May the season of Lent bring you many blessings and may they continue throughout the Year of Mercy.



Now we all are one

It's been a remarkable few years.

Really, it wasn't at all long ago that the Goulburn Josephite Associates and Prayer Members, together with lots of relatives and friends, gathered excitedly with the Sisters of St Joseph in Goulburn. We were there to participate in a telecast from Rome of the canonisation of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop.

This was personal; we were all a part of it. After all, she was ours.

Then, a couple of years ago, we Associates had the privilege of watching at close quarters the coming together of the Goulburn Sisters and the Central Sisters of St Joseph. We weren't quite so personally involved, but we saw – and marvelled at – the courage, the determination, the hard work and finally the absolutely joyous fusion of two wonderful groups of the people that we loved.

And we wondered, how we wondered, at the frailty of the human condition that created this separation in the first place.

Most recently, on the eve of All Saints, at simultaneous meetings at MacKillop House in Canberra and at Leeton in the Riverina, we Goulburn Associates held a ceremony of fusion with the Josephite Associates (NSW) followed by a delightful, if far too calorific, lunch.

Now we too are one, and for us the circle is complete.

We were joined for the occasion by Sr Noelene Quinane, Sr Mary Ellen Griffin, and Sr Therese McGarry from the NSW Leadership Team, and Beverley Badcock and Eileen Stevenson from the Josephite Associates (NSW) Governance Group.

The ceremony itself, the Ritual of Fusion, was a simple one, made all the more beautiful by its simplicity. It centred on prayer, readings from the Constitution of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart and the Gospel of Matthew, symbols of Fusion,



presentation of badges and books of prayer, and a final blessing. The centrepiece of the symbolism was the mingling of waters brought from Sydney and Goulburn, creating a new, inseparable and constantly refreshing entity. Simple, but remarkably powerful.

During the Ritual, Sr Therese reflected on the Gospel reading, the Beatitudes, inviting Associates to identify for ourselves where we saw ourselves within the spectrum of attributes offered to us by Jesus and where in that spectrum we as Associates could most effectively offer ourselves.

In the same vein, Sr Noelene, in the words of Sr Mary Ellen O'Donoghue, invited us to embrace with courage and confidence the wider Associate framework of which we are now a part, continuing to share in the same Josephite charism of which we had always been a part but exulting in the gifts and wisdom of the broader group in which we now share.

We were reminded, too, that this process, for Sisters and for Associates, was not a merger; it was a fusion, and there was great wisdom in defining it so. Its elements have formed something new; like the mingled Goulburn and Sydney waters, it cannot be undone. Fusion, in science, produces light and heat, and great energy. It is this energy, this spirit, that we are challenged to harness and to use for the greater glory of the God who loves us.

As Aristotle reminds us, this energy of the mind is the essence of life. Long may it flourish!

Many knew the labyrinthine paths that Margaret had to negotiate to overcome obstacles along the way. Faced with seemingly insurmountable regulations and roadblocks, she always held fast to her desire to be a member of the Sisters of St Joseph. The presence of past and present Congregational Leaders and her many friends and supporters reinforced that she had not been alone in her desire.

It was an honour to have Bishop Peter Ingham as the celebrant. His presence and the warmth of his greeting highlighted the friendships that form in pastoral ministries - the focus of Margaret's involvement throughout her many years in New South Wales.

Sister Mary Baker and Sister Christina Neunzerling ensured that there was beautiful liturgical music to enrich the ceremony. Every hymn that Margaret had chosen was meaningful and resonated in the hearts of those present. The Alleluia was sung with high energy, flowing from joyful and thankful hearts.

Margaret invited Dr Kerrie Hide to give the reflection for the occasion. She opened up the treasure chest of her deeply contemplative insights into the readings - Rev 7:2-4; John 13:1-3 and Matt 5: 1-12. These were the readings of the feast day read in every parish, yet what Kerrie shared with us related specifically to the occasion of Margaret's consecration of life. Kerrie's reflection drew us into the depths of these scriptures and nourished and inspired us. Her reflection was an invitation into deep heart-awareness. As Sister Monica Cavanagh conducted the Rite of Profession and Margaret professed her vows there was a collective sense of grace and thanksgiving.

Meeting of Josephite Associates 2015

A Josephite Associates Meeting was held at Mary MacKillop Place North Sydney, 16-18 October, 2015. On Friday evening, Associate Delegates from each region reported on significant happenings in their areas since the last Conference in 2013.

On Saturday Sister Monica Cavanagh, Congregational Leader, gave an informal presentation based on the 26th General Chapter theme, 'At the Heart of Life – God Draws Us in a New Communion.'

Questions were raised regarding how we might deal with the future and how we can refresh and challenge our commitment.

Sister Clare Noonan gave an interesting insight into four key areas – Future, Governance, Change and Sustainability. The theme for Clare's presentation was 'Towards the Future and Beyond.'

Following this input a discussion on Moving Forward was activated using three key questions:

• What is the deepest desire for the Associate Movement as we move into the future?

• What will be the Roles and Relationships of the Sisters and Associates in the future?

• What is the way forward in developing communication links?

Outcomes from these discussions were collated and following further group discussion it was decided that a three-to-five year strategic plan of action be developed for the future of the Associates.

The International Josephite Associate Leadership Team (IJALT) used this meeting as preparation for the Associates Conference to be held in April 2017. A three-to-five year strategic plan was drawn up at a meeting with the International Josephite Associate Leadership Team in January 2016 and reports from this meeting will be forwarded to all Group Leaders for discussion and feedback at a later date.

Further information regarding the 2017 Conference will also be sent to Group leaders with expressions of interest for leaders who may wish to attend. All costs for the 2017 Conference will be at the attendees' own expense.

Penshurst Josephite Associates Advent Reflection Morning

Saturday 28th November 2015 St Declan's Parish Meeting Room

The church bells rang out throughout the meeting room as the Group in attendance became attentive to the Facilitator, Mary Gallagher.

Mary welcomed us all as we commenced our Advent Reflection journey with short passages of prayers, ending with words from the movie Zorba the Greek: "So be careful, Alexis, and my blessing be with you, never to wound another person's heart". Have you been wounded, hurt, aware of God's forgiveness, to mention a few of the words from the prayers spoken by the group?

We were asked to meditate on the readings and invited to offer our thoughts on these prayers.

Other prayers were read on St Mary of the Cross and about courage. The hymn "Mary of the Cross" was sung with pride and a sense of real belonging.

We explored the Feast of the Assumption and how Mary may have lived her life with Joseph and Jesus. How did we imagine Mary: Child, Daughter, Mother, Home maker, Woman of Faith? And the list went on, with much discussion. Do we acknowledge that God has a unique dream for each of us too, as he did for Our Lady?

To conclude our journey, we recited a Reconciliation Prayer, "Give your heart a home". This prayer opened up a keenness within the group to discuss forgiveness. To share one member's story, who had come from Africa to Australia. A teacher from the school, where her child attends, asked if she would talk on apartheid to some of the classes. Her reaction was to recall the hurt from the years of oppression and she felt she could not talk on the topic. She had believed that, since living in Australia, she had overcome her painful experiences from apartheid. The good news is that she did make her way to the school and spoke to four classes that had come together for this session. The experience closed the door on the old feelings that she had been suppressing. She knew that she was free to continue her faith filled journey with peace in her heart and mind.

The final hymn, "You are Mine", was sung and our spirits were lifted as we left the meeting room to await the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The Advent Season of Hope, Faith, Joy and Peace lives on.

What legacy has St Patrick left us?

'Come back and walk among us once more' (St Patrick's Confessions). Many legends have sprung up around the story of St Patrick. The truth about him can be found in his own life story called His Confessions.

Patrick was one of many who was captured, brought to Ireland and sold as a slave. He says that it was here in exile and in loneliness that he came to know God, to have conversations with Him, to trust in God and His love and protection. (Confessions)

After six years in slavery he escaped, went home and studied. He says in his Confessions that he could constantly hear the voice of the Irish calling him to come back. Eventually he was ordained a priest and a bishop and came back to Ireland as a missionary in the year 432 AD.

His mission in Ireland was far from easy. Patrick preached the Gospel message of Jesus, which was love, compassion, kindness, peace, forgiveness and justice. He had to suffer much. He says, 'I am convinced that God kept me safe from all that is evil because of His Spirit that lives in me. I came to the Irish heathen to preach the Good News and to put up with insults from unbelievers. I endured many persecutions even to the extent of chains.' (Confessions)

What is the legacy that Saint Patrick has left us?

• His spirit of prayer; a great devotion to the Blessed Trinity; and one of the most beautiful prayers that we have is called the Breastplate of St Patrick.

• His missionary methods; he did not destroy the customs of the Heathen Irish but he christened them. Today in Ireland there are many places of pilgrimage such as sacred places and holy wells. He challenged evil practices with the message of the Gospel.

• He said himself that he was an exile and a refugee. We can pray to him for the thousands of refugees who are fleeing persecution and violence and for those who have to migrate to find work.

• Patrick spoke out with very strong language against slavery. His courage and example can encourage us to speak out today against human trafficking.

• Patrick preached and practised justice to all, especially the poor, the down trodden and the persecuted. He had great respect for women. We can follow his examples and do the same. St Patrick is a saint for our times.
