Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods had a great devotion to the Sacred Heart. This is expressed in the foundation of a Religious Order which paid homage in its name – the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart. In their witness to the Gospel, they made a commitment to God, who is compassionate love. The Hebrew word for 'compassion' is *rechemet* which translates to mean 'womb' – reflecting the depth of God's lifegiving love for us. The Latin derivation of 'compassion' means 'to feel with' – God feels with us.

Mary and Julian's experience of the compassionate love of God, symbolised in the Sacred Heart, compelled them to express Conscious Compassion in the ordinariness of life. This was seen in their purposeful works for justice such as education and care of the neglected – action for God's people.

Once a poor lady was sitting in the gutter, ill. Sister Mary's companion thought she was drunk but Mary sat down with the woman and realised that she needed help as she was ill. She helped the woman to the chemist where she could get assistance for her.

In their outreach to others Mary and Julian became a voice of God's love as they responded to those in need. Today as we live and grow in Conscious Compassion they implore us to:
