On July 21<sup>st</sup> 1969 Neil Armstrong walked on the moon. Watching the black and white television in my Year 7 class at a Josephite School in Adelaide that day, I was aware that that was a momentous historical occasion. On the recent 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this occasion I am even more aware of how ground breaking that mission into space was and what it illustrated about God's magnificent creation and gift to us.

On August 8<sup>th</sup> this year we mark another significant occasion in world history, namely the 110<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of a woman whose work and mission has left an amazing mark on our world and led to her becoming Australia's first saint. On October 7<sup>th</sup> it will also be 130 years since Julian Tenison Woods died. Together Mary and Julian's efforts were ground breaking, especially in the foundation of Catholic education in many places across Australia and New Zealand. Since then the Sisters of St Joseph have taken Mary's legacy to far reaching places in our world and Josephite Associates continue to leave their footprints in many unique ways, with this year marking 40 years since the beginning of the Perthville Associates who were established in 1979. Indeed, a year of many anniversaries!

I have recently heard from Elaine, an **Associate in Scotland**. Our Scottish counterparts are very sad that they will lose the presence of the Sisters after 14 years, with Sr Ann Leesue leaving there shortly. We hope that we can support our Scottish friends 'from afar' and keep this valuable link with the home of the MacKillop's!

As the Sisters move into their six yearly **Chapter**, when decisions about new directions and leaders take place, we pray that God's Spirit will enlighten all that unfolds and evolves from their deliberations. In solidarity with the Sisters at this time I invite all Associates to continue praying the Chapter Prayer contained in our last IJALT newsletter.

Mary Hemmings Chairperson This month Archbishop Mark Coleridge, Archbishop of Brisbane, has given us a picture of St John the Baptist to whom St Mary of the Cross MacKillop had great devotion.



The figure of John the Baptist was so revered in the first century that some thought he was the Messiah; and there is still a small sect called the Mandeans who venerate John as the Messiah. It's not by chance that the Fourth Gospel in particular has the Baptist pointing to Jesus as the Messiah and making it quite clear that it is he and not John himself who is the anointed one of God.

John was not the only Baptist in his time. He was part of a larger renewal movement which gathered around the River Jordan. The movement was searching for a new beginning in what seemed a desperate time. The new beginning would be like the People of God, after forty years in the wilderness, crossing the Jordan to enter the Promised Land. In John's own time, the People of God needed to take possession of the Promised Land in a new way, especially since the Romans were the occupying force. Going down into the waters of the Jordan and emerging from them was symbolic of a new entry, but the substance of it was the personal conversion of which John speaks powerfully in the gospels. The symbol without

the substance was meaningless.

The New Testament suggests that John was related in some way to Jesus, but it's hard to know how exactly. Jesus also seems to have been part of the group that gathered around the Baptist at the Jordan, as were some of his first disciples. The group scattered when John was arrested; and Jesus returned to his home town of Nazareth. When he returns he doesn't go into hiding; he begins his own public ministry which is very different from John's. John preached the need to prepare for the coming of God's Kingdom; Jesus preached its coming. Jesus worked miracles as signs of the inbreaking of God's Kingdom; John worked no miracles.

Yet from the first, Christianity saw in John the figure prophesied by Isaiah, the voice 'crying in the wilderness, Prepare the way of the Lord' (40:3). Even in the womb, John greets the embryonic Messiah (Luke 1:41). His preaching of repentance for the forgiveness of sins was part of preparing the way, as was his designation of Jesus as "The Lamb of God" (John 1:29) Finally there was his martyr's death which foreshadowed the death of Jesus. For all of these reasons, the Baptist is the great voice of Advent.

If St Mary MacKillop looked to John the Baptist as a special patron, it was surely because she saw herself called to be "a voice crying in the wilderness, Prepare the way of the Lord" and we can see clearly how right she was to read the story of God in her life in this strange and wonderful way.

Maybe a question to take us to prayer: "What was it about John the Baptist that caused Mary MacKillop to accept him as a source of inspiration for her life?"
