. The next, in early May around Mother's Day and celebrates all women. The 3rd is in August to celebrate the Feast of Mary MacKillop and the 4th in November closes the year with a wonderful Christmas lunch complete with Santa and gifts. This final gathering also commemorates the Birth of the Christ Jesus, a fitting end to a wonderful year of Prayer, Service and Friendship.

This long time Group of Associates, a number of whom were there at the beginning and are still attending this group, are an amazing group of people whom Mary MacKillop would be proud of as they live our her spirit. The original members still with us today are Jean White, Aileen Baker and Noela McGee.

My sincere thanks to Jean White an original member, Mary MacKew (RIP) and the many ladies and Sisters who have provided me with the information to write this piece, but especially for trusting me to do so. Long live the South of the River Group!



Josephite Associates Townsville, Feast Day Celebrations.

The annual Mary MacKillop Family Fair was held on Sunday 9th August. The fair is celebrated every year around the Feast Day of Mary MacKillop (8 August). It is a collaborative effort between the 3 Mary

MacKillop Childcare Centres (Mundingburra/Kirwan/Rasmussen), St Joseph's Catholic School Mundingburra, St Margaret Mary's College and several parishes.

A great day was had by all and we are very grateful for all the support we received to help make it a successful event. Planning for next year's event is underway already.

Josephite Associates Townsville New Venture.

Late July saw us meet with Sr Chris Symonds and Sr Margaret Robertson regarding a new venture. The Townsville Associates are assisting the prison chaplains of Townsville to introduce Mary MacKillop Kit Bags to the Townsville Prison. These bags are given to prisoners on their release. They contain simple items such

as toiletries, phone card, pad, pen, toothbrush etc. It is hoped these bags assist the prisoners during the first 72 hours of their release. The Associates and chaplains have joined forces with St Margaret Mary's College and 50 bags are now ready for distribution. It is hoped in the next few weeks that we may obtain assistance from some other interested groups which will allow us to assemble the bags on a larger scale... Watch this space!!.
