Reflection for NSW Josephite Companions



The earth is the Lord's, and all it contains, The world, and those who dwell in it. Ps 24:1

About two weeks ago Blacktown Companions group other and Companions from Linden, Strathfield, Lakemba and the Chinese Community had a reflection day facilitated by Sr Marie Biddle rsj. The theme of the day's reflection was Beauty. Sr Marie encouraged us to see with the eyes of our heart and reflect on the beauty that is found around us, in each one of us and in everything that exists. We

did this through sharing, poetry and music. Sr Marie said that beauty is here to be noticed. Too often it is taken for granted because we are moving too fast to take it in and allow it to deliver its message in us. We need to pay attention. And it is also to be seen in every person.

This made me think of Fr Julian Tenison Woods whose 130th death anniversary we celebrated a few weeks ago on the 7 October. Though he lived all those years ago, he was truly a man of our time.

Fr Woods, as he was known, was an English Catholic priest, a geologist and natural scientist who served in Australia. In fact, some of his works are still used today. As we all know, together with Mary MacKillop, they founded the Congregation of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart.

Fr Julian was gifted with many talents, a deep thinker who recognised the marvel and sacredness of God's creation. He believed that all created beings and things reflected the beauty and grandeur of God. 'Nothing is too wonderful for me to believe about God, the richness of whose creative power was a constant subject of love and admiration.' (Fr Julian Tenison Woods 1887)

Fr Woods believed that every leaf, every rock, every insect had something beautiful and wonderful to tell. We learn that the dust we tread upon was once alive, the rock on which we stand has lived and died – has been a thing of life and is now a stone. When he walked among nature he felt at home and immersed himself in its beauty. 'All around, above and below, the eye is bewildered by a profusion of ornaments and decoration of nature's own devising' (Fr Julian Tenison Woods 1862)

Fr Tenison Woods was keenly aware of the natural environment, its beauty and wonder, and the need to care for it. He argued and

debated about the care of the Earth. His views and concerns are especially relevant now, with growing environmental awareness, something which Pope Francis reflects upon and urges us now to look after the good of our common home, our Earth. Fr Julian worked for the betterment of society and the church.

May we, like Fr Woods, appreciate the beauty that surrounds us. May we cultivate the beautiful in our lives and in each other. May we celebrate with wonder and awe God's creation.

Perthville and surrounds Pilgrimage 2023

'People may think a Pilgrimage is simply an opportunity to go to different places, hear the stories relating to these places and learn about the people connected to these places, but a Pilgrimage is so much more than that.

Those of us who had the privilege of being part of 'The Perthville and Surrounds Pilgrimage' in September 2023 can attest to the fact that this Pilgrimage gave us the opportunity to spend time in the company of people who came together to explore a deep and beautiful history. We had the opportunity to attend wonderful informative sessions on the lives of Mary, Julian, local indigenous people and the situation in the Bathurst Diocese in the 1870s. We heard of the joys, trials and spirituality of the people connected to the places we visited, we immersed ourselves in the beauty of peaceful surrounds and got to know a little of the four brave women who pioneered the Perthville foundation. We heard how the first foundation in N.S.W. came about and had the opportunity of visiting and experiencing the areas where convent schools were established during the very early years of the foundation. We stood where Mary and Julian had stood when they visited the area to support and instruct the sisters. The story of the Separation and the

distress it caused the sisters was pivotal in understanding why things changed.

Planning is underway for next year's Pilgrimage. I would recommend it to anyone who is interested in the history of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart, who wish to enrich their Josephite Spirituality, to explore ways to connect with people, as the sisters did and still do today, to be nourished and refreshed in the beautiful surrounds of St. Joseph's Convent, Perthville and, as we are told often in the gospels, to take time away from the everyday and to be present with our God, quietly in prayer and contemplation.

After the Pilgrimage ended one of the Pilgrims sent this message to us. "I had the most wonderful time with all of you, I felt so welcomed. Hopefully this can become an annual Pilgrimage and I look forward to being part of this wonderful history again". You too can be part of this 'wonderful history'. Details of the next Pilgrimage will be distributed early in 2024.

Financial literacy now and beyond

The impact of learning financial skills extends far beyond the now. So many people go on from attending Mary MacKillop Today's education workshops to build better futures for themselves!

You might be surprised to hear that more than 1 in 6 children and 1 in 8 adults live in poverty right here in Australia.

We know the cycle of poverty can be broken when people can access basic financial services at an affordable cost. That's why, through your support, our Financial Inclusion program is helping people get on top of their finances and take control of their life.

At Mary MacKillop Today, our focus is on holistic support. That means building relationships with each person who comes to us seeking support to escape economic hardship, so we can address the underlying issues together that might be affecting their financial capability. That way, people can get the tailored assistance they need for their own situation.

One of the best ways we can walk with people **towards financial independence** is to empower them with the knowledge and skills they need **now** so they can stand on their own in the **long term.** This is the goal of our financial education workshops. People can come along to learn how to make more informed financial decisions and grow in confidence to manage their finances, now and into the future.

Our wonderful partner organisations play an important role in making our Financial Inclusion program successful. Without their connections with regional community members, we simply wouldn't be able to achieve the impact that people need to break free from financial hardship.

Anita, our Financial Inclusion Team Leader, explains:

"We are guided by our partners who truly know the needs of the community. We ask them, what do your clients need? Our partners are incredible, and some have been with us since our program started.

Many people take financial literacy for granted — thinking everyone knows things like keeping a shopping list, understanding how to read an energy bill, knowing if you're eligible for fee free bank accounts, or what your rights are as a tenant.

So, our work is not just about financial literacy. It's life skills.

The biggest thing for my team is empowering people to work out what their own priorities are for themselves – rather than telling them. It is very rewarding to see our participants embracing what they've learnt with us and making changes in their life.

By giving people these skills now, they can go out into the community to share their knowledge with family and friends. Over time, people build their financial resilience and become self-reliant long-term."

Sr Susan Connelly rsj writes

When I think of Mary MacKillop, I am struck by her capacity to break new ground with old tools. There she was with Julian Tenison Woods, setting up a whole new school system, dependent on the age-old Gospel message of love and inclusion, and walking into the unknown with Jesus.

And the Sisters of St Joseph have been doing that ever since. What a privilege it is to be among such great companions, such great Josephites – all of us.

Since 1994 I have been involved with the people of Timor-Leste, learning about their extraordinary history, their faith, their tenacity, and their friendliness. It's been a roller-coaster journey. I learned about their friendship towards our soldiers in World War II, and that stays with me as one motivation to continue supporting them. The Australian government dropped leaflets all over the then Portuguese Timor in early 1943 as our men were being pulled out. The leaflets said: "Your friends do not forget you". So many Australians are keeping that promise. And it's a promise that needs to be kept, because so many Timorese died – at least 40,000 of them – simply because they were helping our Australian men.

We Australians need to know the history of what happened later to these friends of ours – in 1975, when Australia stood back while Indonesia invaded and caused the deaths of at least 180,000 people.

Another disturbing event was Australia's spying on the new Timorese government in 2004 to get more money from Timor Sea resources. Our government sent spies dressed as AusAID workers to put listening bugs in the walls of the Timorese Prime Minister's offices to listen in to their plans. A Treaty regarding part of the Timor Sea was signed on the basis of that fraud. Two men who told the truth about it – Witness K and Bernard Collaery – were then prosecuted for four years at the cost of millions of dollars to the Australia taxpayer.

St Paul said, "The love of money is the root of all evil" (1 Tim 6:10). Jesus' accompaniment of the poor, his challenges to the rich and powerful, and his lifestyle choices showed his attitude to money and the power it brings. Mary MacKillop, Julian Woods and sisters since then undertook their imitation of Jesus according to their times and situations.

These days, the old tools needed to speak the truth to power in new situations remain those of the Gospel. I try to use them in political action, writing in newspapers and journals, giving talks, supporting various people's efforts and other forms of advocacy. I am fortunate to have discovered the work of René Girard, whose insights into the Gospel reality has opened new ways of thinking for me, new ways of seeing.

Of particular concern to me are the West Papuans who are victims of the greed of the Indonesian government which prefers the rich Papuan lands to the people. Indonesia's control of the area is based on the 1969 so-called "Act of Free Choice", where just over 1000 Papuans were lined up in various areas and read a statement saying that West Papua belonged to Indonesia. The process was conducted at gunpoint. I met one of the people who was made to read that statement when I visited West Papua in 2016.

Unfortunately, successive Australian governments have been too timid to challenge Indonesia on its treatment of our near neighbours, the Papuans. West Papua may as well be on Mars instead of one of our nearest neighbours. Foreign journalists are not allowed in, so it is not surprising that normal news outlets in Australia are full of advertisements, sport, fashion and commentary, but nothing about the cruel and repressive military regime that has killed hundreds of thousands of Papuans.

Let us pray for the Papuan people. Our prayer may lead us to find out more about them, and to stand with them, to tell the truth about them, as Mary and Julian would.



News from Moree

Our mothers' prayer group commenced in February 2022 at St Frances Xavier parish Moree NSW. We are a group of mothers, sisters who meet weekly for an hour to pray for children. Sister Margaret Therese Cusack from the Josephite order is a valued member of our group.

We belong to the world-wide movement of 'Mothers who pray for their children' which had its beginnings in Brazil in 2011, when Angela Abdo {Foundress} was moved by the Holy Spirit whilst visiting the shrine of Our Lady of La Salette in the French Alps. Angela and her daughter Vanessa saw the need that, "all children need a mother to pray for them".

Moree became the second English speaking group in the world. Other groups are in France, UK, Canada, America, Italy, China to name a few.

Our Parish Priest Fr Vic Ignacio is a La Salette missionary and spiritual director for English speaking countries and regularly attends our meetings.

Guiding principles of the movement is to support its 3 pillars of: unity- Jesus being our inspiration; obedience - Jesus our example; humility - Mother Mary's example.

We have a beautiful Rosary, songs, Formation and prayer moments.

We enjoy each other's contributions to the group and share our stories as women, as mothers, as sisters.

We are well supported by our Australian coordinator Carolina Cetenareski.

'Mothers who pray for their children' are having their first Australian Conference in Melbourne on 27th April 2024.
