There were opportunities for reflection and discussion. Some of the comments, insights and inspirations by those present are given below to be shared with readers:



Joseph was a God-centred person.

Joseph walked humbly with his God. We, as Companions, are challenged and called to do the same.

Speak less, listen better, see more with the heart.

The way we look at life is Josephite inspired. Joseph didn't speak one word in the Bible; his actions were his words.

To walk the 'Jesus Way' is what sustains me when I face hardship in my life.

To love tenderly is to build a culture of encounter.

Our world needs courage and hope.

Mary MacKillop sought Joseph's guidance. Mary MacKillop followed her heart. We can all make a difference by the way we live our lives.

Who will comfort my people? Who will wipe away their tears? It is up to us now!

- Expanding our horizons by letting go of the familiar

My Trip to the Canonisation in 2010 - abridged by Nicole Coote

After a marathon flight, the plane touched down in Roma, Italia. I was so excited to be in this wonderful city that had so much to offer. Our first stop was at St Paul's Basilica, then other sights including the Circus Maximus, the Palatine Hill where Rome was founded, and Santa Maria Basilica, which is the third largest basilica in Rome. Finally, we approached St Peter's and what an imposing sight it was! Everything in Rome is so big and St Peter's is no different. It was built in the 17th Century and is the biggest church in the world.

The evening before the canonisation we joined thousands of others for a Vigil Celebration of the life of Mary MacKillop. As we heard prayers featuring Mary's own words, I started to realise the magnitude of my trip to Rome and that Mary was a woman for all. Her life and attributes had, and have, touched many people.

After much anticipation the day finally arrived. Here was I participating in this great day in the history of our church as Australia was to receive the blessing of its first saint. During the ceremony, Mary MacKillop's life history was read aloud and then Pope Benedict chanted in Latin which effectively enrolled Mary in the Catalogue of Saints. Even though the majority of the Mass and celebration was in Latin, it was easy to follow. We received a booklet, where some parts were in English, but once again mainly in Latin. However, as I joined in the celebration it reinforced to me how Christianity is a universal language. How we, as Australian Catholics, responded wasn't any different to how the German couple who sat next to me responded. It was the unification of so many Catholics in one space as we received communion that really struck me. The moment when Mary MacKillop was recognised as a saint was amazing and I got goosebumps and teary as fellow Australians cheered and clapped for Australia's First Saint. I couldn't believe that I had witnessed such an inspirational event in Australia's history. Such an opportunity is an honour!

The morning after the canonisation, I attended the official Mass of Thanksgiving at St Paul's Basilica, the second largest church displaying a gothic style altar. Gathered together for this Mass were the many pilgrims from Australia and New Zealand. The pilgrims were joined by the Sisters of St Joseph, Cardinals, bishops, priests and other Australian dignitaries. During the Mass the indigenous Australians were also recognised. It was a great occasion of thanksgiving and holiness, and yet another grace-filled moment.

Following the Mass of Thanksgiving we were lucky enough to be joined by at least five Sisters for a tour of Rome. This tour was specifically planned to see the places that were of significance to Mary, some of the places that she would have visited when she too came to Rome. Sights included the Termini Station, where Mary would have arrived after 6 weeks at sea from Adelaide, and the Santa Sacramenta Chapel, which Mary faithfully visited most evenings for Benediction.

I will look back on my time in Rome as a unique opportunity that was made possible to me. The places that I have seen, the people that I have met, the experiences that I've had, have all, in some way, shaped and changed me in the way I now see myself. Am I a spiritual person? I thought not, but maybe yes, I now think I am. I appreciate my life and the wonderful people in it. I thank God for being blessed with so many things that make me happy - like family and friends. From this experience, I will continue to endeavour to emulate the qualities of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop and try to reach out to those in need. I feel truly blessed to have been able to have such a life-changing journey to such an amazing place.
