# The Sacred Heart of Jesus

Excerpts from the Homily by Pope Francis (8th June 2018)

It is not us who first loved God; it's the other way around. It is He who loved us first!

God is like that; He is always first. He's the first to wait for us, the first to love us, the first to help us.

However, it is not easy to understand God's love. It is a love that cannot be understood. A love that surpasses all knowledge. It surpasses everything. The love of God is so great that a poet once described it as a "bottomless sea without shores..." This is the love that we must try to understand, the love that we receive.

Throughout the history of salvation, God has revealed His love to us. He has been a great teacher. God did not reveal His love through power but by loving His people, teaching them to walk, taking them in His arms, caring for them.

How does God manifest this love? With great works? No. He makes himself smaller and smaller with gestures of tenderness and goodness. He approaches His children, and with His closeness He makes us understand the greatness of love.

God sent us His Son. He sent Him in the flesh



and the Son humbled himself until death. This is the mystery of God's love. The greatest greatness expressed in the smallest smallness. This allows us to understand Christianity.

Jesus teaches us the kind of attitude a Christian should have. It is all about carrying on God's own work in your own small way. That is, feeding the hungry, quenching the thirsty, visiting the sick and the prisoner.

Works of mercy pave the path of love that Jesus teaches us in continuity with God's great love for us. We do not need great discourse on love, but men and women who know how to do these little things for Jesus, for the Father.

Our works of mercy, He said, are the continuity of this love.

#### A Day in Kapunda by Carla Mastrangelo

Delicious scones, jam and cream greeted visitors in the Hall next to St Rose's Church in Kapunda on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> of May. The drive north from Adelaide was quite pleasant but it was evident from the dry landscape that much of the area was in need of rain.

After morning tea Fr John Swann led us on a journey of the history of the area and the connection with Mary MacKillop and the Sisters of St Joseph. Here is a sampling of what he said:

Kapunda is one of the oldest parishes in the diocese. Here's a brief historical timeline:

**1849**: first Parish Priest, Fr John Fallon, was appointed

1854: St John's Church opened

**1862**: the first St Rose of Lima Church was built in Kapunda

**1868**: 2 years after their beginnings in Penola, the Sisters began teaching in the old St Rose's Church with 100 children which grew to 190

1869: the Sisters taught in Fords

**1870**: the Sisters taught in Tarlee, Greenock, Marrabel and Koonunga

1876: the Sisters taught in Baker's Flat

**1876**: the Sisters left St John's but continued in Kapunda





1877: the Sisters taught in Freeling

**1894**: the Sisters withdrew from Kapunda with the arrival of the Dominican Sisters. Some clergy regarded the Sisters of St Joseph as uneducated and not suitable as teachers. This was one of the reasons the Dominican Sisters were invited from Dublin.

**1897**: Mary MacKillop and her Sisters returned to St John's to establish a Girls Reformatory


**1909**: the Reformatory closed with 85 girls spending time there over the 12½ years it operated

**1938**: foundation stone laid for the present St Rose's Church

**1946**: the old St John's Church was demolished as well as the old St Rose's Church at Kapunda

Then following Mass in St Rose's Church and lunch in the Hall our group went on a tour of the town and surrounding areas, with Fr John pointing out various sites of interest connected to Mary MacKillop and her Sisters. We completed our tour at St John's Cemetery.

Many thanks to Fr John Swann for an informative day and thanks also to the volunteers who provided the lovely feast that all of us enjoyed.

Covid has provided many challenges and led us to doing things differently. The gift of communications such as our webinar is a positive outcome of this time of change, and we look forward to sharing in this special time together with many of you in September.

#### Launch of the Mary MacKillop Walk by Bridgette Barrett

With growing anticipation, people gathered from far and wide on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> April, surrounded by dignitaries and Sisters of St Joseph for this official launch. The event was organised by the Planning Committee, Mary MacKillop Precinct Board members Andrea Heading, Jo King, Michele McCormack and Paul Murphy together with Kathy Sampson, a long-time friend and supporter of the Sisters and Sr Mary Ryan.

Greg Crafter (former SA parliamentarian for Norwood) compered the proceedings. Welcome to country, by John Lochowiak, emphasised the importance of walking together while celebrating our differences. John spoke about revisiting the sites of our ancestors within creation, and how this can become a spiritual journey for us.

Sr Brigette Sipa, Regional Leader, spoke of the spiritual journey, the 2012 concept of the establishment of the Museum and Precinct and thanked the initial committee and those following who contributed to what we now know as The Mary MacKillop Precinct. The Kensington site is sacred ground; this was the home of Mary MacKillop from 1872 to 1883. The Precinct calls for a response engagement, inspiration, creation gratitude. It is a place of pilgrimage, faith, personal development and hospitality. Mary MacKillop College was built in 1963 but under Mary MacKillop's guidance, education in the area has existed since 1872. Mary's values continue to be instilled in the students of the College today.

A virtual presentation of the various stops on the Walk was shown, which was an ideal time for quiet contemplation.

Vickie Chapman (Deputy Premier) reminded us to be attentive; that the Precinct and Walk are more significant than we can appreciate, providing a living, walking memorable history of not only Mary MacKillop but of the early Kensington/Norwood area. Despite many hardships, Mary's legacy to education and social justice continues today, as seen in a past student of the College choosing space engineering as a career! Many students have been educated in the Josephite tradition. Ms Chapman also acknowledged the assistance of poet/journalist Max Harris in the journey, his memorial, also part of the historical Walk.

The Museum re-opened in 2019 under the guidance of Sr Mary Ryan. Numerous people and groups were involved – the Task Force, committees, Josephite Sisters and lay people – in the transformation of the area which now includes a Café and gift shop.


Greg Mackie OAM, History Trust CEO officially launched the Mary MacKillop Walk. Elizabeth Ho OAM, Chair of the History Trust whose wonderful support was acknowledged was also in attendance.

Archbishop Patrick O'Regan concluded the proceedings with a reflection and prayer, speaking of the Josephite connections through Perthville NSW, reiterating the Easter gospels and their connection to pilgrimage – a journey of the heart and sense of place. A litany of hope was responded to by all "Lord of life be our companion on our journey". The journey of the heart, guidance, strength, power, safety, place of rest: for all this, we turn to God.

Mary MacKillop, Australia's first Saint, a pioneering educator and social reformer – now a cultural icon. Many have followed and continue to follow in her footsteps.

And these last words were from Sr Mary: "The Mary MacKillop Walk is now well and truly launched! There is a healthy supply of the 'little red books' in the Museum. Please feel free to share them with family, friends, colleagues, your parishes etc – and invite them to go on the Walk!"


#### • Feast of Mary MacKillop
