National Families Week is an initiative of Families Australia and is supported by the Australian Government Department of Social Services. The theme in 2025 is:







## Elder Abuse Awareness Day: 15 June 2025

The United Nations General Assembly designed 15 June as World Elder Abuse Awareness Day. This is a day celebrated each year, giving an opportunity for communities to stand together against the abuse, mistreatment and neglect of older people.

Elder abuse comes in many forms. It can be financial, emotional, psychological, physical, sexual, or social. Elder abuse can occur once, or many times and can vary in severity from subtle through to extreme. It can include one or a combination of the different types of abuse.

Most often, elder abuse is carried out by someone known to the older person, with two thirds of abusers being an adult child. Abusers can also be other family members, relatives, or friends.



## Research

The Australian Catholic University's Institute of Child Protection Studies regularly conducts research studies related to child protection and safeguarding. In a media release related to a study titled 'The safeguarding capability of adults in Catholic Church ministries: A global perspective' (July 2024), the study determined that:

"Lay members of the Church have scored lowest on a range of child safeguarding measures compared to those holding other roles."

The study had asked 184 participants from ministries in Australia, the UK, the Philippines, Ghana, India, Poland and Italy, to rate their beliefs about their organisational culture of safeguarding and awareness of policies and procedures, their confidence to act, their attitude to prevention and the agency of children/young people, and their situational prevention knowledge and education. I would suggest that should such a study be conducted within the Congregation, a PERFECT record would be reached, rather than a low score! The Josephite commitment and charism to serve and protect those who are vulnerable, certainly creates a safe culture and environment for all to enjoy.
