School on the West Coast at Rosebery. One lucky group of Grade 3 boys from St Virgil's College in Hobart was visiting the Josephite Mission and History Centre and

On another occasion Kath was asked, "Did Mary MacKillop ever wash her face?" Kath was highly amused by questions such as these, but she responded very seriously and with great respect for each enquirer!

Kath and Barry were particularly impressed with the enthusiasm and commitment of the Junior Joeys and encouraged schools where they are not yet established to "sign up" and form groups to continue the story and the work of St Mary MacKillop and Father Julian in Tasmania.

Children were cautioned about the destructive power of even trying a cigarette lest they be caught up in a habit they would find impossible to discard. Even the most lovable larrikins could be heard promising in their hearts never to be tempted!

It was wonderful for us to celebrate the Feast Day of St Mary MacKillop with Kath and Barry. In the evening, we held a "Conversation with Kath" at the Josephite Mission and History Centre. Kath gave a presentation following some drinks 'n' nibbles and then we prayed together the beautiful Josephite Evening Prayer for the Feast Day of St Mary MacKillop. It was a happy, celebratory event, made so by the ease with which our guests mingled and interacted with the large number of people who attended.

At Cygnet the venue had to be changed to the Church to house the many students from St James College who joined the parish community members to hear Kath and Barry. Following their presentation, the couple joined the community of Sisters at St James' Convent for lunch and sat for a long session of "table talk" during which memories were shared and even more stories were told.

At the Emmanuel Centre in Launceston "Spirituality over Supper" was held. Again, the large numbers of people who attended were delighted with their opportunity to meet the person who was honoured to receive the miracle which contributed to the canonisation of Australia's first saint.

At Forth, along the stunningly beautiful North West coast, Kath and Barry spoke to yet another large group of interested people and then shared in a celebratory barbecue lunch.

Despite being the special focus at each event, Kath and Barry involved themselves fully, generously and seemingly effortlessly. They did, however, manage a little sight-seeing during their "time off". They visited Port Arthur, Cradle Mountain and the East Coast without the curious questioning of audiences. They have been assured there is still much more to see in Tasmania. The word from Barry was, however, that the next visit will take place in Summer!

Sue clearly was touched by her August encounter with Kath and Barry. She has concluded her reflections thus:
