
to read about the *Sisters' Sequicentenary Coffee Table* book to be published as part of the celebrations this year.

PRAYER

INTRODUCTION:

In our last Seasonal News, Sr Moya encouraged us to reflect upon Pope Francis' call to each of us to enter into this Jubilee Year of Mercy and so become agents of mercy in our world. At this point in time, we are approximately halfway through this special year. Can it really be six

months ago? How are we accepting the challenge of this twelve months of Jubilee. Will we immerse ourselves and allow God to transform us?

Pope Francis offers us some very practical ways to live well in this year of grace. "Do not judge or condemn but forgive and give, avoiding gossip, envy and jealousy; have a heart open to the fringes of society and bring consolation, mercy and solidarity to people who live in precarious situations; take up the corporal and spiritual acts of mercy with joy. Let us be renewed by God's mercy." We have the example of Jesus as our guide. He healed, he comforted, and he understood; he gave hope; he welcomed; and he revealed to us the presence of the God who cares for each and every one of us.



REFLECTION:

Are we able to continue Jesus' vision for our world? It is the same dream that Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods followed during their lifetimes. Are we able to continue to listen to that heartbeat of the world and to respond to God's invitation?

God of Mercy, fill us with your love. Open our eyes to the wonder and goodness in all people and make us courageous in accepting challenge. Renew our spirit and form us as agents for change in our world. We ask this through Christ, our wisdom, our guide and the source of all mercy.

SERVICE:

Mary MacKillop showed by her life that she firmly respected the dignity of each and every person regardless of their circumstances in life. This was obvious in her actions and in the way she approached each person with genuine compassion. We can recall some of the stories where Mary interacted with people. There was the prisoner Fagan who showed genuine remorse; the tiny orphan boy at Kincumber who asked Mary to be with him as he died; Mary's long and difficult journey to be present to the sister who was dying of burns caused from the exploding kerosene lamp; or the woman whom Mary sat beside in the gutter when she recognised that lack of education was her main problem. We could all think of many other circumstances in Mary's life where her compassion led her to act in a way that revealed the love of God to the other

person. Mary led by example. Her love of God and her acceptance of God's love for her compelled her to act likewise.

As Josephite Associates we are called to Prayer, Friendship and Service in the spirit of Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods. Most of us would readily agree that we do well with the friendship and prayer components of our call, but maybe we have to assess how well we take up the call to service. We could use the image of a windmill. It stands tall on three strong legs and pumps water from below ground to the surface. If one of the legs is a bit wonky, then the structure will not stand tall and be effective. It cannot pump life-giving water efficiently. So too, if we perform well in Prayer and Friendship, but are a bit wobbly or lacking in the Service aspect, then we only have two of our three legs working. We will not be able to stand tall and will not be fully efficient in our role as Associates.

On page 12 of our Associate Handbook there are some concrete examples of how we might be able to serve others eg

Caring for the needy, the poor and the lonely in a sensitive way

Participating in social justice activities Taking affirmative action on justice on behalf of others

Supporting the work of the Sisters' mission Ministering to others in our everyday life and activities



There are many and varied ways that we can be of service today just in the context of our everyday lives. We can all recognise the benefit of a kind word or action when things may be a bit tough; a visit to someone who is confined to their home; being as active and engaged in our parish liturgies as we are able; joining with others to create change through education or through attitudes; or by supporting the work of the Mary MacKillop Foundation, which provides assistance for sustainable projects within Australia, or Mary MacKillop International which works with communities in our wider world to promote the value and goodness of individuals through education, training, or life-changing projects for communities. If we can be more conscious of this service aspect of our lives as Josephite associates, then we will truly become more effective in our ministry, and follow Mary's example of "never seeing a need without doing something about it".

A CTION IN LOCAL AREAS

Moorooka Associates

Sr Moya was able to attend a gathering of the Moorooka Associates recently and to share some of the vision of the Associate Planning Committee with the members. This was a very positive experience and the members provided some comments and suggestions. These are included here for your consideration also.

- Promote the work that Josephites are doing now, not what they were doing in the past
- Older people should be left to uphold Mary's spirit prayerfully and in love and kindness.
- Maybe there could be more of a commitment now not just attending the meeting!
- Continuity
- Same direction for each Associate group (unity throughout the Associates)

- Diversity within the groups, such as prayers, leaders, doers etc
- No exclusion because of disability
- 90% of those gathered were over 80 the challenge of membership into the future
- Ongoing formation need for training within the group
- What do we mean by Service?
- Perhaps someone could speak in the parish

Gate Ministry - Rockhampton Associate Group

We first heard about the Gate Ministry through discussions with Townsville Associates who had recently begun the ministry there. Sr Chris Symonds RSJ visited Rockhampton on 5th March 2016 and spoke with the Associates and our 2 local Josephite primary schools at Wandal and Park Avenue to explain how the Gate Ministry works and to seek help from the schools to collect the various items needed. Since then, we have been looking to widen the scope of our collection base.

The Gate Ministry provides Mary MacKillop Kit Bags to prisoners who, on their release from prison, may have no support in place; no one to meet them; may have been in prison for extended periods of time and have lost contact with friends or relatives; or may have mental health issues. The bags contain basic toiletries to enable a person to survive for 72 hours after release. Statistics suggest that the first 72 hours is the most vulnerable period for a newly released prisoner. The kit bags contain a towel, basic toiletries such as soap, shampoo, dental items, tissues, a comb, and a razor. It also provides a \$20 food voucher for use in Woolworths, Caltex or Big W. 2 stamped envelopes, a biro and a notebook are also included, along with a \$10 Telstra phone card. In metropolitan areas there is also a GO card for transport, but we do not have adequate local transport facilities here. A contact list of organisations who can provide further assistance is also included.

The school communities have been encouraged to collect as many of the required items as possible without having to incur great expense, eg collecting sample soaps and shampoo packs that are available for use in motels etc when travelling. We have now provided our first ten kit bags to the Rockhampton Correctional Centre and their staff were very keen to be involved in this project. Correctional Centre staff assess who would most benefit from the kit bags and they issue them directly. The Associates do not have personal contact with the men, but will be involved in the collection of the goods and assembly of the kits.

Our Associate group is very excited to be able to participate in this expression of service to our community and are keen to continue into the future. We have had no problems fulfilling the prayer and friendship aspects of being Associates and see this as a very positive way that we can now be involved in service.







CLEMONT GROUP SERVING THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITY:

As I indicated in my earlier report, many of our Associates are involved in community groups. Several of them volunteer twice a week at the local Vinnies store and are members of the St. Vincent de Paul committee here in Clermont.

One lady is a long term member of the CWA and has held executive positions within the group. Another is President of the Meal on Wheels committee and on the Hospital Board and several others act as drivers and deliverers on a regular basis.

Many of our members are Readers, Eucharistic Ministers and Lay Leaders in our Parish and one of them takes R.E. in the local Primary School.

Two ladies are Sacristans for our church.

We have a Care and Concern group from our church and so catering is organised for local funerals and meals supplied for people in emergency need.

Most of our ladies have been involved in this for many years.

Some of our ladies visit the sick in our local hospital and in their homes and if they are Catholic take Communion to them.

As we have a Mass once a month at the local Aged Care facility there are a number of members who organize and attend these Masses and spend time with the elderly afterwards.

We have just had our local Show this past week and many of the organizing committee and volunteers were also Associates.

Most local events will have some involvement from our members so as you can see we are widely represented in the community.

As ours is a small community it is hard not to be in a service roll at some time or other every year.

VENTS

Townsville Associate Group Visit: Sr Moya visited with the Townsville Associates on 27th May while she was attending to some of her state-wide duties in her current ministry role. This is part of the plan set by the Associate Planning Committee to try to visit and meet with most Associate Groups over time. A special reconciliation Dinner was also planned in Townsville at this time, which Sr Moya was able to attend.

Rural Conference 29/30 September and 1 /2 October: This will be held in Rockhampton at the Kevin Castles Centre, West and Denham Streets. Friday will be a retreat day and the conference will also feature guest speakers, Madonna King and Geraldine Doogue. This is a wonderful opportunity for those working in regional or remote areas to come together, share experiences, and be refreshed for their ministry. Madonna and Geraldine's sessions will be open to the public and all are welcome, so watch this space for further information as the time draws nearer.



Regional Day: The sisters belonging to the TransPacifico Region will gather at Nundah in Brisbane for Regional Day. There has been time set aside during the day's programme for a presentation by the Associate Planning Committee. Janette has volunteered for this role and will be accompanied by Sr Moya. A power point presentation has been developed and we will have the opportunity to inform the Sisters of the work undertaken to date, what is planned for

the future, and how this might be achieved. We will also be able to explain how we are linked to the International Josephite Leadership Team. Because a sustainable Josephite Association will depend on more members and on training future leaders, copies of the recently completed Induction Manual will be available, and we will have the opportunity to explain how we envisage future leaders could be selected and trained. Copies of our brochures and newsletters will also be available for the Sisters.

Associate Planning Committee: Following on from our meeting at Nundah in February, the Committee has been working to complete the Induction Manual and our sincere thanks must go to Pauline McGuire for her outstanding work in gathering all our suggestions and putting together the Manual. We recognised from the associate survey which was previously commissioned by the Sisters a few years ago, that a resource needed to be available to all groups so that there could be a standardised process whereby new members were welcomed, given relevant information into what is involved in being a Josephite Associate, deciding to accept the challenge and then requesting to be formally inducted. This ensures that all Associate Groups are able to follow the same process for the formation of new Associates. As we are now active all around the world, and the International Josephite Associate Leadership Team is also conscious of the need for this process worldwide, we developed the Queensland



manual. It includes practical information, prayer suggestions, and a formal process for induction. Manuals will be forwarded to groups shortly. Also on our agenda is a process to recognise and train leaders of groups so we can be sustainable into the future.
