# LAUNCH OF THE BOOK ABOUT US! Evolution of a Movement: Josephite Associates to Josephite Companions 1979-2019 Mary Cresp RSJ

In her Foreword to Evolution of a Movement, Mary Hemmings, Chair of the Josephite Companions Leadership Team, muses on the opportunity reading the book gave her to 're-live' the story, to 'relish' it and to 'view it in its broader context'. As the book's author, I can identify with those feelings. I must say when I was asked to write the history, I was apprehensive – in the main, its beginnings were familiar to me, but I had little idea of what had had happened during the years of this century. Getting to know this part of the story has been a privilege. I have 'met' you all and feel I now know you as true companions on the journey.

I was thrilled that in her reflection on the book, Anne Benjamin picked up that the story of the Josephite Companions is one of relationships. If what I have written does no more than remind readers of this fact, then it is enough. We have been graced with a precious gift of the Spirit, demonstrated in the lives of Mary MacKillop and Julian Woods, and re-interpreted over the years by hundreds of men and women in their own context. I hope that as you recall your local and personal stories, you will be inspired once again to nurture the gift and to develop it even more.

At the book-launch that took place at Kensington on Thursday 1 December, Professor David Hilliard gave a succinct yet informative and lively talk on the history of lay movements in the Church. Archbishop Patrick O'Regan then launched the book, speaking as a Companion himself about the relationships he has formed with Sisters and others who share the charism. Let us pray for one another during this Christmas-tide that we, who have been graced with the companionship of a Joseph who in his parent-hood nurtured in Jesus an understanding of what God's 'fatherhood' is like; of a Mary MacKillop and Julian Woods who handed on to us their understanding of God's compassionate love; and of all our forebears who likewise have incarnated God's presence to us in the ordinary – may we show to others today that same Great Love that embraces us all and calls us to be joy and hope in a world longing for both.

# **Josephite Student Leaders**



The Josephite charism is well and truly alive in our young people if **JJAMM 2023** (Joseph, Julian and Mary MacKillop) is anything to go by. School captains from twenty two schools throughout Australia and New Zealand gathered at Mary MacKillop Place and Kincumber to learn more about leading in a Josephite way. Jan Barnett rsj and her team facilitated the gathering. Students learned more about Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison-Woods. They listened to the stories of those working in Josephite ministries today. Students reflected on their own passions with many sharing these on their 'soapbox'. There was a strong focus throughout on Social Justice and students realised they do have a voice and they can take practical action. We hope to share something of their actions later this year.



## **Josephite Companion Day**

During our discussions in Sydney, the idea of having a Companions' Day arose. It was recalled that Mary's sister, Annie MacKillop, was a great companion to Mary, and to many of the Sisters, over the years. She supported Mary so often throughout her life, including in her times of illness. In many ways Annie also walked the journey with the Sisters, supporting them and, in essence, sharing in the charism. There are even photos of groups of Sisters in which Annie is included. In today's world, we would consider that she was a Josephite Companion!

In light of this, we have decided to recognize her as a fellow Josephite Companion. We will acknowledge and celebrate this on September 5th with an online webinar to which all Companions are welcome.
