

DITORIAL



Greetings to all Queensland Associates,

2016 is already shaping up to becoming a special and busy year with cause for much Jubilation.



For the Universal Church and the Josephite family there will be occasions to experience joyful celebration, reflection, change and gratitude from deep within. We recognise that Pope Francis has declared this year to be The Extraordinary (outside the 25 year cycle) Jubilee of Year of Mercy and he has expressed his desire that "the year to come will be steeped in mercy...(MV 5).

The logo and motto together provide a fitting summary of what the Jubilee Year is all about with the underlying themes of grace, charity, love, action, pilgrimage, encounter, justice, harmony and solidarity.

Also, many of you may have already saved the dates for this year's Sesquicentenary and Centenary Jubilee Celebrations (Qld) as per the details provided in the Summer Seasonal Newsletter, 2015. Details are also outlined in this edition of the newsletter. The theme for celebrating 150 years since the Foundation of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart at

Penola is *Listening to the Heartbeat of the World*. It is such a fitting time to be invited to embrace this call to action in conjunction with the central notion in many of the Jubilee resource material - that mercy is indeed "love in action". We are constantly reminded of God's love and mercy for us in the Scriptures and one of the most well known Psalms (23) continues to comfort us with the understanding that God's "goodness and mercy

accompanies us all the days of our life." In keeping with the motto for this year, Psalm 145: 8-9 also reminds us.

The rich season of Lent has come around quickly this year and this is a time when we embark on a personal pilgrimage that will culminate in the celebration of the Easter Triduum. During Lent, God's mercy and love is made tangible and visible. Mercy is "what God does for us as much as shows us and gives to us." (Joan Chittister, 2010, p10. in God's Tender Mercy: Reflections on Forgiveness., Twenty-Third Publications). Lent is a season that has been traditionally associated with personal growth through "giving up" and denial. Perhaps this is an appropriate year to focus on fixing our vision outwardly -"giving to" and "doing for others, as well.

Love, charity, forgiveness and mercy, it would seem, are not only to be received but also to be embraced - shown and given to others.

Pauline Morgan rsj has produced an excellent article "Living into Mercy in Our Everyday Lives" (12 February 2016, http://www.sosj.org.au/). We realise that there is always the possibility to accept yet another invitation during this Holy Year when we consider her words as follows:

"As we become ever more conscious of the grace of Mercy, may we be drawn ever more deeply into the new communion that is at the heart of the life".

For us, as Associates committed to living in *Prayer, Friendship and Service*, the closing of the Door of Mercy on 20 November 2016 may mark the end of the Jubilee Year of Mercy but certainly not the end of the blessings and our experiences of a God who loves, consoles, forgives , pardons and brings hope.

The invitation to live "mercifully" remains ongoing. At the end of the journey this year we hope to be able to settle in at home with the new graces and blessings of the Holy Year of Mercy and above all with the "hospitality of a God who is always welcoming and at home." As with the psalms, we can take much food for thought from this beautiful poem-*The Door of Mercy*, used here with

PRAYER

INTRODUCTION:

This Year is the Jubilee Year of Mercy and Bernadette Roche has written beautifully and inspiringly in her Editorial about our understanding of Mercy so our prayer for this season will be centred on the logo for the Year of Mercy.

This logo represents an image quite important to the early Church - that of the Son having taken upon his shoulders the lost soul. The logo has been designed in such a way so as to express the profound way in which the Good Shepherd touches humanity and does so with the love

that has the power to change one's life. The logo also demonstrates that Christ sees with the eye of humanity and humanity with the eye of Christ. The three concentric ovals suggest the movement of Christ as he invites us to move from the darkness into the love of the Father.

READING: from Misericordia Vultus P 13 by Pope Frances

Jesus, seeing the crowds of people who followed him, realized that they were tired and exhausted, lost and without a guide, and he felt deep compassion for them (Mt9:36). On the basis of this compassionate love he healed the sick who were presented to him (Mt 14:14), and with just a few loaves of bread and fish he satisfied the enormous crowd (Mt15:37). What moved Jesus in all of these situations was nothing other than mercy, with which he read the hearts of those he encountered and responded to their deepest need.

REFLECTION

Perhaps, the following might provide some words to reflect upon in this Year of Mercy

SONG: Open my eyes, Lord

PRAYER:

God of Mercy hear our prayer and listen to our hopes. Free us from the urge to judge and condemn others and give us accepting, merciful and humble hearts. We ask this through Christ, friend of sinners and the Spirit of Mercy.

a) Brochure

b) Financial Sustainability of the Associate Movement

As we are all well aware, the Associate Movement can only be sustained by the following:

- Dedicated Planning Committee to administer the Movement
- Committed members who live inspired by St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods
- Financial contribution from members

We have done a budget for 2016 which includes the following:

- i) Administration Costs postage, paper for the Newsletters, Brochures and costs of printing etc
- ii) Teleconferences for the Associates Planning Committee
- iii) Travelling expenses
- iv) Accommodation
- v) Secretarial Assistance for the Newsletter
- vi) Formation and Induction -Badges, Handbooks, Certificates, Candle

In order to sustain the Association, about \$10 000 a year is needed to cover costs.

Firstly, we would like to thank those who have sent donations towards expenses over the past 12 months and many of you who have supported the Associates over many years.

Last year, we banked \$195.00 in the central fund, which is far less than our annual costs. The Congregation is still financially supporting the Associate Movement and will continue to do so until it is able to sustain itself. Of course, the services of the Planning Committee and myself are given voluntarily.

Where does that leave us? We now have 250 registered members in Queensland. A suggestion was made that we ask each member to make an annual donation. Some are able to contribute

more than others. We suggest that you decide what your contribution can be from the following suggestions:
