In light of the recent declaration by the IPCC Report on Climate Change, the UN chief declared a “code red for humanity”, with the hope that if the world acts quickly, catastrophic outcomes can be avoided. I was immediately drawn to one of the deliberations in the Chapter document that speaks of urgency and states:

Let's face the crisis affecting people, other species and Earth itself at this time and with compassion and urgency, collaborate locally and globally to influence governments, companies and others to halt the damage, protect life, restore habitats and settle the homeless.

In medical circles, Code Red requires a code team to rush to a specific location and begin immediate resuscitative efforts to save a life. The heart of our planet is sadly beating slower at the moment and, as Companions committed to Gospel values and service, our call to be Stewards of the Earth takes on another level of meaning. As members of a global code team, there is hope that resides in our “being selfless and intentional in our relationships with the cosmos” (Joan Chittister).

As we approach the Anniversary of Fr Julian Tenison Woods' death (7 October 1889) it is fitting that we reflect on his influence, as evidenced by his ongoing awareness of and commitment to the environment. Father Julian Tenison Woods “understood the deep links that environment, faith and education played on one another. His attentiveness to God's creative presence in the world around led him to understand the interconnectedness of things” (www.tenison.catholic.edu.au/our-college/sustainability-at-tenison-woods-college).

Fr Julian Tenison Woods was an astute observer of natural history and made significant original contributions in geology, palaeontology, botany and zoology. Much of his research was

conducted “on the field” whilst listening to the birds and taking in the beauty of the surrounding bush, rocks, plants and rivers in areas such as the Mosquito Flats, Naracoorte Caves and Muddy Creek. Father Julian Tension Woods was very much supported in his scientific research by Samuel Pratt-Winter, owner of Murndal Station on the Wannon River near Hamilton. Julian visited this large-scale pastoral enterprise on quarterly visits from Portland in 1856 and 1857, and in later years. Little did he know that Mary MacKillop’s father, Alexander, would be laid to rest in 1865 near Hamilton.



It is funny how things are often linked: both Father Julian Tension Woods and Saint Mary MacKillop received great support in their endeavours at various times, from people outside their faith tradition. Both Julian and Mary seemed to celebrate that “all creatures are filled with God’s presence and tender love” (*Laudato Si’ — A Christian Prayer in Union with Creation*, p 190), as they rode through the countryside on mission.

Mary and Julian were both people who actioned responses to the needs of the time as they became apparent, with compassion and urgency. Perhaps we could call this their Code Yellow ... one of hope for tomorrow and, as the sun rises each day, the promise of far-reaching rewards for efforts made locally and collaboratively.


ALLORA JOSEPHITE COMPANIONS — AUGUST 2021
