Genevieve Anne Ryan, affectionately known as Gen, was born in Tranmere, a suburb of Adelaide, South Australia in1940. She died on the 23rd of June 2025, having suffered a severe stroke two days beforehand.

Gen attended the local St Joseph's Primary School, followed by St Joseph's Juniorate at Aldgate for her secondary schooling. She entered the Sisters of St Joseph in 1958 and was professed in 1961 taking the name Sr Denis of Our Lady of Lourdes. After completing her Teacher's Certificate in Sydney, Gen returned to South Australia in 1962 to teach at Thebarton and then Rosewater. In 1964 she was appointed to the Waikerie Motor Mission and so began many years of this work in the Pt Pirie Diocese and Adelaide Archdiocese, with unique adventures that seemed to accompany Gen everywhere she went.

These continued as Gen was once again assigned to the education sector, in leadership

positions throughout the 1970's. In the meantime, she had succeeded in obtaining her BA at Flinders University. In 1981, Gen joined the Catholic Adult Education Service team. Gen completed her qualifications as a Spiritual Director in 1986, initially using these skills at Baulkham Hills. In 1995 Gen returned to Adelaide, where she continued involvement in ongoing formation for Sisters and candidates to Josephite life.

While we admire Gen's long list of achievements, it is her unique character for which she is most remembered. Perhaps because she readily accepted and appreciated others, people were drawn to her. Gen was a deep thinker, but her ability to translate these understandings to life's practicalities in story meant her words immediately inspired. She had a wonderful sense of humour, and to the hundreds of friends made on her life journey Gen provided affectionate companionship.

Julian Tenison Woods – the man with an alphabet after his name

Small stories enrich and enliven one's impression of Julian Tenison Woods. Letters exchanged between Julian, his family members, and close friends contain numerous anecdotes and inhouse jokes.

I learned some of the minutia of his life, such as

- The contents of his pockets and his daily routines.
- The impact of epidemics and death on individuals and families and
- His first-hand impressions of colonialism and natural disasters in Australia and parts of Asia.

Exposure to the small stories provided glimpses of Julian's humanity, social and religious values, as well as his intellectual capacities and insights into how he lived out his priest-scientist vocation. Here are a few of those *small stories* which draw back the curtain on the everyday-ness of his life.

A for Alphabet

Mary MacKillop, in her account of Julian's life wrote, "What a many-sided mind the man must have had." She recalled how Julian joked about the alphabet of letters he carried behind his name (MacKillop and Press 2010).

As a member of various Australian and International Scientific Societies and Institutes, he was entitled to include his alphabet when publishing material. Interestingly, the byline of most of his published material included his priestly title of "Reverend."

Julian's 1864 alphabet:

F.R.G.S – Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society

F.G.S. – Fellow of the Royal Geological Society F.L.S. – Fellow of the Linnean Society and many more ...

T for Teetotaller

With an English upbringing, Julian was a big tea drinker. Anne Bulger recorded these impressions in Fr Woods' Memoir:

As a rule, people in the bush in those days lived with an absence of luxury that was surprising. It

was not safe to drink the water of the swamps for many of the early settlers died subsequently from hydatids. Besides, the water was so muddy or stagnant that it was undrinkable without boiling. The tea was hardly an improvement, and

certainly was very different from the genuine article. Father used to say he wondered why people paid for such stuff, and still more why they drank it. But, after all, he said it was the mere name of the thing, for no one liked drinking sugar and water.

M for Marriage Proposal

Julian joined his brother's household and, as Margaret Press writes, soon added "his pleasant company and musical talents to the gatherings of friends who often visited them ... Julian even toyed with the idea, enthusiastically promoted by his brother, of forgetting about religious life and of following instead the promising opening offered to him by the undoubted interest which he had awakened in one of the daughters of the family on whose farm he had spent some weeks ... He valued her friendship enough to decide to ride up to the farm one evening and talk over with her the possibility of marriage. Just as he set out occurred one of those interventions which he always interpreted as evidence of God's will for him." (Press 1979, 46-47) Julian was in the act of saddling his horse when a severe thunderstorm broke. The poorly made became dangerous streets of Adelaide quagmires ... He "decided not to risk the journey and that he was not destined to go up to the hills that night, and that he should not commit himself to an engagement to marry ... Instead of riding out, he picked his way along the wet street to St Patrick's Church, to pray for guidance and help." (Press 1979, 47) On the way out he met the Bishop of Adelaide and left with the resolve to abandon his plans of a marriage proposal and to become a priest in the Adelaide Diocese.

In the Footsteps of Mary Mackillop

A Pilgrimage from Port Adelaide to Kensington – a few of the highlights

Port Adelaide

Mary MacKillop and Rose Cunningham arrived in Adelaide from the south-east on the Steamer *SS Penola* on Sunday the 23rd of June 1867. They proceeded directly to the Church of the Immaculate



Conception (above), remaining there until after Benediction in the evening. The Sisters then proceeded to Adelaide, accompanied by Fr Woods, by the 6.30pm train.

The Sisters rented a house in Dale Street, Port Adelaide which was used as the Convent until 1901. In 1899 Mary MacKillop visited the Convent writing: "The Sisters are happy and united. The Sisters make altar breads, mend linen and give the priest breakfast ... and all they get is £5 a year" (Foale, 2016, p423).

Bowden



In August 1867, the Sisters came to Bowden. The original St Saviour's Church (above) was established in the 1860s on the corner of First and West Streets and the school was near here. The Sisters would travel to the school each day from their Convent in Grote Street by train or by walking. This church/school was opened in February 1868 and the Sisters taught here until Mary's excommunication in 1871. They returned in 1876.

Franklin Street – St Joseph's Convent

(Now part of St Mary's College Chapel)
The excommunication by Bishop Sheil took place in the Chapel of the Franklin Street Convent (below). During this time, some 50 Sisters of St Joseph were told to leave the Congregation and the Franklin Street Convent.



The Bishop offered both the Convent and school to the Dominican Sisters. The Convent was then transferred to the Dominican Sisters (Foale, 2016, p46). They moved into Franklin Street on the 21st of November 1871 "... despite the pain of the Dominicans when they discovered the Sisters of St Joseph had been asked to leave the church property".

West Terrace Cemetery

There seemed to be 12 or 13 Josephite Sisters who lie buried in the West Terrace Cemetery. These Sisters were among the pioneer members of the Congregation. They included all those who died in Adelaide in the 1870's, as well as several who died later on.



Kensington



In 1872 after Mary MacKillop's excommunication order was lifted, the Sisters of St Joseph rented a property at Kensington on the site of the present Convent, Chapel (above) and Museum. In 1875 Mary was gifted £1000 for the ownership of the Kensington property due to the generosity of friends Robert and Joanna Barr Smith who supported this payment.

Mary MacKillop lived at Kensington from 1872 until 1883. In 1883 she was expelled from the Archdiocese. This is why Sydney has become the Mother House and base for the Congregation.

Mary MacKillop's Pilgrim Energy The Torch Bearer

From the writings of Gen Ryan rsj

Introduction

When an Olympic flame is carried into a stadium and the Olympic torch is lit, it is a stirring moment. It is an action that ignites, heralds and illuminates. At this moment there is a focus and purpose for people and athletes around the world.

Mary MacKillop was called to pick up a flame and carry it into an **uncharted arena of life**. Her preparedness to do this:

- **Ignited** a responsive fire in the hearts of other women,
- Heralded a new era of apostolic intensity in Australia, and
- **Illuminated** the darkness and misery that threatened the poorest people in our land.

Mary was a pilgrim, a pathfinder, a pacesetter, a pioneer and a trailblazer. In scriptural terms she was called to be a pilgrim leader.

This call came when Mary was in her early twenties. When she met Julian Tenison Woods, Mary encountered his burning zeal for the neglected 'little ones' in isolated Australian rural conditions. The spark that burned in his heart caught fire in Mary's, and a shared dream materialised.

In 1866, the torch was alight and firmly in Mary MacKillop's grasp. Fuelled by Julian's vision, her own energy and enthusiasm, and the generosity and courage of a growing number of young women, this fire spread rapidly across the Australian landscape – and beyond.
